

The Master Has Need of Them

Last week during our Passion Sunday, I reflected on Jesus's instruction to the disciples in Matthew 21:2-3. The instruction is this: "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately you will find a donkey tethered and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them here to me. And if anyone should say anything to you, reply, 'The master has need of them.'"

I reflected that Jesus's ordering of the donkey and the colt to be brought to him elucidates the fact

that while the donkey and the colt belonged to an earthly owner (steward), they belonged ultimately to God. God owns all that we have and are. And whenever he has need of any of his belongings, we must not hesitate to give them back. Be it our lives, properties, skills, wealth, or knowledge.

Q: Why do we bless ourselves with holy water when we enter church?

A: Holy water is a sacramental, a reminder of the life of the Church expressed and celebrated through the sacraments.

On Ash Wednesday, we receive ashes on our foreheads to remind us of our origins, humbly created from the dust. But by blessing ourselves with holy water, we are reminded of Easter and our baptism — our rising from the waters of death to life! We are baptized sons and daughters of God.

This is also a call to conversion, to live more fully our baptismal call to live as disciples of Jesus. Blessing ourselves with holy water reminds us that we are baptized into a community faith, and always in need of turning from sin and toward God. Holy water is a visible sign of our baptism!



When we awoke this morning, we found ourselves blessed with another day. It is Easter Sunday. As that thought crossed our minds, did we find ourselves saying "so what" or "alleluia"? For many, today is truly a day of alleluia. For others, it is just another day of "so what." Faith makes a huge difference. It

not only makes a difference in how we understand today and the significance of what we celebrate. it also makes a huge difference in terms of how we understand ourselves.



Succeed, live well, be productive, find your niche, follow your dreams, make money, protect your social status, be politically correct, and keep your preferences to yourself are pretty good examples of the messages our secular life wants us to hear. In and of themselves, they don't sound all that harmful. But when really examined, they are. The life of resurrection embodied in the Gospel tells us a much different story.

Sadly, we live as if the grave is the end. While we may give the wonder of heaven a blink now and then, its glory really doesn't impress us or matter all that much. It's all about the here and now and what I need to do today to get where I want to be tomorrow. We tend to put off considering the one significant "tomorrow" that will come the millisecond after we take our last breath. When that happens, will we want to be thinking "so what?" or "alleluia"?

There is only one Jesus, one mission, and one resurrection. There is also only one of us. Have you ever pondered what one solitary, humble human life can do? Faith, not our world, tells us how special we are. We are not robots. We are not replaceable. We have one shot. There are no do-overs. Love is at our core and unites us together as one with the God of love who so desperately wants us to be with Him forever. This may not match our secular agenda, but it ought to make our true inner agenda leap for joy. There doesn't need to be an end. I can live forever. Alleluia!

Jesus, heal the victims of crime. They live with the scars. Lift to eternal peace those who die. Grant victims' families the forgiveness that heals.


