CONTEMPLATE

What are you supposed to do about the bad behavior of the people around you? You know who I'm talking about. That family member, friend, coworker, or acquaintance who is quite immoral. On this front there are two lively options in our culture: bash the person to others (probably online) or pretend everything's fine. The former damages the person. The latter ignores reality. What to do? Jesus' strategy in the Gospel of Matthew is as wise as it is difficult: go directly to the person, and then gradually expand the circle of intervention. Simple, often effective, and hard. But what we often miss is the context of the Lord's strategy, "If your brother sins *against* you..." Notice the italicized words. Is the person in a Christian familial bond with you? And was the action in question against you? If so, proceed with the plan. Fine. But how often we fret over the sins of those who either aren't our spiritual siblings or have done nothing directly to us. This is not an invitation to ignore injustice in the world. Rather, we should build bonds of fraternal love, and carefully discern when and how others' sins are indeed our concern. Sometimes they are. Other times — frequently, perhaps — they simply are not.

The Joharis Window

A couple of weeks ago, I used the Joharis window psychological theory in my homily, discussing knowing oneself (self-awareness). It seemed like that homily spoke to more people than usual – so much so that I have received many requests for a copy of that homily.

Unfortunately, I do not write my homilies. I prepare them prayerfully over the Blessed Sacrament and on my study desk and deliver them unwritten. Let me recapitulate the Joharis window here.



The Joharis window is a psychological theory (more of a technique anyway) developed by Joseph Luft and Harry Ingham in

1955. Joseph Luft and Harry Ingham were good friends who were born in the same year, 1916. Being young adults and college students during the Second World War, these men had firsthand experience of the unspeakable damages that the war caused. Many people know about the deaths the war caused at home and abroad. Still, few people know the insurmountable psychological damage the war caused to too many people. Many soldiers who came back alive after the war, their families, and the families of the fallen heroes would spend the rest of their lives suffering unprecedented psychological disturbances. Since many of the advances that psychology has made today were absent then, too many people suffered these mental health issues associated with the traumatic experiences of the war with no relief until they died.

In that era of scampering helter-skelter to find solutions to these mental health issues, Joseph Luft and his friend, Harry Ingham, both psychologists, developed the Joharis window. This window is a 4box matrix that looks at what is known and unknown to the self and others. Luft and Ingham's original window has the open area (known to the self and others), the blind spot (unknown to the self but known to others), the hidden area (Unknown to others but known to the self), and the unknown area (unknown both to the self and to others). In my slight modification of the theory from a Christian point of view, I renamed the unknown area to the "ultimate area" since it is known to God. I also added that God knows the rest of the areas, including the ultimate spot where he has hidden such details as our departure dates from bodily existence.

This theory is good for self-awareness. I would recommend it to anyone who cares about making a journey of self-discovery in which we understand the limits to what we can and cannot know about ourselves and others. For more details on the theory, please look it up online. Have a blessed week ahead.

Silver Rose Service

Please plan to attend a special Rosary service sponsored by the Knights of Columbus at Holy Family Catholic Church on Monday, September 11 at 6:00 PM.

Mother Mary appeared to Juan Diego on December 9, 1531. Mary instructed him to have a church built in her honor at that site. Bishop Zumarraga asked for proof of the apparition. Mary provided out of season flowering roses not native to the area along with a portrait of herself imprinted on the inside of Juan Diego's cloak.

The Silver Rose is a traveling icon which commemorates Our Lady of Guadalupe's appearance to Juan Diego. The Silver Rose symbolizes Mother Mary's dedication to the sanctity of human life as we ask for Her intercession to restore the respect for human life throughout the world.

The Story Behind "What A Friend We Have In Jesus"



Joseph Medlicott Scriven (1819–1886) was born in Seapatrick, Ireland (now Northern Ireland,). He fell in love with a young lady who was eager to spend her life with him. However, on the day before their wedding she fell from her horse while crossing a bridge over the River Bann and was drowned in the water below. Scriven stood helplessly watching from the other side.

To try to overcome his grief, he moved to Woodstock, Canada West (now Ontario) in 1844, where he led a Plymouth Brethren fellowship and taught. He organized a private school in 1850 in Brantford and preached in the area.

Moving near Clinton in Huron County in 1855, he read the Bible to railway construction workers who were building the Grand Trunk Railway across the Canada West. By 1857, he relocated to Bewdley, supporting himself as a private tutor to the family of Robert Lamport Pengelly, a retired naval officer.

It was there he met a wonderful young lady, Elisa Catherine Roche, and again fell in love. They had exciting plans to be married. However, tragedy struck once again and she died of pneumonia before they could wed. Scriven then returned to ministry among the Plymouth Brethren in Bewdley, near Rice Lake.

On an occasion when Scriven became ill, a friend who was visiting with him discovered a poem near his bed and asked who had written it. Scriven said, "The Lord and I did it between us." He might have written the poem for his mother when she was ill, but it is clear that he did not intend for anyone else to see it.


On August 10, 1886, Scriven's body was pulled from a spring near Bewdly, Ontario. Two monuments have been erected in his honor. Each has the first stanza of his song engraved on it. Charles Converse, an attorney and composer, wrote the music used today.

Joseph Scriven was not born to greatness. He was a simple man who, like many of us, suffered tragic losses. But he did not lose faith in God, he continued to help his neighbors, and wrote the words to one of the most famous religious songs.
