

The persistent prayer of which Jesus speaks is the prayer of the heart. This contemplative, silent, loving prayer gives us the vision to see God in all things, especially in each human soul. Desiring God alone and not only what we want God to do for us places this love relationship foremost in our minds, hearts, and souls. This alone can provide the strength of endurance to confront anything contrary to the truth of faith.

Embracing the Change: Pope Saint John XXIII

Change is a word that almost half of humanity does not like. Many people would want it to disappear

from the dictionary. The word change evokes a feeling of insecurity and powerlessness over the things, ideas, places, beliefs, and people we cherish. Our excessive emotional attachments to any of these makes change one of the most reviled vocabularies in many human languages.



However, change is a two-edged sword. It is not always clear if a change will be good or bad. But, as people of faith and hope, we

must carefully discern a change, be positive about it, and be ready to embrace it. Beyond these, we should also be willing to make changes as individuals, groups, and societies.

Last Tuesday, October 11, 2022, we celebrated the feast of Saint John XXIII, the pope who convened Vatican II. After the first and second world wars and their terrible impacts on humanity, the world was responding amidst hopelessness, fear, and a growing religious skepticism. In the midst of all these and the lingering cold wars, Pope John XXIII summoned the most critical meeting of the century to help the church respond to the miserable state of the human condition according to the signs of the times.

Unfortunately, almost sixty years after the Council, many have failed to understand, respect, and embrace the reforms that the council advocates. Some of us continue to hold on to the former ways, while others resort to misinterpreting and misrepresenting the teachings of Vatican II to suit their whimsical desires and ideologies inconsistent with the church's teachings.

May Pope Saint John XXIII intercede for us and obtain for us the grace to accept the beautiful teachings of the Council and shun the practices and teachings that are inconsistent with the teachings of our Lord and his Apostles. Amen.
