

Joseph Speaks to an Angel in his Dream

In our Bible study last Tuesday after morning Mass, we discussed how Joseph's dream encounter with the angel must have left him completely stunned. Maybe he woke up and asked himself, "Did I really speak to an angel? Was it real?"

Ultimately, the simple carpenter from Nazareth let himself be guided by the undeniable will of God: He took Mary as his wife. The ancient prophecy was then fulfilled: "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel, which means 'God is with us.'"

Accounts of the Birth of Jesus

We know that the infancy stories of Jesus were among the last parts of the Gospel to be formulated and that only two evangelists considered Jesus' human origins important enough to



preserve them in their Gospels.

Matthew begins Jesus' story by acknowledging the scandal: Mary was found to be with child. Matthew adds "through the Holy Spirit" as a note to the reader. Joseph confronts the raw fact of the pregnancy and then receives the offer to interpret it in faith through his actions.

As the Gospel reading this year for the fourth Sunday in Advent, it invites us to join with Joseph in his risky adventure of faith. Perhaps the core of Matthew's narrative is the angel's greeting: "Do not be afraid."

Of what should Joseph not be afraid?

- Of breaking the law, which demanded punishment for a pregnancy outside of marriage.
- Of taking Mary and, of course, her unborn child into his home, and therefore into the rest of his life.
- Of believing the unbelievable and walking confidently into the unknown.

Joseph did what only a man of faith would choose to do. He opened his life to Emmanuel. We receive the same invitation. — *Deacon Kevin*

Q: What is the Hispanic Advent custom of "Las Posadas"?



A: "Posada" is the Spanish word for inn or lodging. "Las Posadas" refers to a traditional Advent custom in preparation for the birth of Jesus, beginning on December 16. For nine successive evenings, groups reenact the search of Mary and Joseph for shelter in Bethlehem.

Two children dress as Mary and Joseph, sometimes with Mary riding on an actual donkey. They are usually accompanied by children dressed as angels and shepherds along with the Wise Men. Adults accompany them as they process to designated homes where they sing Christmas songs and request lodging. In the beginning the request is rebuffed. They move to several more homes where the ritual is repeated. Eventually, at the last home, their need is recognized, and they all enter the home where a party ensues. This is repeated in different neighborhoods and homes each of the nine days.

While this custom teaches children an important aspect of the Christmas story, it also emphasizes the need for hospitality to strangers and the continual need we all have to make room for Jesus in our "posada." As we struggle to arrive at a fair and just immigration policy, it would be good to recall the fact that Mary, Joseph, and Jesus were also immigrants looking for a hospitable place to dwell.
