## SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### Today's Scriptures

The reading from the Book of Genesis picks up basically where it left off last weekend. Having received Abraham's hospitality and delivered to him some startling news, the three visitors now go to the next part of their mission: a fact-finding trip to Gomorrah and Sodom. Abraham, left with God, engages in a lengthy, even humorous, back-and-forth conversation with the Lord. But Abraham is not bartering to spare the two cities. He wants to find out just how just and forgiving God is and doesn't let up until he's sure God would spare an entire town for the sake of only ten innocent people. This great *mercy* shows up as well in the epistle, where we hear that God has "forgiven us *all* our transgressions," and in the gospel where Jesus teaches that "*everyone* who asks, receives."

**The inner word:** *What's in your heart?*

"Ask and you will receive." It makes prayer sound so simple: All you have to do is ask, and almost like magic you'll get it. But God is not a vending machine of favors granted. Jesus' words refer not so much to what you pray for but the confidence and persistence with which you pray. With that spirit of prayer, anything is possible.

### Lord, teach us to pray

The habit of prayer is one true sign of a person of faith. While it's possible to go through the motions of prayer and not to have faith, it's simply not possible to have faith and to fail to pray. Jesus is shown at prayer continually in Luke's gospel, and eventually it occurs to his disciples that perhaps it is a skill they, too, ought to acquire. So they ask Jesus to give them a blueprint for prayer. And they get one. We get one. We learn from this prayer to praise God, hope in the kingdom, ask for what we need, and make forgiveness the vital cornerstone of our relationships.

Prayer is powerfully significant in the life of every saint and so it's no wonder they all had advice on the subject. Technique, however, was not high on their list of values. John Climacus insisted it's not necessary to wrack your brains for words; God listens to the monotonous stammering of children as well as anyone. Elizabeth Seton described prayer as no more than lifting the heart to God throughout the day. Ignatius of Antioch said prayer is fundamentally attention. To this end, Basil the Great saw the whole of life as an unending season of prayer.

Thomas Aquinas, ever the systematic theologian, analyzed the Lord's Prayer and came up with five qualities in it that all prayer should imitate: confidence, orderliness, suitability, devotion, and humility. Thérèse of Lisieux, of course, sought a simpler path, finding in the slow recitation of a Hail Mary or Our Father enough consolation for the soul. "A simple glance upwards to Heaven," she said, or an outburst of the heart, or a cry of gratitude, was her little formula for spiritual communication.

Theophan, known as the Recluse, called prayer the director of everything: "If prayer is right, everything is right." Teresa of Avila saw the questions of sin and self-knowledge to be partners in our prayer, "the bread we must eat with even the most delicate dish on this road."

Prayer is not something we do only for ourselves, to get what we need or to elevate our thoughts to God. Teresa of Avila was conscious of the communal nature of this enterprise: We're all in this together, and we pray most effectively when we unite our prayers with those of friends, family, and community. Pope John Paul II noted that prayer fulfills our vocation as Christians: to sanctify ourselves and the world in the same process. We raise our voices for the voiceless. Each prayer is a brick in the "sacred architecture" of time. Jesus tells us that apart from him we can do nothing. When we make prayer our constant habit, we guarantee that the activity of our lives, our decisions and relationships, will never be far from his grace.

## Questions Catholics ask

### HOW DOES GOD FORGIVE SINS?

ONE OF THE MOST remarkable things ever written in the New Testament was a single word in the second chapter of the Letter to the Colossians. The Colossian Christians were a little confused about their new faith, and the author was working hard to explain who Christ was and what he had done. One of the most important things Christ had done, the letter said, was to forgive sins. To explain this, the writer chose his words carefully—particularly the verb describing what Christ did with our sin. He "obliterated" it, the New American Bible translation says (Col. 2:14). Other words with milder meanings could have been used—that Christ "crossed out" our sin or, simply, "forgave" it. But the very deliberately picked word conveys the idea that God erases all traces of our sin from the record.

That will happen because God is who God is. God overflows with mercy and love. Look at yourself honestly. Consider the ways you have failed in your responsibilities, let other people down, cut corners, given into pressure, disguised the truth, lashed out at others, abused yourself. Look at all that without embarrassment—and bring it to God without fear. God will obliterate it.

IN A PRACTICE common in the ancient world, the disciples of Jesus asked for a special prayer, and Jesus obliged with what has become the signature prayer of Christians: the Our Father. But for a prayer recited weekly by at least 2.5 billion people, its full meaning remains a mystery.

Scripture scholar John Dominic Crossan asks us to consider this:

- The Lord's Prayer is Christianity's greatest prayer, but it never mentions Christ.
- It is prayed in all churches but never mentions church.
- It is called the Lord's Prayer but never mentions the Lord.
- It draws from Jewish tradition but doesn't mention such common Old Testament themes as covenant, law, Temple, or Torah.
- It undoubtedly transcends Christianity yet captures the essence of Jesus's core teachings

Mysterious, universal, transcendent, hopeful—as Saint Teresa of Avila says of the Lord's Prayer, "If we study it, no other book seems necessary."

Time to empty the bookshelves and spend time with the prayer that Jesus taught us.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The theme for this year's collection for the Latin America Apostolate is: *Missionaries of Faith in the Year of Faith*.

On August 4, 2013, as our annual collection for the Latin America Apostolate is taking place in all our parishes, I will be in *La Paz, Bolivia*. The purpose of my visit is to help dedicate a new chapel in *Las Lomas*. This is one of 14 neighborhoods in *Maria Reina – Mary Queen Parish*. This parish has 70,000 people who live on steep mountainsides over 13,000 feet above sea level, in the highest capital city in the world. Despite efforts of the parishioners to raise funds for the chapel construction by selling food they have prepared, this chapel would not have been completed without support of the faithful of the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

The St. Louis Priests who serve in Bolivia have among their pastoral priorities the proclamation of the Gospel message and the celebration of the sacraments. Other key priorities are: training of native Bolivians as diocesan priests, as well as the formation of missionary disciples among the laity who serve as catechists in religious education for children and adults. Teams of missionary disciples trained at Maria Reina Parish visit “door to door” to evangelize residents in the parish. The parish health clinic treats 5,000 patients each year, providing medical and dental care, along with food distribution to those at risk of malnutrition.

Our Priest Missionaries in Bolivia also take turns in celebrating sacraments in a rural parish among the Aymara people, one of the indigenous peoples of Bolivia. Last July I visited *Santiago (St. James) parish* and concelebrated Mass with Bishop Toribio Ticona Porco, now Bishop Emeritus of *Corocoro*. Because there is no resident Priest in Calamarca, the 30 villages in the parish territory have access to Mass only 3 or 4 times each year.

Bishop Morgan Casey, now Bishop Emeritus of the Vicariate of the *Pando*, ordained his successor Bishop Eugenio Coter on April 24, 2013. Bishop Casey is assisting the new Bishop in these months of transition and will return to the Archdiocese of St. Louis in his retirement. Our congratulations and thanks are due to Bishop Casey for 48 years of missionary service in Bolivia, and for nearly the last 30 years as a Bishop.

During this Year of Faith, I thank our St. Louis Priests and Bishop Casey for being Missionaries of Faith in the Latin America Apostolate. Our Missionaries in Bolivia enable us to fulfill Jesus' missionary mandate to “Go make disciples of all the nations.” (Mt 28:19) Without our support for the Latin America Apostolate, none of this missionary work would be possible. Please be generous in the collection on August 4, 2013.
