THE LIVES OF THE SAINTS

St. Isidore of Seville (April 4)

Saint Isidore of Seville was a prolific writer and capable administrator of his diocese. Following his brother as bishop of Seville, he founded schools and seminaries, and he was known for his encyclopedic knowledge. He was sometimes called "The Schoolmaster of the Middle Ages" because the encyclopedia he wrote was used as a textbook for nine centuries. Perhaps Isidore's greatest accomplishment is that he was a holy man.

Our society can well use Isidore's spirit of combining learning and holiness. Loving, understanding and knowledge can heal and bring a broken people back together. We are not barbarians like the invaders of Isidore's Spain. But people who are swamped by riches and overwhelmed by scientific and technological advances can lose much of their understanding love for one another.



Looking to Easter and Beyond

Lent is a very important season. It is important that each year we take a more intentional effort at examining our spiritual life. However, the challenges or penitential practices of Lent are not meant just to do something hard; they are meant to prepare us for what lies ahead.

Interestingly enough, we can lose sight of the big picture. Most people correctly group Lent and Easter together, as Easter happens right after the end of Lent. Sometimes we celebrate briefly, "Jesus

is risen! Praise God! Jesus has conquered death!" Then, we have our Easter celebrations—we gather together, maybe hunt some Easter eggs, and finally eat some sweets and desserts that we gave up for Lent. Once the weekend or the Easter Octave is over, we go back to normal life. However, even Easter is not the final goal. Yes, Jesus conquered death and

showed his love for us in an extraordinary way, but Jesus did not die only to show us an example of love or his power over death.

Jesus became man, walked among us, suffered, died, rose from the dead, and ascended into heaven so he could give us his very Spirit, the Holy Spirit. The deeper fulfillment of everything Jesus does actually happens on Pentecost. Jesus wanted us to be filled with his very Life, the Love between the Father and Son. When we have the Holy Spirit we can experience true love, joy, and peace. We become temples of God. God's love is not something we have to muster up, but it is actually a gift; the Holy Spirit is the love of God poured into our hearts.

You might be thinking, "This all sounds great, but I think I am covered. I have been baptized, received Communion, and been confirmed. I have the Holy Spirit." However, if we look around, we don't always see those who have received their sacraments living like the early disciples did after they received the

Holy Spirit at Pentecost. We have received the Holy Spirit in the sacraments, but we have to stir up the gift we have received.

The common analogy you may have heard is chocolate syrup being poured into milk. You have to stir the syrup in order for it to become chocolate milk. Many people have received the sacraments, but never "stirred up" the Holy Spirit.

How do we stir up the Holy Spirit that lives inside of us? That is the key question. Whenever we make more of an effort to pray, engage our faith, and share our faith, we are stirring up the Holy Spirit within us. However, many of us do try to pray, be engaged in our faith, and share our faith, but our experience is still far different from the early apostles and disciples and saints of history. The early Church exploded with new converts and believers, yet in our time we see our numbers dwindling slowly with each coming year. What is the answer to renewal in the Church?

The answer to renewal in the beginning is the same answer now-more of the Holy Spirit.

One of the most powerful ways to stir up the Holy Spirit in our lives is by attending some form of a Life in the Spirit Seminar. The Life in the Spirit Seminar is not a silver bullet to fix all the problems in the Church, but it does provide an opportunity to learn more about the Holy Spirit, gather together with other believers, and provide an opportunity to pray for a deeper Baptism in the Holy Spirit. We can receive more of the Spirit anywhere, but the principal way we receive more is by coming together in faith and vulnerability, praying for more of the Holy Spirit. I think the single most important thing we can do to bring life and renewal to the Church is for all of us to be baptized in the Spirit. Baptism in the Spirit is not a new sacrament. It is a deeper outpouring of the Holy Spirit and a stirring up of the Spirit we have already received in the sacraments. I cannot fathom where I would be as a believer (and priest!) without the grace of Baptism in the Spirit. I encourage you to attend our upcoming Life in the Spirit seminar starting Thursday, April 21st at 7pm. More info is here in the bulletin! There is also the Upper Cenacle Prayer Group which meets a couple Tuesdays a month as well!

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
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
