

Gospel Reflection


Catholic Q and A

Imitating Christ so that others may live...

My Dad was a life-long blood donor and I remember going along with him my first time to the National Guard Armory in my hometown and stepping through the donation process with him at my side when I was in

high school. While it was a little scary at first, my Dad kept telling me how important it was to donate blood for those who needed it. In his mind, he was paying it forward for the day when he might need a transfusion. The fact that the blood drive was at the Armory seemed to make this act even more honorable to me. Well, I have kept up the tradition and have been a regular blood donor since I was about 17 years old. During all those years, I have donated about 16 gallons, one pint at a time.

A few weeks after each donation, the Red Cross sends me an email stating the city and location where my blood donation went. They cover local needs first, but excess donations are moved around the country to areas of need. This occurs frequently after natural disasters like hurricanes when people not only need blood, but collections in those areas have been reduced.

One could think of donating blood as performing one of the Corporal Works of Mercy. When we donate blood, we are in a way, visiting and caring for the sick. Even in this time of pandemic, when we may not be able to visit certain hospitals or nursing homes, we can still safely donate blood and send part of ourselves to those who need us most in their time of need.

There is an incredible need for blood at this time as always. According to the Red Cross, the current shortage is the worst it has been in ten years. The current situation is forcing some hospitals to make tough ethical decisions about which patients will receive the limited supply of donations and which will need to go without. It is vitally important that our society continues to create new donors through education and encouragement. Paraphrasing my Dad, "Don't assume blood will be available when you need it, if you have not paid ahead by your own donations."

Please consider donating blood this year if you don't already do so. If you are a regular donor, I challenge you to bring someone along with you to the next drive. Walk with them on this work of mercy. It is clearly an expression of the second greatest commandment: *Love your neighbor as yourself*. When you give your life's blood that another may live, you are imitating Christ, who gave us His very Blood that we might live.



Saint Agnes — January 21

St. Agnes is the patron saint of young girls and is one of the most famous early Christian virgin martyrs and is mentioned in one of the Eucharistic prayers of the Mass.

Almost nothing is known of this saint except that she was very

young—12 or 13—when she was martyred in the last half of the third century. Various modes of death have been suggested — beheading, burning, strangling. Legend has it that Agnes was a beautiful girl whom many young men wanted to marry. Among those she refused, one reported her to the authorities for being a Christian. She was arrested and confined to a house of prostitution. The legend continues that a man who looked upon her lustfully lost his sight and had it restored by her prayer. Agnes was condemned, executed, and buried near Rome in a catacomb that eventually was named after her.

She is depicted in art as a young girl in robes, holding a palm branch in her hand and a lamb at her feet or in her arms because of its association with gentleness, purity, and submission. On her feast day, two lambs are brought to the pope to be blessed. The wool from these lambs is woven into the palliums (bands of white wool), which the pope gives to newly consecrated archbishops.

It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers — do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.

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
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
