A couple of months ago I came to know one Korean TV drama on Netflix, titled *Squid Game*. Out of curiosity, I googled it and was surprised by the fact that it was a hot topic like *Gangnam Style* or the Bangtan Boys (BTS). At this juncture, if you don't understand what I just said, I gently recommend that you take a moment and google those words. For those who understood it, let me continue. I talked with my wife about the TV drama. She also knew something about it. In no time, we decided to watch it, with no intention to watch the entire season.

The first episode began with an introduction of a children's (traditional) play called Squid Game that I had actually played a lot with my friends in childhood. The brief plot of the drama is that Seong Gi-hun, a divorced chauffeur and gambling addict, participated in a series of children's games for a chance at a large cash prize, in order to financially support his elderly mother who was suffering from serious diabetes, and pay off his debts that were gradually snowballing. On a secluded island where the survival games took place, Gi-hun came to know that there were 456 participants in total and the last survivor would get \$38 billion (₩45.6 billion). Until the first game began, he didn't know that all eliminated competitors in each game were supposed to be killed on the spot. To be the last survivor, all the participants were demanded to coolheadedly look away from 455 deaths, only concentrating on his/her life and prize money. Gi-hun was not the kind of person who could do it easily. When he was almost about to be eliminated (thus to be killed), more often than not, he worried about and cared for others.

After watching the last episode, my first son shared his appreciation review: "It is addictively fun, but it gives me, each time, a guilty feeling." I agree with him 100 percent. Surviving in the war of all against all, what else can we feel? Gi-hun was the last survivor. He was the only one, out of 456 persons, who came back home alive. However, he couldn't use his prize money for years due to the survivor guilt. The first episode ended with Gihun's decision to go back to the brutal and merciless place. This time it was neither for the matter of life or death, nor for another prize money. It was for his trust in humanity what makes each of us a human and differentiates each of us from other animals. We are the only animal on this planet who trusts others despite that others will use us as an object for their individual benefits and reject us indifferently.

In expectation of a new year of 2022 for PUMC, I hope and pray that PUMC becomes a place where we trust others, being trusted by others, even if, in that trust-building process, we hurt others and we are hurt by others to a degree. Personally, I want to believe that the church is the last bastion of humanity.

Check This Out! etting quite low on items


We are getting quite low on items for the Little Free Food Pantry: With temps below freezing, we can now only accept dried goods. No canned goods either.

A member of a church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going. After a few weeks, the preacher decided to visit him.

It was a chilly evening. The preacher found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for his preacher's visit, the man welcomed him, led him to a comfortable chair near the fireplace and waited.

The preacher made himself at home but said nothing. In the grave silence, he contemplated the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After some minutes, the preacher took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone, then he sat back in his chair, still silent.






United Methodist Women

A Soul Food for Advent: "Water From the Wells of Salvation" By Bishop Hee-Soo Jung

"With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation" (Isaiah 12:3).

It is easy to forget that our ancestors in faith did not draw water from a tap. Isaiah's people had to wait, walk, think about their need for water, plan to carry it, and appreciate every last drop. This reading for Advent takes us back to journey and waiting with emptiness.

Advent is a season of waiting with what Simeon the New Theologian called, 'attention of the heart.' A letting go of calculations and letting be of emptiness. This amounts to cleaning the inside of the cup as scripture speaks, then humble waiting for God to be revealed.

Humility can be the source of acceptance of our common humanity. While we come to our days with an attention of the heart, we need not clutter our eyes with judgment about our neighbors or divided views of humanity. What practices empty you for an attention of the heart?

Emptiness and promise are sisters. Emptiness is satisfied to watch her sister have her day and promise is glad to come and be with her sister. Both have peace as their mother.

It may be difficult for us to be at peace with emptiness. Many of us live in the feelings of emptiness as the pandemic rages on. Health care workers, clergy, everyday heroes who work in public spaces—all of us have experienced depletion. Perhaps the good news is that we do not have to bring off Christmas, nor complete the promises of Advent. We come empty-handed to the promise that 'with joy you shall draw water from wells of salvation.'

Many years ago, when I was a superintendent on the Wisconsin cabinet and twice since my return, I offered a tea ceremony as a part of our cabinet worship service. Of course, a proper tea ceremony would take many hours, but we were in transition at the time. A tea ceremony slows the pace to the dynamic of pouring and receiving. My siblings at the table were exhausted from giving and they were able to rest and receive. First the utensils are brought in the room, signs and symbols of waiting. The tea is stirred with water and transformation takes place—all of it before those who are waiting. When the time comes to drink, there is a fullness that is more than the tea; it is relational, grateful, and endowed with a sense of this cup being enough.

Siblings, we are in the heart of Advent. Bring your emptiness and attention of the heart. Bring your waiting. Trust. The prophet promises: 'with joy you shall draw water from wells of salvation.' Thanks be to God.

Know that I am praying for you. Peace, Bishop Hee-Soo Jung


