

CONTEMPLATE

When I was in second grade, my prized possession was a metal Star Wars-themed lunch box. After school one day, another student ripped it from my hands. I helplessly watched in horror as my classmate threw it to the ground and violently stomped it into an unrecognizable heap of junk. I came home covered in tears of shame and rage. After a few months, I never thought about it again until I was almost thirty years old and on a retreat to prepare for ordination to the priesthood. That childhood memory — and the attendant outrage — came back afresh. My spiritual director helped me through the grace of Jesus, to forgive the debt. Almost immediately I felt a new peace.

We see this week in Jesus' parable a servant who is forgiven much but then commands another servant: "Pay back what you owe!" He can't forget or let go of how he was wronged. He remembers — and he becomes a monster because of it. If only he had remembered not only the debts owed to him, but also his greater debt owed to — and forgiven by — his master. It's natural for us to remember what others owe us. But when we contextualize those offenses in Jesus' mercy toward us and them, we're free to be merciful like the Master and less like a monster who never forgets. — Father John Muir

Every saint has one or more of these things associated with them.

In the case of St. Francis of Assisi, he is known for a special love for animals among many other things. Given this love for animals, a tradition developed many years ago to bless animals on the Feast Day of St. Francis – October 4th. While the Church is not against this tradition, it does not oblige any priest to observe it. For this reason, you will see some parishes where the priest blesses animals privately or publicly on the Feast of St. Francis.

When I arrived in the United States as a missionary student to continue my seminary formation seven years ago, I encountered this tradition of blessing animals on the Feast Day of St. Francis. Like many other experiences I had in my first year here as a missionary, it was new to me, but I thought it was cool. However, like the Church, I am not against it, nor do I think I have to do it. So, being a priest for three years now, I have never privately or publicly blessed animals on the Feast Day of St. Francis nor have I been asked to do it. But then. I know that there is a first time for everything. A few Sundays ago, during one of our donut gatherings after Mass, one of my favorite parishioners, young Lydia Worsham, candidly instructed me to plan to bless her pet on the Feast of St. Francis this year. Lydia was one of our graduates from the parish this year. She is now a freshman at Teresa High School. Lydia loves Jesus

and attends Mass at her favorite Church every Sunday with her family. By the request of Lydia, I am announcing the BLESSING OF ANIMALS here at St. Thomas on the Feast of St. Francis, October 4, 2023, at 5:30 p.m. The blessing will take place at the parking lot by the north main entrance of the Church.

I look forward to this animal blessing ritual and encourage everyone who plans to bring their pets to keep them under control. You can invite your friends and family to bring their animals, hoping they start attending Mass afterward.

"Perhaps Love" is a duet by Placido Domingo and John Denver. It is featured on Placido's 1981 album *Perhaps Love*. The song was dedicated to John Denver's wife, Annie Martell while they were separated and planning to get divorced. The producer on the album, Milt Okun, suggested that Placido Domingo pair with John on the song and he

worked hard to get it promoted. Eventually, a radio station in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania began playing it every hour on the hour. The song peaked at #59 on the Billboard Hot 100 and #22 on Billboard's Adult Contemporary Tracks chart in 1982.

Perhaps love is like a window, perhaps an open door It invites you to come closer, it wants to show you more And even if you lose yourself and don't know what to do The memory of love will see you through


