What is unique about the way Catholics are exposed to the Bible at Mass?

Catholics are exposed to Scripture primarily through the Sunday readings from a book known as the Lectionary. The Lectionary is a book of selected passages from the Bible set in the context of a liturgical season, such as Advent, Lent, or ordinary time. There are four readings assigned to any Sunday: the first reading (usually from the Old Testament), the responsorial psalm, the second reading (usually from a New Testament letter), and the Gospel reading.

These readings together give them a new context. The selected readings relate to one another in a unique manner that is not present in the Bible text itself. Together, these readings now have the opportunity to relate to each other in a way that would have not been possible before. A homilist pays attention to all four readings, preparing a reflection that speaks of this conversation among the readings, enabling us to zero in on what this unique combination of God's word has to say to us this particular Sunday.

Next time you attend Sunday liturgy, try reading the Scripture ahead of time and see how this new relationship among the readings addresses and challenges you to be a better Christian here and now.

Are our eyes open?

John the Baptist had been told that he would see the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. And so, he kept his eyes open for the Word.

John the Baptist sees Jesus coming toward him and announces, "Behold the lamb of God." His Jewish listeners knew what he meant. God's lamb is the thing that is sacrificed at the Jewish Passover and consumed by the participants.

The Baptist was saying in effect, "This man will be ritually sacrificed and consumed so that God's people may be free from sin and united to God."



Behold, the Lamb of God!

In the Gospel this Sunday, we come across one of the most dominant phrases in the scriptures – "Behold, the Lamb of God!" John the Evangelist recorded this visionary exclamation. But it was the forerunner of Jesus, John the Baptist, who made

this prophetic utterance when he saw Jesus coming toward him and his followers. Proclaiming Jesus as the Lamb of God and pointing him to his followers, the Baptist also explained whom Jesus was to his followers when he added: "...behold he who takes away the sins of the world" (John 1:29).

The followers of John the Baptist have heard about Jesus from John, from earlier

prophets, and from sacred texts before that incident. But their whole world changed when John showed them Jesus, as the Messiah, the Lamb of God. Some of them would leave John almost immediately to follow Jesus. Some would leave John to go into the towns and villages to announce what had happened. Still, others would take some time, either with John or back on their own, to contemplate the mystery proclaimed to them. For them to behold with their eyes the fulfillment of the prophecies, the Savior who was to come and save the whole of humanity from their sins, is both

a mystery and a miracle. But what is unique about John the Baptist's prophetic proclamation of Jesus as the Lamb of God?

By proclaiming Jesus the Lamb of God to his followers, the Baptist has left us all (Christians) an example to follow. In our baptism, we were all made prophets. Sharing in that prophetic ministry, we have all been commissioned to lead people to Jesus. We must attract others with our good and exemplary lives of faith and holiness. Then direct them to Jesus – the Lamb of God, as John the Baptist did.

Our priests share more fully in this prophetic ministry. They have been commissioned in a more special way to lead us to Jesus daily in their lives and in the eucharistic celebration, where they elevate Jesus at the altar and proclaim: Behold the Lamb of God!
