


FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The Three States of the Church

Members of the Church exist in three states of life. The first state is the Militant State. Members of this state are those of us alive and active in our Catholic faith. In this state, the Church regularly nourishes us with the sacraments and the word of God.

We fight every day for the salvation of our souls by living good lives and being spiritually and materially charitable to ourselves, our families, friends, neighbors, and our church communities.

The second state of the Church is the Penitential State. The members of this state are our brothers. and sisters who lived well in this life, fought the good fight of faith, and finished their race but are not clean enough to see the face of God. So, they must spend some time in purgatory to get more perfectly purified to see the face of God. On Wednesday, November 2nd, we will have a special Mass at 5:15 pm to pray for them. Please join us in this Mass! They are the people we celebrate on "All Souls Day" every November 2nd.

The third and final state of the Church is the Triumphal State. Members of this state are our brothers and sisters who lived this life well. They observed the ten commandments, received the sacraments regularly, and were materially and spiritually charitable. Some of these people might have spent some time in purgatory before finally arriving in heaven. St. Thomas the Apostle, our Patron, is one of them. We celebrate these saints every 1st of November - the Feast of All Saints.

May St. Thomas the Apostle and all the saints pray for us. Amen.


