

There was the retail gig that paid me less than the official minimum wage because I was a minor and scheduled me for long shifts because it meant cheaper labor. There was the unpaid internship with the editor who had no sense of work/life balance.

Most of us work hard for what we have in this life, and so we make the mistake of thinking we deserve the good things that come our way. That's all right and good when we're talking about a just wage. But sometimes we get our lines blurred and we begin to think we deserve, or have done something to earn, the salvation offered by Christ. I am not the laborer who has borne the heat of long hours in the sun. I am the straggler, the lost one, the idler at the marketplace as the day draws to a close. CONTEMPLATE

Once I gave my three-year-old niece a certain toy for Christmas. When she opened it, she was happy. Shortly thereafter her five-year old sister opened another present from me: the same toy, along with some play jewelry. The three-year-old cried out: "That's not fair! Why'd she get the jewelry, too?!"

Let's face it: there's something about God's grace in our religion which bugs us. We love to look at others' blessings and cry out: "That's not fair!" Catholicism is not fair in the sense that it is a religion founded on God's grace which is unmerited favor. God pours his mercy, love, and divine life upon us not because we're good but because He is infinitely good.

If you think the "not fair" quality of grace is easy to accept, consider how typically angry we get when we hear the parable of the workers who get paid way more than they deserve. The hyper-generous landowner says to the indignant hard workers, "Are you envious because I am generous?" Well, yes, they are, and so are we! Therefore, we have to reckon with this painful truth in order to move into the divine sphere of gifts, which is the world of Christ and his Church. Then we are able to move beyond a tit-for-tat world and into one where gifts are poured forth on those who don't deserve it — namely, upon us.

The Man I Love and Why!

In last week's bulletin article, I discussed how every Saint is known for something great. While some are known for just one or a few things, others are known for many things. This week, I want to reflect

briefly on one of the things many people (including myself) know about Venerable Fulton J. Sheen. As a man, a Christian, and a priest, I deeply admire the person and life of Fulton J. Sheen. I learned of Fulton Sheen through the first of his books I read as a young missionary in the Philippines some years ago. This book is *The Priest Is Not His Own*.

In that book, Fulton Sheen

explains in an intense and profoundly spiritual way the meaning of the priesthood and the priest's relationship with Jesus Christ as Christ's "alter Christus." After reading this book, I was compelled to look up Fulton Sheen and explore his quotes and other writings. Later, I would read his *The Power of Love*, copies of which I gave to at least ten of my students and young friends.

In *The Power of Love*, Fulton Sheen presents the various aspects of love in such a way that any Christian who is intentionally working to become a disciple of Christ can read it and be stirred to a deeper embrace of the fact that love is the only credible thing that exists. Love alone is credible, and anyone who possesses this love and allows it to possess them will spend the rest of their lives discovering their gifts and using them in the most fulfilling ways. Hence, the saint exclaims:

"God has given different gifts to different people. There is no basis for feeling inferior to another who has a different gift. Once it is realized that we shall be judged by the gift we have received, rather than the gift we have not, one is completely delivered from a false sense of inferiority." – Fulton J. Sheen

Besides the impeccable spiritual audacity with which he lived his priesthood even amidst the

challenges he suffered, the quote above drew me closer to the person and life of Fulton J. Sheen. How beautifully articulated! We need to understand how God blesses each of us uniquely. We need to know that we can only account for the gifts we receive from God. When we do this, we will have no room to feel inferior to any human being or be threatened by their gifts and talents. That way, we create more room to love and be loved by the love that has loved us.


