

A WORD FROM FR. RAMESH

Become rich in the sight of God

Jesus invites us to make ourselves rich in the sight of God. The richest man in the valley may not be the one with the most money. Jesus said, "Watch and be on your guard because a man's life is not made secure by what he owns, even when he has more than he needs." (Luke 12:15) Jesus taught the same on other occasions also when he said, "You cannot be the slave of two masters, you cannot serve both God and mammon." (Matt 6:24) On another occasion Jesus said, "Seek first the kingdom of God and all these other things will

be given you as well." (Matt 6:33) How do we seek first the kingdom of God; how do we make ourselves rich in the sight of God? Like so many other things, it all begins in the mind and then affects our lives. So, our attitude is to be one of trust in God instead of trusting in the resources of this world. There are some helpful passages in the Bible to help us grow in trust in God. We could spend a whole lifetime meditating on the first Parochial two lines of Psalm 23; The Lord is my Administrator shepherd; there is nothing I shall want.

There are also some incredible lines in Psalm 16 that help us to trust in God: Preserve me God. I take refuge in you. I say to the Lord: "You are my God. My happiness lies in you alone" ... O Lord it is you who are my portion and cup, it is you yourself who are my prize. Psalm 62 also encourages us to trust in God; In God alone is my soul at rest; my help comes from him. He alone is my rock, my stronghold, my fortress; I stand firm. When we stop and think about why we are on this planet, why God created us, where we will end up when we die, at least some of what we do could be described by the words in the book of Ecclesiastes "Vanity of vanities, the Preacher says. Vanity of vanities. All is vanity." (Eccl 1:2) Jesus invites us to make ourselves rich in the sight of God. The richest man in the valley may not be the one with the most money. Jesus said, "Watch and be on your guard because a man's life is not made secure by what he owns, even when he has more than he needs." (Luke 12:15)

Let us make an act of trust in God. We close our eyes and, in your imagination, see Jesus in front of you. He is looking at you, smiling at you. He invites you to trust in him. Jesus asks you to let go of anything that is keeping you from trusting in him.

- and canned beans.



Reporting Allegations of Child Sexual Abuse

To report allegations of sexual abuse of a minor by clergy or other church personnel—even if it is in the past—individuals are encouraged to call the Diocese's Child Abuse Reporting and Investigation number at 217.321.1155. Q: Why do the Gospels differ in their details? I was surprised to learn that not all of the Gospels tell the same stories, for example, the Nativity.

A: Take any event that happens, from family trips to national politics and ask two or three different people to explain what happened. You will get a different version of the same story. People tend to tell the story from their perspective, and past experience shades what we recall and how we recall it. What details we leave in or out is also influenced by the audience who is listening to our tales.

The Gospel writers are no different. Each one tells the story of Jesus from their own perspective. Versions differ in some details, not because one is true and the other is not, but because each Gospel writer, or Evangelist, has a different theological point to communicate as well as a different audience for whom he is writing. He picks and chooses the details of his Gospel based on what message he is preaching, what his audience may already know, and what message they need to hear. They record of the church's experience and understanding of Jesus.

Let the Parish Pray for Your Intentions




The parish petition book is located on a stand in the chapel under the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. These intentions will be remembered

An American Flag for St. Thomas

Several parishioners have come up with the idea of installing a flagpole with an American flag outside the church at the Northeast entrance. A Dogwood tree had to be removed from there last year and this left a perfect location for the flagpole and a planting around it. The cost would be



\$2,400 for a 24-foot flagpole with lighting. We'll ask for parish volunteers to help install the pole.
