

We often want God to be our servant

Ultimately, what does God promise to give us when we pray? The short answer to that question is God. God promises to give Himself to us in prayer. Prayer is about union with God, not receiving favors.

When God comes to us in prayer, His presence comes with faith, hope, and love. When we find these virtues enhanced and nurtured, we know that our prayer has been heard and answered. When we seek out, listen to, and live by these virtues we find ourselves led back to God and more united with the Divine Presence.

Meister Eckhart says, "When man appeals to God, hoping for some worldly good, he is not appealing to God at all, but to what he is asking of God. He is trying to make God his servant." We struggle with what we want God to do and how we want our prayer validated.

Meister Eckhart is correct. We often want God to be our servant. We further struggle with trusting that God knows what we need and that His will is best. That's what makes Jesus' prayer, the Our Father, so perfect. It celebrates a deepening intimate relationship of trust between our Creator and us. When we persistently cry out for God in love, how can that prayer go unanswered?

About Praying

Abraham is persistent in his pleading with the Lord. And the Lord listens and relents. A disciple asks Jesus, after seeing him pray, how to pray.

Jesus gives a form that we use at every Mass and that we hand on to the elect each Lent. He then goes on about persistence in our praying.

- How does my prayer plead for the Kingdom of God to come?
- How does my prayer ask for what I need to do God's mercy work?
- How does my prayer seek and offer forgiveness?



The Power of Intercessory Prayer

In the Book of Genesis, we see the Lord speaking with Abraham about the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah and their sins. The Lord decides to wipe them off the face of the earth, but Abraham asks the Lord to sympathize for not all the people are evil. He begins by asking the Lord to spare them if there are fifty just men in the town and finally persuades the Lord to spare the people if there are but ten just men found there. The Lord listens to the pleas of Abraham and relents each

time. The Psalm is a hymn of thanksgiving to the Lord for listening to the cries of his servant. In our gospel text we see Jesus teaching the disciples how to pray and he gives them the 'Our Father.' He goes on to tell them – through an example – that if anyone calls on God their prayers will not go unanswered. All too often people forget that 'no' is also an answer, as Fr. Ramesh, is silence. In answering our prayers, the Lord does not always give us what we want because what -

we want might not be what we need or for our good. St. Paul tells us that all our sins have been wiped away because they have been nailed to the cross with Christ whose sacrifice sets us free. No matter what we do we always have the Lord on our side, and he is ready to forgive our sins and to answer our prayers whenever we turn to him in faith and trust.

The power of intercessory prayer to bring justice of mercy! Abraham takes it upon himself to plead for mercy on the twin cities, on account of some good souls there. If Abraham bargained with God, Christ's bargain beets all bargains: he does so on behalf of the entire creation, offering up himself in its place. Can God refuse such an intersession? Jesus assures the disciples of the power of intercession, when he narrates the parable of a man who pleads for food for his friend who came visiting. What ever we ask in prayer, especially when it is on behalf of another, is granted; perhaps not exactly as we desire, but far better than we can ever imagine. Let us put in to practice interceding for the needs of those around us. Be an answer to prayer: identify the need of a neighbor and do your best to fulfil it.

When I Called You Answered

Some of us have that friend about whom we are constantly discovering new things. Maybe we've known this person for ten or even twenty years, and one day at lunch we'll find out they're a direct descendant of a dead president or they once met a major celebrity.

"You never asked," they'll say with a shrug.

As annoying as this can be, it makes perfect sense, doesn't it? We never asked. There is something strangely sacred about the act of asking for something. It requires humility. It requires grace. It requires us to be awake, to be aware, to be vulnerable.

Too often we fall into a pattern of entitlement, even when it comes to information. We go through life thinking that a great cosmic conveyor belt of what we want is going to roll on past us, and we'll barely even have to extend our arms. We read our Bible and we hear all these amazing promises from the Father who loves us, and we get sort of complacent. He's got this, we think, and we shut our eyes to take a snooze on the road trip of life, confident that someone else is going to look out for stop signs and wrong turns.

It's true: God's got this. He is going to take care of us. But He wants us to be in relationship with Him. He wants us to be an active, receptive participant in our own salvation. See his patience with Abraham's entreaties on behalf of the righteous of Sodom: He wants to answer, not simply to tell.

He wants us to stay awake for the drive.


