God knows no favorites — all are broken and need mercy

To be humble means to see ourselves as we are. It comes with the recognition that we are never perfect, better than another, or free of sin. The humble person knows their faults and failings as well as their successes and triumphs.

They also realize that they are nothing without God, especially God's mercy. The humble one knows who they are, who they can be, and how they have fallen short. Being desperately in love with God, they know how they have sometimes given in to their desires rather than God's will, almost with a sense of embarrassment.

Being justified in our relationship with God is not about a list of the good things we do and the bad things we don't. We are vindicated when we realize how totally dependent we are upon God's gratuitous, abundant, and unconditional love. It is a gift we often take for granted and is often unappreciated.

God knows no favorites. Everyone belongs regardless of whether you are an official, bona fide member. The genuinely humble ones may not appear to be overly "pious." They may not know all of the proper prayers or abide by all of the correct rituals, but they know that they are broken and need mercy. There is a reason Jesus told us to pray in private. It's only between you and God.

Jesus wants us to take the humble way in prayer and action

Have you ever felt like you were better than others and your way is the right way? Most of us have at some time or other. In today's Gospel Jesus reminds us that it is not about being perfect but about always working to be better.

In the parable, Jesus compares two men who went up to the temple to pray. One's prayer was filled with pride about all the good he had done and rules he had followed. The other, humbly prayed for mercy and to do better.

Lord, teach us to be humble in our thoughts, words, and deeds to learn from each other and support each other always. Amen.



Feast of Saint Luke the Evangelist

We celebrated the feast of Saint Luke the Evangelist last Tuesday. He was one of the second-generation Christians who did not have any physical contact with Jesus. But Luke had direct

contact with many firstgeneration Christians, including the apostles like St Paul, whom he worked very closely with as a companion and fellow minister of the gospel.



The evangelists Matthew and John wrote their accounts of the life and ministry of Jesus from their first-hand experiences and information about Jesus. But Mark and Luke

wrote theirs from the information they gathered from the apostles and other first-generation Christians that had direct encounters with Jesus Christ.

While these four evangelists - Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, wrote beautifully about the same life and ministry of Jesus Christ, each is unique in many ways. Their uniqueness as people from different cultural, family, socioeconomic, and political backgrounds played a role in their accounts of the life and ministry of Jesus.

Matthew was a highly educated Jewish man from Galilee who worked closely with the authorities of the Roman Empire and served as a tax collector before he met and followed Jesus. John was the brother of James. They are Jewish men and sons of Zebedee from Jerusalem. He probably had the closest contact with lesus of all the disciples as he was with Christ even unto His crucifixion in Calvary. Mark was from Cyrene, a town in North Africa. Like Luke, Mark was both an immigrant to the Jewish world and a second-generation Christian. But he worked very closely with Peter the head of the apostles, from whom he gathered most, if not all, of the information in his gospel. And finally is Luke, a physician, and an immigrant. He worked very closely with both St. Peter and St. Paul.

The fascinating thing about St. Luke is that by reading his gospel, one can easily understand the identity and background of the author as a physician and an immigrant. His gospel shows special love and attention for the sick and the poor. Reading the gospel of Luke, one may understand Jesus almost exclusively as the savior for the poor and the sick. It is not a surprise. As a physician, he devotedly cared for the sick, and as an immigrant, he understood the plight of the poor. So, in his gospel, he had the sick and the poor in mind in a particular way. Scripture scholars like Clayton Jefford and Pablo Gadenz believe that Luke's primary audience was the gentile immigrants, among whom were the sickest and poor in the Iewish society of the time. May Saint Luke continue to intercede for us. Amen.



Bible study every Tuesday morning


Looking to grow in your faith? You're invited! Bible study group meets every Tuesday at 9:15 a.m. after morning Mass. Currently,
