

Peace and pardon

The disciples of the Lord, in great fear, locked themselves away in the upper room. Jesus breaks in upon them to declare two realities.

To be at peace is first – from him, the Father, and the Holy Spirit. To extend pardon is second – given not just to the Twelve but to all the followers. Four of the spiritual works of mercy fall into this pardoning need. There is much we can do.

- What have we to fear?
- How can I bring peace to my home and work?
- What delicate work of pardon and forgiveness will fill my words and actions?



Mary Magdalene's Gratitude to Jesus

One of the virtues we often do not talk about is gratitude. Yet, this virtue gave Mary Magdalene the unequaled privilege of being the first to hear the voice of Christ and see his face after the Resurrection.

We read in John 8:1-11 the story of Mary Magdalene, how she was caught in adultery and

about to be stoned to death by some scribes and Pharisees. The Jewish custom of the time required that anyone seen in adultery be stoned to death. But before the scribes and Pharisees brought Mary Magdalene to Jesus, they had already decided to stone her to death.

But desperately looking for charges against Jesus, they came to see if he would contradict the law of Moses.

Unfortunately for the scribes and Pharisees, Jesus neither opposed the law of Moses nor approved of their hypocrisy.

Instead, Jesus responded to Mary Magdalene's 'hopeless' situation in a way that the hypocrites could not stand the shame and emotional torment they felt when Jesus charged anyone who had no sin to first throw their stone against Mary Magdalene. They were all guilty of the same sin for which they wanted to stone Mary Magdalene to death.

Saving Mary Magdalene from the hands of the scribes and Pharisees, Jesus charged her to go and sin no more. From that moment, Mary Magdalene will love and care about Jesus out of a deep sense of gratitude for saving her life from the hands of the hypocrites. She did this even to the point of taking the risk of spending multiple hours at the tomb of Jesus. Those who put Jesus to death guarded the grave in such a way that it was dangerous for any of his followers to near the tomb. But out of deep gratitude, Mary Magdalene took that risk going back and forth visiting the tome and was rewarded with being the first to hear the voice of Jesus and see his face after the Resurrection, even before the twelve apostles.

Gratitude to Jesus for his blessings in our lives is a virtue that can attract more blessings to us. Let us, by our words and actions to one another, express our gratitude to Jesus every day for our family and loved ones, our catholic faith, material possessions, and accomplishments. For our good health and the experiences that have made us who we are today.
