

#### Excerpts from the Lectionary for Mass @2001, 1998, 1970 CCD

#### The First Nativity Scene Was 800 Years Ago

In 1223, St. Francis, a deacon, joined his fellow Franciscans at the town of Grecio to celebrate Christmas. St. Francis realized that the chapel of the Franciscan hermitage would be too small to hold the congregation for Midnight Mass. So he found a niche in the rock near the town square and set up the altar. St. Bonaventure in his *The Life of St. Francis of Assisi* recorded the story:

"It happened in the third year before his death, that in order to excite the inhabitants of Grecio to commemorate the nativity of the Infant Jesus with great devotion, [St. Francis] determined to keep it with all possible solemnity; and lest he should be accused of lightness or novelty, he asked and obtained the permission of the sovereign Pontiff. Then he prepared a manger, and brought hay, and an ox and an ass to the place appointed. The brethren were summoned, the people ran together, the forest resounded with their voices, and that venerable night was made glorious by many and brilliant lights and sonorous psalms of praise. The man of God [St. Francis] stood before the manger, full of devotion and piety, bathed in tears and radiant with joy..."

### CONTEMPLATE

Life is troubling. Who among us has not struggled with anxiety and difficulties, sometimes massive ones? I certainly have, as have many of my loved ones. If we do, does this mean that we don't trust the Lord or just need to toughen up?

I don't think so. How encouraging for us anxious and troubled souls to hear Luke describe the Blessed Mother Marv in these words, "But she was greatly troubled at what was said." An archangel has visited her. An inconceivable promise has been made to her. Her life has become wildly unpredictable, perhaps more so than any person before or since. The first point for us: the Lord is with her precisely when she is troubled. Her anxiousness and God's presence are not mutually exclusive. Christianity is not about a trance-like robotic indifference. It's about the presence of divine love. Even in — especially in — troubled circumstances. Our troubled soul can become our greatest treasure. What seems so troubling at first to Mary becomes the best possible thing, Jesus, the Savior and Lord, is now her son. All the difficulties and troubles remain, and yet her movement into the fullness of God is accelerated. What is troubling you right now? This scripture invites us now, this week, to hear the Lord's messenger say to us what he said to Mary, "Do not be afraid! You have found favor with God."

## A WORD FROM FR. STONE

### Holy Days of Obligation

1. Christmas is a holy day of obligation. Confessions will be offered starting 30 minutes before each Mass so that you may receive the Body & Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ with a clear conscience. (Since the Christmas Vigil Mass is on a Sunday this year, it can be used to satisfy the Christmas or the Sunday obligation, at your option. However, you cannot use a single Mass to satisfy both obligations at once.)

2. New Year's Day (Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God) is not a holy day of obligation *this year*. When this feast falls on a Saturday or a Monday, the obligation to hear Mass is lifted.

### A Christmas Day Poem

I offer you a Christmas poem by St. Robert Southwell, S.J. (1561-1595). He was one of the English Martyrs, one of the many heroic English priests who ministered to persecuted Catholics in England and was tortured and killed by Queen Elizabeth I.

> Behold a simple tender Babe In freezing winter night In homely manger trembling lies, Alas! a piteous sight. The inns are full; no man will yield This little pilgrim bed; But forced he is with silly beasts In crib to shroud his head.

Weigh not his crib, his wooden dish, Nor beasts that round him press; Weigh not his Mother's poor attire, Nor Joseph's simple dress. This stable is a prince's court, The crib his chair of state; The beasts are parcel of his pomp, The wooden dish his plate.

### MagisteriumAI Update

The Dec. 3 bulletin had a column on MagisteriumAI, a ChatGPT-like tool for researchers of Church documents. Here are updated features:

•Scholarly Mode is now available in the free version. Scholarly Mode provides access to Catholic theological and philosophical works from St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Augustine, Church Fathers, Doctors of the Church and seminal works such as the Enchiridion Symbolorum (Denzinger).

•The Douay–Rheims Bible is now available to query in Scholarly Mode.

•There are now 5,706 magisterial and 2,248 scholarly documents available to users in the knowledge base.

•1,251 documents were added since the last update, including works by Teresa of Avila, Bernard of Clairvaux, Ignatius of Loyola, Boethius, Cyprian of Carthage, Tertullian, Athanasius of Alexandria, St. Basil of Caesarea, and Pope Francis.
