

CONTEMPLATE

Believing Justice and Mercy

In Luke's Sermon on the Plain, Jesus speaks to more than just his own people. We hear four blesseds and four related woes.

He first calls all those in the crowd, and now calls us to rejoice and leap for joy at the blessed activities dealing with justice and mercy. The implication: do the blesseds; avoid the woes.

- How will I be just in dealing with others all week long?
- How will I be merciful to everyone just as God is merciful?
- What mercy work will I do?



St. Valentine's Day

Happy St. Valentine's Day! As many of you know, St. Valentine is the patron saint of love (which, to be honest, I didn't know was a thing that someone could "claim"...who knew?!) and of happy marriages, as his feast day has commonly been associated with "courtly love."

But did you know that St. Valentine was actually a martyr (which means, of course, that he died defending the faith)? There's actually not much else

that's historically certain about St. Valentine, as there is a bit of an ambiguity that exists between two early Christian martyrs who both had the name Valentinus (the name was not so uncommon in the first few centuries of the Church; it's from the Latin for "worthy" or "strong and powerful"). What does seem certain is that our St. Valentine

died on February 14 somewhere around the year AD 270 and was thereafter venerated in the Church of Rome. Archeologists have unearthed a very early Roman Church dedicated to him as well as a Roman catacomb that bears his name. The pope (Gelasius, at the time) declared February 14 to be his feast day as early as 496!

Some stories claim that one of the reasons St. Valentine was arrested and subsequently killed was for marrying Christians (something that would have been illegal in the Roman Empire of his day) and helping them escape the persecutions of the Emperor Claudius II. Perhaps that's where the tradition came from seeking his intercession for young married or affianced couples. The earliest association that we have of St. Valentine's day being

associated with courtly love is actually from the High Middle Ages, when the medieval English poet Geoffrey Chaucer referenced the day in his work "Parliament of Foules" (c. 1375) as a time when humans and birds alike come together to find love.

If you catch me in a joking mood on St. Valentine's Day, you'll probably hear me quip that I often refer to the day as "International Celibacy Awareness Day." I jest, of course—but in our day and age, our world truly needs both witnesses. In a culture of use and over-sexualization, we need the fidelity and steadfastness of holy marriages to show us what human love is called to achieve, and that is the emulation of the steadfastness and fidelity of God's love for His Church. We also need chaste celibacy as a sign to the world that there exists a unity and consummation yet higher than what can be achieved in sexual love, as sacred as that can be in the context of a committed relationship. After all, we were all created for union with God, and celibacy remains a poignant reminder in the Church that we are made for a life beyond this earthly world—one where Christ will be our all in all, and where love of Him and of the Trinity will overwhelm all of our bodily senses.

On this St. Valentine's Day, whether you find vourself in the married state, engaged, or living a life of continence (i.e. sexual abstinence—whether temporarily or permanently!), let's pray together that St. Valentine would intercede for us and for our world, that we would together find the true meaning of love, of charity, as it is before God. Let's pray for holy marriages. Let's pray for young couples, that they make the decision to include God and the Church in their union. And let's pray for young men and women to model for us holy celibacy for the sake of the Kingdom of God.

Retreat for Inner Healing

March 11-13

During this retreat, we will look at what in our souls and stories prevent us from experiencing the full peace, freedom, joy, and happiness that Jesus offers us. 
