

This has gradually become a big problem with how we see our church leaders – deacons, priests, bishops, cardinals, and popes. For some of us, when we have a new priest in our parish, our first reaction is: is he liberal or conservative?

Whatever the root of this myopic judgmental mindset towards our fellow Catholics, especially our church leaders, one may rightly argue that the misinterpretations of the teachings of Vatican II have something to do with it. In our times, we are forcing Jesus out of our private lives, schools, public places, and other institutions. So, the devil works hard 24/7, looking for souls

and minds to penetrate, manipulate, and destroy. 1Peter 5:8-9.

Many of us, even our church leaders, have allowed the devil to continue to make us misunderstand and misinterpret Vatican II. The Holy Spirit intended this council to help the Church to remain effective in its mission of sanctifying and purifying humanity for the kingdom of God in a fast-changing world. By misinterpreting its teachings, we have failed woefully in emulating the lives of our great ancestors in the faith, the saints. These men and women of optimistic disposition and goodwill allowed their times' sinful and challenging events to motivate them to holiness and greatness.

One of such great ancestors in our Catholic Christian faith is St. Gregory the Great. This beautiful soul was already the prefect of Rome even before the age of 30. Coming from a wealthy and very educated background, young Gregory did not allow the material allurements of this deceitful world to distract him from preparing a place for himself in heaven.

There are too many great things about St. Gregory the Great. Too worthy of mention in this article is

how he responded to the sinful event he witnessed at the Roman Forum. Gregory saw the English people sold into slavery in the Roman Forum. He was moved to compassion and determined to empower the English people by Christianizing them. He achieved this by sending St. Augustine of Canterbury and several other monks as missionaries who ministered and taught the British people. Through the spiritual and material auspices of St. Gregory, these holy monks moved the British people from slavery to being a world power for centuries. I don't think Gregory was either a liberal or a conservative. He was just a child of God, a holy catholic.

Parish Update

Last Thursday, August 25th, I met with our parish pastoral council – a group of 14 fine men and women, including our Deacon Kevin. For those unaware of this committee, every parish is encouraged to have a parish pastoral council that acts as an advisory body to the pastor/parochial administrator. They meet with their priest as needed or several times a year.

Being new here, I needed to meet with this committee to discuss the state of the parish and the rectory. After a general update on the church and rectory buildings, we discussed having the contracted housekeeper clean the rectory weekly instead of biweekly. We also discussed replacing the stove and repairing the kitchen sink. We also deliberated on renovating one of the suites upstairs for the priest. While the pastoral council has discussed these things and unanimously agreed to do them, I will still meet with the parish finance council next week. The finance council has the power to either approve or disapprove any renovation.

The pastoral council also recommended moving the daily Mass to the morning as it had been until about a year ago and returning the Saturday vigil Mass. I moved the daily Mass to mornings at 8:15am Monday-Thursday from September 5th (Labor Day). But for the return of the Saturday Vigil Mass, for several reasons, we agreed not to return it for now.

Finally, I proposed an all-day Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on the first Fridays of every month from 9:00am to 5:00pm starting from Friday, 9/2/2022. They all agreed and encouraged it.


