

Do Not Deny Me Before Others

Today, we read from the Gospel of Matthew 10:26-33. The revised edition of the New American Bible (NABRE) gives today's gospel passage the title: "Courage Under Persecution." At the beginning of the chapter, we read about the mission of the Twelve as Christ entrusted it to them. Next is the commissioning of the Twelve. After commissioning them and instructing the apostles on where to go for their missions and what to do, Christ told them about the coming persecutions. Seeing how afraid

they were becoming, Christ charged them to be courageous under persecution. But the last thing he said to them in that passage, which we read at today's Mass, is: "But whoever denies me before others, I will deny before my heavenly Father (Matthew 10:33).

After seeing how fearful the apostles were becoming and charging them to be courageous Parochial in proclaiming him in word and Administrator deed in all the corners of the

world, Jesus concluded the session with a threat. This is what a literal reading of the passage may suggest. But the Bible is not a novel or an ordinary literature book. So, we don't read it as such. Instead, as the living book that it is, we read it prayerfully and meditatively, attracting the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to understand what Christ intends for us.

Christ will deny before the Father whoever denies him before others means that when we deny him in the world, he becomes absent is us. Then, when we appear before the Father at the judgment and the spirit of Christ is lacking in us, God will not attend to us. His Son that has been given to us is to mark us for salvation. When that mark of salvation is absent, one should not expect salvation.

Now, how do we deny Christ before others? When we pick and choose what we want to believe and not believe in the teachings of the Church - the Bride of Christ. Living as hypocrites and making no effort to repent from our sinful habits. The habit of living in and bearing grudges without effort to

forgive people who offend us. Selfishness with one's intellectual and material wealth with refusal to use them to better the lives of others. To be unnecessarily critical of others in and out of season, even when living in more severe sins. Allowing political correctness to determine where and how one practices their faith. Our participation at Masses and other spiritual services of our faith only when convenient.

These are some ways we can kick Christ out of our lives. Then, when we appear before God in judgment, He will not find the mark of salvation in us, which is Christ himself. This is what Christ means by: "But whoever denies me before others, I will deny before my heavenly Father."

May God grant us the grace and courage to acknowledge him in word and deed this week and all the rest of our lives. Amen. Have a blessed week ahead!

Q: What is Lectio Divina, and how is it associated with the Benedictine Monastic tradition ?



A: Benedict desired his monks to live in community, praying the Liturgy of the Hours together, contemplating sacred texts, and doing manual labor. The monks developed a technique to facilitate a spiritual and devotional reading of the Bible known as Lectio Divina, the holy reading of a text. This method encourages the reader to hear the biblical text with an open heart and focus on whatever God wants to highlight and then apply it to daily life.

There are variations on Lectio Divina, but essentially, the technique consists of a threestep process of reflection. When the reflection is done with a group, the responses are shared by all the participants.

Once the text is selected, it is read meditatively, and the following are then explored: a word or phrase that attracts you; how and where the content of this reading touches your life today; what you believe that God wants you to do during this coming week (month, year, lifetime).

Thanks to Benedict, the Christian community has been gifted with this special way of entering into the biblical text. This week, use the Lectio Divina process on one of the readings for the coming Sunday and make a note of how this reflection is drawing you closer to God and others.




If you would like to have a weekday or weekend Mass offered for a deceased loved one or friend, or for another intention, please call
