

Reflecting on Baptism and Temptations

The gospel recounts that Jesus, filled with the Holy Spirit, is led by that same Spirit into the desert – a place for reflection and prayer. And hunger. And temptations by diabolos, the false accuser. What happens? Strengthened by baptism at which he is called "beloved", temptations are resisted – not easily, but resisted nonetheless. The Reality of Suffering

During the season of Lent, suffering is one of the most predominant themes. We know that our faith as Catholic Christians is about Jesus Christ – a man whose short life on earth was characterized by intense suffering. Our faith is centered on him because we are baptized in him and want to live a

life pleasing to him while preparing to live forever with him in heaven someday.

Suffering is the state of undergoing pain, distress, or hardship. It is a reality in the human condition. Everyone suffers but sometimes differently. Failing exams or failing in our relationships and businesses, jobs, and vocations and losing a loved one to death, losing a game, a lottery, a job, a position, power, and friendship,

and experiencing hateful treatment, rejection, snub, or abuse and feeling unloved by people we love, longing to have or see something or someone and never realizing it and experiencing sickness, loneliness, abandonment, poverty, emptiness, and hunger. Any of these can cause a great deal of suffering.

Since suffering is a reality that people (poor and rich, young and old, wise and dumb) of all gender, ethnicity, religion, culture, and race experience, it is better to understand it is something we should prepare for and not something to dread.

As Christians, we must prepare for suffering. That means living the life of Christ - that life in which every suffering has a meaning and is directed to a noble goal. Jesus found meaning in his suffering – that he was never alone in all he underwent. Our heavenly father was always with him. And he directed all his suffering to saving sinful humanity from damnation. As we journey with Jesus more intimately this Lenten season, let us make our sufferings meaningful. May we offer our sufferings for our private intentions and those of our family, loved ones, communities, and societies. May our Lord Jesus Christ, who suffered and left us an example of how to suffer with him, give us the courage and strength to embrace our sufferings. May he always transform our sufferings for our spiritual growth this Lenten season. Amen.


St. Jude's Novena
