


No Friday Masses

Solemnity of Corpus Christi

Today we celebrate the solemnity of Corpus Christi. Corpus Christi is a Latin translation of the Body of Christ. This solemnity is abbreviated as Corpus Christi, but in full, it will be Corpus et Sanguis Christi (The Body and Blood of Christ). As a solemnity, it ranks among the highest feasts in the Church. This solemnity commemorates in a unique way the very essence of our eucharistic celebrations whenever we gather for Mass. It celebrates the Body and Blood of Christ, which are

what we celebrate at every Mass, and which is at the center of every theology and faith-related study in the Catholic Church.

Everything we read in the scriptures, especially the New Testament, points to the Body and Blood of Christ as given to us freely for our salvation. But when we want a deeper understanding of this mystery, we focus on the four Gospels. Specifically, the sixth Gospel of

John verses 22 to 59. In this passage, titled "The Bread of Life Discuss," the beloved apostle takes us deep into the mystery of the Eucharist as the greatest gift of Christ to humanity as long as our salvation is concerned. In verses 53 and 54 of the passage, John recounts Jesus' emphasis on our reception of the eucharist: "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day."

Many of us make incredible efforts to attend Mass every Sunday, even every day, for a handle of us. But how many of us believe that what we receive in the Eucharist is the actual body and blood of Christ? A conviction that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist is critical for a life of faith and discipleship in the Catholic Church. There are many ways to know whether we have this conviction, no matter how we want to rationalize or justify our shortcomings.

Receiving the Eucharist with little or no reverence, as though a piece of cake; chatting carelessly inside the Church while others are praying to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament; receiving the Eucharist and making no efforts to leave sinful lifestyles; being adamant about the needs of our parish Church and our neighbors, even when we have something to give; remaining intentionally ignorant of the Church's teachings on the Eucharist and living hateful and judgmental lives as communicants. These are among the possible signs that one does not necessarily believe in the presence of Jesus Christ in the eucharistic species.

May God grant us, through the celebration of this Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, a burning desire to see Jesus truly as he is in the Eucharist. Amen.
