

Three Years in the Priesthood of Christ

What a blessing to have been a priest these last three years! Tomorrow, June 19, 2023, my seven classmates in the Diocese and I will be three years in the priesthood. Fr. Dominic Vahling in

Springfield; Fr. Michael Berndt in Effingham; Fr. Piotr Kosk in Taylorville; Fr. Pawel Luczak in Newton; Fr. Michael Meinhart in Nokomis: Fr Michael Trummer in Edwardsville, Fr. David Beagles in Robinson; and I here in Decatur.

The priesthood is a mystery, but we can glimpse of what it is when we prayerfully read Hebrew 5:1-14. In this passage, the author explains that it is not a profession that anyone can

pursue but a vocation that one can only receive from God to offer oneself for the service of the people of God. Aaron in the Old Testament and others like Samuel received this call.

In the New Testament, having instituted the sacred priesthood at the Last Supper (Matthew 26:26-30; Mark 14:22-26; Luke 22:14-20), the apostles became the first people that Jesus called to the priesthood to continue His saving ministry (Christus prolongatus) on earth. In the two thousand years history of our Catholic faith, Christ has raised priests from every race and tongue, people, and nation to continue this saving ministry.

The priesthood as a vocation has always been challenging as it requires the entirety of the one who answers the call. And because we live in times where priesthood has become the sole target of the devil and his human, organizational, and institutional agents, the priesthood is fast becoming undesirable. The mistakes and failures of some of our brother priests have worsened this





problem. Unfortunately, Satan seems to be gradually achieving his goal of ridding humanity of the Catholic priesthood.

But thankfully, the good example and witness of many of our priests in the diocese, the holy and courageous leadership that our diocese has enjoyed these last thirteen years of Bishop Paprocki's episcopacy, has done us so much good in the diocese. In addition to about thirty young priests that Bishop Paprocki has ordained for our diocese since 2010, we also have about thirteen young men in the seminary preparing for the priesthood.

On the third anniversary of my priesthood, I sincerely ask for your prayers for me and my seven classmates and our bishop, priests, and seminarians. Pray also for our deacons and religious brothers and sisters in the Diocese. Let God's grace, love, and mercy always be abundant in our lives and ministries, and all the people entrusted to our pastoral and spiritual care will continue to experience the love of God in their lives. Q: Does it matter what leg you kneel on when genuflecting?



A: Genuflection is an act of

devotion that literally means "to bend the knee." For many Catholics, it's an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection.

The practice of "bending the knee" is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting, becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist. In our tradition, although many have been taught or prefer to genuflect by placing their right knee on the ground, there is no prescribed way to genuflect. This is especially important to keep in mind if physical limitations or age make certain movements difficult for us.

Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during eucharistic adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept.


