

National Vocation Awareness Week, November 5-11, 2023



NVAW, celebrated November 5-11, 2023, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in

1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which fell on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November. (from http://usccb.org)

CONTEMPLATE

Last Easter season a new convert to Catholicism at my parish asked me with a grave tone in her voice: "Why do we call priests 'father' if Jesus says, 'Call no man on earth your father, for you have one Father, who is in heaven'?" Thinking myself clever, I asked, "Do you think it's okay to call someone your 'teacher' or 'mister' or 'dad'?" She said, "Yes, I do." I responded, "Well, Jesus seems to forbid that, too. So, it's obviously hyperbole that he's using." She thought for a moment and declared, "Then I will stop using those words, too!" And she walked away. Not the outcome I was seeking.

We shouldn't be too hasty in dismissing this complaint voiced by many non-Catholics. The priest's fatherhood doesn't begin or end in him at all. Rather, the title "father" indicates that he is a sacramental sign of God's Fatherhood revealed in Jesus. The longer I'm a priest, the more I'm comfortable with people not using the title "father" and just calling me "John." After all, only God is Father in the truest sense. At the same time, Jesus has brought the Father close to us, very close. We honor this closeness in some men with the title "father." Who are the priests in your life whom Christ has sent to you? How wonderful that Christ has surrounded us with humble signs of his Father's love. It's good to celebrate that love with gratitude for the priests in our lives. — Father John Muir



On The Third Anniversary of his Death – Nze Pius Chineke

Last Tuesday evening, the Eve of All Saints, made it three years since my Dad passed into eternity. Talking about him and reminiscing the beautiful memories of life with him while growing up both challenges me to greater ideals of life and instills a unique passion for life in me.

Dad was the breadwinner of a large family of sixteen children within an extended family system of parents, grandparents, uncles, aunts, cousins, and other relatives. He was a community leader who championed the affairs of our community for many decades in various capacities. As a pioneer schoolteacher and a school headmaster for over forty years, Dad helped establish several schools in our local government (county) and played a vital role in

the building of our town's markets and the first Catholic Church – St. John's Catholic Church, Umuobom. As a visible presence and a leader in our Church during his time, Dad welcomed the priests and seminarians who served in our parish and made ours a home for these men until his last years on earth.

Oberembazu, as he was fondly called in our community, was a father and friend to so many, so much so that growing up, many of my friends called him Daddy alongside us (his children). Not long ago, one of my grade school classmates chatted with me on Facebook and complained that Daddy had passed two years ago and that I did not tell her. As I apologized for not reaching out to her, I quickly recalled how Dad bought three beautiful school bags in 4th grade for my younger sister, my classmate, and myself. This was just a few months after the young girl lost her father.

While Dad was loved by many people and looked up to as an exemplary Christian father and community leader, he was unpopular among some people, even in our family. He was a fierce defender of ethical values and fairness and stood for the less privileged in the community. While I learned so much from him, there are two things I got from him that I hope to keep with me for a long time.

First, Dad was very receptive to criticisms as a leader and never wavered in his values and decisions when they were for the common good. Secondly, nothing seemed to ever discourage him in his devotedness to Christ and everything Catholic. The sins and mistakes of Church officials, the challenges he encountered as a person, and the condemnations and betrayals he suffered from, even among his own, for standing for fairness. During such sufferings, Dad's love for Christ and his absolute trust in the Blessed Virgin Mary shone even brighter.

As I devote the rest of my life interceding for him and the rest of the Christian faithful at the Altar of the Eucharist, I am consoled that when Dad left this world, the number of my guardian angels increased. May his soul and the souls of the faithful departed through the mercy of God Rest In Peace. Amen.
