Saint Agnes was born in 291 into a Roman family of nobility and raised in a Christian family. She suffered martyrdom for her faith and commitment to her virginity as a young teen on January 21, 304. In art she is often portrayed holding a lamb, a symbol of innocence. Saint Agnes is the patron saint of young girls.

Give thanks to the Lord for He is good! Congratulations on completing the Lenten journey. Pass go, collect \$200. It is now the beginning of Holy Week. These are the holiest days of our year. The Sacred Paschal Triduum is upon us. The ordo states, "Precisely because these faith-anchoring events are historical, however, they cannot be repeated or "re-enacted." That is why the Church's long-standing tradition insists that what happened once in history passes over into the mystery of the assembly's liturgical/ sacramental celebrations." What the paschal triduum actually celebrates is mystery, not history; anamnesis, no mimesis." What in the world are you saying Father? It means this--we are experiencing in real time within our very lives the mysteries that have not just happened in the past but are happening to us now. We are participating in three distinct phases of Paschal Mystery. DIE RISE GO. These three mysteries are the fabric of our lives. We are in a cyclical pattern of God's Divine Plan. Simply stated: DIE--this is Holy Thursday and Good Friday and the entombment of Christ on Holy Saturday. RISE--the Solemnity of the Easter Celebration including the Vigil on Saturday evening along with Easter Sunday celebration. GO--The Easter Octave leading into the Feast of the Ascension and into the Solemnity of Pentecost. DIE RISE GO is the Paschal Mystery--the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Paschal is the Greek derivative of PASCH which means Passover. We are passing through the darkness and into the light. There is no greater witness of this particular mystery than from the reading of the seven stories of salvation history from the Old Testament while we are waiting in darkness. Then, BOOM! The lights are on, our candles are snuffed out, the bells are rung, the Gloria is chanted, and the Alleluia is belted out for the first time in over forty days. Please consider attending the Easter Vigil Mass. It is the most important celebration of the liturgical year and the depth of the rites of the Easter Vigil cannot be underestimated or understated. If you can, make Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil and the Easter Sunday Mass a retreat. Dive into the mystery of Christ Jesus. Every year we are transformed anew from these most Sacred of Days. Have a blessed Triduum! His Mercy Endures Forever!

Faith Formation





There are Norms for the Reception of Holy Communion

 The standard posture for receiving the consecrated host is on the tongue but it can be received in the hand at the discretion of the communicant.

To receive Communion in the hand, the hands should be clean. If one is right-handed, the left hand should be cradled upon the right. The host will be laid in the palm of the left hand and then taken by the right hand to the mouth, If one is left-handed, this is reversed.

It is not appropriate for the communicant to reach out with the fingers and take the host from the person distributing.

- When receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence, receives the Body of the Lord from the minister, and consumes before moving on.
- When Holy Communion is received under both kinds, the same sign of reverence is made before receiving the Precious Blood.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum

What really, do the liturgies of the triduum celebrate? Most all of us believe we know the answer. We assume that Thursday commemorates the day Jesus instituted the eucharist; Friday commemorates the day he was executed on the cross; and the vigil commemorates the emergence from the tomb. We assume, further, that the liturgies of these days are dramatic "reenactments" of events — by turns touching, tragic and triumphant — which happened during Jesus' last days and culminated in his victory over death. We assume, in other words, that the paschal triduum is simply springtime's parallel to winter's Christmas. As it gathers on these days, the liturgical assembly is often thought to be engaged in acts of historical "reconstruction" that recreate scenes in the "upper room," on Calvary, and at the tomb. People are encouraged to imagine they are "actually present" at these events — comforting Jesus during his fearful watch in Gethsemane, walking with him along the via crucis, and witnessing his miraculous "return to life" on Easter morning. This view may frequently be reinforced by popular hymns that focus on the "historical facts" of the celebration.

But is "history" the central focus of celebration during the Triduum? Certainly, the early Christian creeds anchored belief in the historical, this-worldly circumstances that accompanied Jesus' suffering and crucifixion "under Pontius Pilate." Jesus' life, career and death were, in other words, attached to a specific time, in a specific place. His proclamation of God's arrival in the present moment (God's "reign"), his bold challenge to understand God in and as one's neighbor, his rejection of "religion" as a means of social or political control—all this took place not in some cosmic cloud of unknowing but in a remote province of the later Roman Empire at a time of sociopolitical transition.

Precisely because these faith-anchoring events are historical, however, they cannot be repeated or "reenacted." That is why the church's long tradition insists that what happened once in history passes over into the mystery of the assembly's liturgical/sacramental celebrations. What the paschal triduum actually celebrates is mystery, not history; anamnesis, not mimesis. The liturgies of these days do not "take us back" to the upper room or the path to Calvary. Their ultimate purpose is not to retrace or relive the last hours of Jesus' life — nor to catch sight of him emerging from the tomb at Easter's dawning. They celebrate not what once happened to Jesus but what is now happening among us as a people called to conversion, gathered in faith, and gifted with the Spirit of holiness. They celebrate God's taking possession of our hearts at their deepest core, recreating us a new human community broken like bread for the world's life — a community rich in compassion, steadfast in hope, and fearless in the search for justice and peace.


tickets. Popular items are plants, books, gift cards, crafts, household items. A short meeting will follow the auction to disperse the treasury and have an election. Come and bring along friends!

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


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
