Earthquakes Rock Turkey and Syria Help families today with critical relief

On February 6, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake devastated large areas of central Turkey and northwest Syria. The death toll has surpassed 40,000 and continues to climb. Later that day, the region experienced a second magnitude 7.7 quake.

Catholic Relief Services will support emergency relief efforts led by local partners in both Syria and Turkey with Caritas Internationalis, Caritas Syria in Aleppo and Lattakia—where extensive damage has been reported—and other local partners.

Already in Turkey, Caritas Internationalis, in coordination with authorities, is bringing displaced people to safe, open spaces and distributing hot meals and clothing.

Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound

There have been a few questions regarding the announcement of taking the Holy Communion to the sick and homebound last weekend. The questions we have received and the conversations

we have heard this past week about the topic have been beautiful and constructive. Please, remember to reach out for more clarification on the subject.



The Holy Eucharist is the centrality of our faith – it is our Lord Jesus Christ in consecrated hosts. So, we will do well to continually ensure best practices with the receiving, administering, and understanding of the Holy Eucharist.

The announcement was about taking only the right number of Holy Communions to our sick and homebound brothers and sisters. It is forbidden to take Holy Communions in excess and store them in our homes, cars, and other places.


The lingering practice of keeping Holy Communions in our homes for private adorations or daily distribution can be a sacrilege when it is done willfully, knowing that it is forbidden.

The Holy Communion, our Lord Jesus Christ in consecrated hosts, is not a piece of cake to express kindness nor a sacramental for private devotion.

Some people say they received permission to take Holy Communions in excess of what they administer to the sick and homebound on the same day and for private adorations. But after contacting the diocese this past week, the diocese explained that the bishop had not given such permission to any person (priest or lay faithful). He is the only one that can give such permission in rare circumstances. Eucharistic ministers are highly encouraged to continue their beautiful works of bringing Jesus to our sick and homebound brothers and sisters. We are only encouraging them to do this in ways that show reverence and uphold the sacredness of our Blessed Lord in eucharistic species.

Please call the parish office if you need help administering or getting Holy Communions for your sick or homebound. Deacon Kevin and I are glad to help.

Penitential Disciplines of Lent

In addition to choosing their own penitential practices, Catholics are also asked to observe the practices of fast and abstinence during the 40 days of Lent. The Lenten Fast and Abstinence Regulations are as follows:

1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to **abstain from meat** on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

2. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is bound to **fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday**. (The obligation of fasting ceases with the celebration of one's 59th birthday.)

3. Fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday means eating only one full, meatless meal. Two other smaller, meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal.

Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices, are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

4. Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed minimal penitential practices.


St. Teresa Scholarship Dinner Thanks
