

Gospel Reflection

Deserts can be lonely, isolated, and treacherous places. When a person wanders in a desert, they can easily get disoriented, dehydrated, confused, lost, and vulnerable. Temptation is at its peak, especially when confronted with something that may offer some respite or relief, even a mirage. Deserts can bring us to our weakest moment and tempt our faith. The Christian journey can be described as a desert experience as we vacillate back and forth, falling victim to the mirages of our lives versus the true, life-giving water offered by God. We need a burning bush experience in our lives that convinces us of the power of God and reveals Him as the "I am" of all existence.

Moses was leading his flock across the desert when he found himself at Mount Horeb. Mountains give us a fuller perspective of life, a panoramic view of what would otherwise be hidden from the limitations of our sight. That's when Moses met God. We have to find our way to a mountain experience where our vantage point can take on a wider view of life. Many things can do this for us: the birth of a child, the death of someone we love, the joy that comes from marveling at the beauty of God's work, the pondering of life's mysteries, and the ache of longing found deep within our souls. There are many things in life that can wake us up, give us a clearer, better view of things and become occasions where a bush may burn and God's presence as the eternal uncreated One is revealed.


God is very patient and gives us the time and space we need to figure things out and bear some good fruit. He doesn't rush to cut us down or get frustrated with our barrenness. But we have to remember that the desert journeys of our lives come with some risks. The major risk is that we will mistakenly believe that the mirages are real. Thus, we fall victim to thinking that the respite and refreshment we seek is discovered in a place other than where it actually is. Our faith and the life of the Church are the safeguards we need to keep us properly orientated so that we don't get lost or confused and stay on course.





Tips for More Consistent Prayer Time

Along with fasting and almsgiving, prayer is one of the three main pillars of Lent. When we purposefully pray with a heart that desires to know Jesus and serve Him, our actions move beyond the requirements and rules and will lead to a joyous Easter morning and a true celebration of the Risen Lord!

- Pray daily. Try to start every morning with a prayer. Pray before you fall asleep.
- If you are praying daily already then start adding a few more minutes a day to your prayer time.
- Pray the rosary daily, it only takes about 20 minutes
- Pray the chaplet of Divine Mercy. This is about half the time of a rosary.
- Try Lectio Divina. That is prayerfully reading and meditating on even just one verse of scripture.
- Read a chapter of the Bible every day. What better way to get to know the heart and mind of God.
- Attend daily Mass. "The world could survive more easily without the sun than without the Mass."
- Pray for priests, your parish priest especially, but also all priests around the world.
- Pray for your bishop, all the bishops, and the Pope. They are the shepherds of Christ's church, and successors of the apostles.
- Pray the stations of the Cross. This beautiful prayer can be prayed all year but you'll find it available to be prayed with a group here on Thursday evenings.



In the midst of our Lenten season we arrive at another special feast day -- the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord on March 25th. This feast commemorates, in the first chapter of Luke's gospel, the angel Gabriel appearing to the young virgin, Mary to announce that she will bear a son conceived by the Holy Spirit to be named Jesus who will be called Son of the Most High.

We are so familiar with this story that perhaps we fail to grasp what truly has taken place. Mary is the first among all human beings to hear of God's decision to come and dwell among us as one like us. She is greatly troubled by the angel's greeting but is told not to be afraid. Before the angel's departure she moves from fear to acceptance of God's Word. God's Word has been spoken and is now within her womb. How wondrous a moment for her and for all humanity. For, on behalf of all of us, Mary, who has found favor with God, welcomes with faith God incarnate into the world.

The Annunciation, the first of the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary, should indeed call us to rejoice. For now, in a world beset by a pandemic and war, we too might be afraid. We must hear the voice, not of an angel, but of the Lord himself who continually calls his disciples to not be afraid because he would always be with them -- the Son of the Most High.




St. Oscar Romero March 24

When St. Oscar Romero was appointed Archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, his country was in chaos. Many people in El Salvador were living in poverty, while a smaller elite group controlled all

political and economic power. In 1980, El Salvador broke out in a 12-year civil war that left over 75,000 people dead. St. Oscar Romero set up pastoral programs to assist the victims of oppression. He also became an outspoken advocate for human rights, appealing to the Salvadoran military to stop killing their own citizens.

On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was murdered while celebrating Mass in El Salvador. A car pulled up outside, and a gunman fired a single shot straight into St. Oscar Romero's heart.

Calling him a "a martyr for the faith" nearly 40 years later, Pope Francis canonized him in 2018. For the occasion, Pope Francis chose to wear the same bloodstained belt that Romero was wearing at the altar when he died.


