

## A Time for Changes

Around this time of year, new priesthood assignments are announced. Many priests stay where they are, but it is also not uncommon for changes to happen. In case you haven't heard, I announced this past weekend that I am receiving a change of assignment. Starting July 1st, I am going to St. Boniface in Edwardsville. I will be the

Parochial Vicar (Assistant Priest), serving with Fr. Jeff Goeckner, the pastor. I will also be assistant chaplain at Fr. McGivney Catholic High School. As I mentioned in my announcement, I am familiar with St. Boniface because I was assigned there as a deacon. Fr. Wayne Stock will be officially assigned here July 1st to take my place, although you will see him

serving here with us all now, as he is currently in residence at Our Lady of Lourdes.

With changes of assignment there is a mixture of emotions. There is sadness about leaving a community you have come to know, love, and serve, but also excitement about what the future holds. I want to thank everyone for their love and support. I have always felt welcomed and appreciated in my almost two years here at Our Lady of Lourdes and St. Thomas. You have supported me in so many ways, whether that be affirmations and conversations after Mass, or heartfelt Christmas and birthday cards. Thank you so much!

At this time of the year, there can be maybe some questions, curiosity, or even frustration about changes of assignments. "Why do changes happen?" The personnel board, composed of the Bishop, some priests, and laypeople, all work together to determine where priests should be assigned. As priests retire or move to other parishes, priests are reassigned according to the needs of the Diocese. There are certainly advantages for a priest to be at a place a long time so that he can come to know people and settle in where he is assigned.

The advantages to moving a priest is to allow for parishes to get to experience a variety of priests, and sometimes moving can give a priest a fresh new

start so that he does not become stagnant. Some priests have certain gifts and personalities that make them a better fit for certain parishes. For newer priests, there is the hope they can get experiences at a variety of parishes to help prepare them to be a pastor. I have mentioned some, but the list is not exhaustive. Some people like the assignment changes that happen, while others might find them confusing. Regardless of what one experiences, the personnel board is composed of many people who truly try to make assignment changes for the best of our Diocese.

Although the overall number of priests is not decreasing at Our Lady of Lourdes and St. Thomas, this time of the year is a good reminder of the importance of praying for vocations to the priesthood. Prayer really makes a difference. It is not a vague wish or mustering up a feeling of hopefulness; prayer is powerful.

Jesus says in Matthew 9:37-38, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest." God wants us to have an abundance of holy priests, but mysteriously enough, it is something he makes conditioned on our prayer. Whenever I say the meal prayer, I add extra prayers after the normal food blessing. It is a great time to add on little intentions and petitions. The vocation prayer that I seriously encourage you and your families to pray after the meal prayer is this, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few-Master, send laborers for your harvest." The first half can be done by the leader, while anyone else present can do the response in bold, or the entire prayer can be prayed together. It takes literally less than 5 seconds, making it a total of 10-15 seconds a day.

In reality, we ought to pray constantly for a renewal in marriages and families. Good and holy priests come from good and holy families. What does it mean to promote vocations to priesthood or religious life, when many families hardly come to Mass? For that reason, I also pray for a renewal in the life of the families (also done after my meal prayer). I do not say this to be negative, but simply to rally us and encourage us to take our prayer efforts seriously! Remember, Jesus has already won the victory!
