



Food for the Hungry



The Hour of Great Mercy




In His revelations to St. Faustina, Our Lord asked for a special prayer and meditation on His Passion each afternoon at the three o'clock hour, the hour that recalls His death on the Cross.

"At three o'clock, implore My mercy, especially for sinners; and, if only for a brief moment, immerse yourself in My Passion, particularly in My abandonment at the moment of agony. This is the hour of great mercy. In this hour, I will refuse nothing to the soul that makes a request of Me in virtue of My Passion." (St. Faustina's Diary, 1320)

From these instructions, it's clear that Our Lord wants us to turn our attention to His Passion at the three o'clock hour to whatever degree our duties allow, and He wants us to ask for His mercy.

We can all mentally pause for a "brief instant," think of His total abandonment at the hour of agony, and say a short prayer such as "Jesus, Mercy," or "Jesus, for the sake of Your Sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

Popes, Poets, & Paprocki On Hell

Pope Francis has made his personal vision of Hell quite clear on several occasions. During a homily in the Vatican in 2016, he said Hell is not "a torture chamber." Rather, it is the horror of being separated forever from the "God who loves us so much." His predecessor, Pope St John Paul II, said something similar in 1999: not so much a physical place, he explained, "Hell indicates the state of those who freely and definitively separate themselves from God, the source of all life and joy."

The poet Christopher Marlowe also described Hell as a state rather than a specific place, when in his 1592 play *Doctor Faustus*, the character Mephistophilis says:

Hell hath no limits, nor is circumscribed In one self-place; for where we are is Hell, And where Hell is, there must we ever be.

Satan, in Book IV of Milton's *Paradise Lost* (1667), has made his escape from Hell so he can destroy mankind on Earth, but he can never escape his torment:

Me miserable! which way shall I fly Infinite wrath, and infinite despair? Which way I fly is Hell; myself am Hell

Dante's vision of Hell in the *Divine Comedy* (circa 1300) is an elaborate series of levels, but the words on its gate reveal the inner agony of the souls there. It reads: "ABANDON ALL HOPE, YE WHO ENTER HERE."

It was Pope Benedict XVI, in 2007, who said that Hell "really exists and is eternal...even if nobody talks about it much anymore." When he was still Cardinal Ratzinger, he was responsible for much of the work involved in updating the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC). The same Catechism not only affirms the existence of Hell and its eternity, but confirms that "the chief punishment of Hell is eternal separation from God."

In the April 4, 2021 issue of *Catholic Times*, Bishop Paprocki reviewed the many statements in recent articles and books denying the existence of Hell. He had previously quoted the Catechism to refute such views on August 18, 2019.
