# FROM FATHER JUSTIN

**F**or this issue of the Living Waters Newsletter, I'd like to devote a page or two for some community awareness. As a matter of fact, we have a new and exciting Catholic ministry in our proverbial backyard. I'm referring to the newly established Catholic Ecology Center, which is just a few minutes away from Saint Matthew's Church. The place used to be an old Girl Scout Camp, which has been closed for some time. Joe Meyer bought the property (with the help of some donors and investors) and has been converting it to an ecology center and wildlife sanctuary for the better part of this past year. At the moment, there is one building in good repair, which I think of as the visitor's center. They are in the process of securing more funds to renovate the other buildings on the grounds to accommodate larger groups of people and establish other ministries/activities throughout the year.

**A**t this time, the main draw is the opportunity for short daytrips and simple retreats of a few hours. Religious Education-aged kids are especially welcome in this way. Given the sizes of our classes, it would be easy to take a grade or two at a time and make a

day of it. That said, the Catholic Ecology Center is certainly a place for all ages. Furthermore, although we need to coordinate with the center for a group visit, the grounds are open from sunup to sundown for visitors to come and simply enjoy the grounds.

**A**t the time of this writing, things are still quite new and we haven't actually done anything official there yet. I will continue to support the Ecology Center as the chairperson of the Archdiocesan Social Justice Committee, and increase awareness of the center to all the parishes of southeastern Wisconsin. As pastor of Saint Matthew's and Sacred Heart, it is my hope that we become regular visitors to the grounds. We have the winter months to get a few plans together, and hopefully we can start taking advantage of the center this spring.

**I** hope you consider reaching out to me if you have an idea for a group or a natural activity that you think would be worth exploring once we're past the cold weather that we're bound to get soon. For my part, I hope to gather families with young children who are not yet in religious education at the parish. I also haven't given up on my idea of a semi-regular men's

group (of all ages, that is), and the Ecology Center would be a worthy location to gather. Hopefully, Pastoral Council will have some other creative ideas to recommend.



**S**o please think about it and reach out to me if you have any interest in being a part of this exciting opportunity to blend our faith with our appreciation of the natural world. You can also get more information at their website or speak to Joe (the executive director) or Theresa (the program coordinator).

# FINANCE REPORT


The theme for this year's Stewardship Appeal is "Embrace Joy, Live Stewardship", and in this year, we certainly have plenty to be joyful about. In the midst of one of the most difficult years that we have ever lived through, the members of the United in Christ family have stepped up and done their best to keep things as normal as possible. We've worn the masks and socially distanced, and yet we've continued to worship and work as a family, and to generously support our Parishes with our contributions throughout this tough time. That's the true meaning of giving of our time, talent and treasure. Today, I'm here to ask you to continue your generous support for the coming year. Here's just a brief summary of where we're at.

For Sacred Heart Parish, during 2021, 319 of our 447 families contributed toward the support of the ministries of the Parish. That's 71% of our total membership. Through October 31, we are on pace to come in 6% ahead of the original pledges which were repeated from 2019. Your generosity has helped us to keep the work of the Parish going, as well as contributing to the work done within our community and throughout the world.

For St Matthew's, to date this year, 83 of the 107 families have contributed toward ministry. That's 78% of the Parish membership. Their generosity has resulted in our being on pace to meet the original pledges repeated from 2019.

As for Sacred Heart's mortgage, through October 31, 236 of our families have

contributed toward our debt fund, and we're already 15% over the original pledges from 2019. And for the best news of all, through the unbelievably generous bequest of one of our parishioners, we have been able to reduce our debt balance to a little over \$450,000, which means that we are on pace to pay off our mortgage in full in August of 2024, less than three years from now. We have been extremely blessed this year.



Now, we are once again asking each of you to pledge toward the support of Sacred Heart and St. Matthew's Parishes for the coming year. If you haven't already done so, please make a pledge to continue the good work of the United in Christ Family. We still have 29% of Sacred Heart families and 17% of St Matthew's families who have not contributed. If you are able, please consider making a contribution during 2022.

Also, don't forget Time and Talent in making your commitment for 2022. Volunteering to help out at one of our many Parish functions is a great way to help toward the success of our Mission, and you might even have some fun at the same time.

I will end as I always do. Continue to keep our Parishes and our Members in your prayers. Thank you again for your continuing support, and, as always, remember that WE CAN'T DO IT WITHOUT YOU. God Bless you all.

# MUSIC MINISTRY

## Joy to the World!

### An Advent Hymn

Though we may think of this hymn as a Christmas favorite, it is really Isaac Watts' Christocentric interpretation of Psalm 98. He entitled his verses "The Messiah's Coming and Kingdom" and drew on the main themes from that Old Testament royal psalm to fashion a much-loved hymn. The first two stanzas help modern worshipers join with heaven and earth in rejoicing at the coming of Christ, the great King; thus the cosmic scope of salvation in Christ is expressed. Stanza three (more an interpolation by Watts into the psalm) stresses that Christ's blessings extend and victoriously over the realm of sin. The final stanza affirms the rule of Christ over all the nations, for, as Paul affirms in Philippians 2:10, "at the name of Jesus every knee shall bow."

Lowell Mason's tune for this text borrows phrases from the great oratorio *Messiah* by Handel. Mason named the tune ANTIOCH after the New Testament city where the disciples were first called Christians.

Obviously a great favorite for the Christmas season and also proper to Advent, this hymn can be sung at any time of the year, but then an explanation of its roots in Psalm 98 will be helpful. Its themes of the coming of Christ and his rule in the world are appropriate for many Liturgies.

# ST. MATTHEW

**H**ello to all St. Matthew's parishioners. Listening to Father Justin's homily this morning (11/7) made me realize what I need to talk about. My first thought was what is a viable parish? It is a community of Christian people coming together to worship God for all he has done for us. A viable parish consists of people sharing their time, talents and treasures with each other. A viable parish has many people helping with the many ministries needed to celebrate the Mass. Namely lectors, ushers, servers and Eucharist ministers. Our parish does not. A viable parish has a choir and a congregation that sings lustily in praise to our God. Our parish does not. A viable parish has people to decorate, volunteer for fellowship, teach religious ed. and many other misc. "odd jobs". Our parish does not. A viable parish has people that give generously in Sunday collection, Catholic stewardship appeal, Nicaragua mission collection, green velvet and many other charitable collections. Our parish does *so very well* in monetary donations whenever it is asked of us! You are very generous in giving money to our church, Thank You All!!!

**B**ut now the cliches kick in! "Money speaks" is the first one that comes to mind, but money cannot proclaim the words of our Lord. It cannot hand out communion to "feed the multitudes". It cannot sing or play an instrument. It cannot collect itself or bring up the gifts. It is not the face and hands of Jesus, you are! Or how about "many hands makes the workload light". A huge thank you goes out to all who give their time in church and in any ministry related to the Mass, but you are a small group who will not give up, and continue to serve God every week. We get a lot of help from the Sacred Heart people to fill in the holes, so thank you to all who come to our church to fulfill an open ministry slot. And finally, "salvation cannot be bought" (from Father's homily) as the saying goes, "so many of us try to cut a deal with God for one reason or another. But the problem is that God is a very shrewd businessman. And if you don't offer Him that which is most important to you, He's just not interested."

**T**he big idea here (also from Father's homily) boils down to a simple question: what sort of a community are we really? Or how prepared are we to live the Gospel in truth and in faith? Are we selfless people like the woman in the Gospel. Or will we merely protect our personal interests above all." "When you give your time, talent and treasure to God and/or your neighbor you will directly be building up the Kingdom of Heaven with your own two hands as a true disciple." So let us prove to the Archdiocese (I know that we are among the 5 smallest parishes in the whole diocese) and to our heavenly Father, that we DO have a viable parish and we are willing to give of our time and our talents, and not only our treasures!

## *Horicon Conference*

Last Annual Report

*How will we bring peace and joy to the poor this Advent?*

The fiscal year recently ended on 9/30/21 after having completed 15 years of operations for our St. Vincent de Paul – Horicon conference. This will be the last fiscal year of operations for our conference here at Sacred Heart as there is no longer enough members to continue on as a conference. One member has elected to continue helping the needy of our area and will work with the Mayville conference to assist those in need of financial assistance.

We continued to assist the needy residents of Horicon, Juneau, Burnett, and Iron Ridge since the COVID-19 pandemic began by accepting applications over the telephone. Home visits have not yet restarted.

During this last fiscal year, 98 applications were processed which resulted in helping 187 family members to pay their rent, utility, medical or car repair bills. Gas cards were also distributed to 26 individuals looking for help with their transportation needs.

We are grateful for your donations this past year. Any donations will now be forwarded to the Dodge County District Council to continue to help the residents of this area. It is hoped that enough volunteers will one day be willing to help the needy and a conference can be restarted. If you are interested, please contact the office and we will get you the contact information to volunteer or ask any questions.

**T**HANK YOU to all the former conference members who were so dedicated in helping the area needy over the last 15 years! It proved to be a very rewarding ministry!

**During the week**, cancellations will occur if the Horicon School District has a late start, early release or is closing due to weather conditions. The Horicon School District will announce this information on local radio and TV.

\* *If a late start is announced*, the morning church programs & services will be canceled.

\* *If an early release is announced*, all afternoon and evening church programs or services will be canceled.

# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The Religious Education Classes are off to a great start! It truly makes my heart smile to see the children and youth in the building! When you realize and notice God's hand in all of this, it really takes you back for a second and brings such awareness of how we are meant to be here, doing exactly what we are doing, and doing it to the best of our ability with such love and care. The catechists were called..... and they said yes. The students were called.....and their parents said yes. We were chosen! And I am so grateful to be a part of it all. I'd like to share with you what's been happening in each religious program:

## Child Ministry (Grades K5-5th)

This year we combined K5 and 1st grade into one classroom. It has actually been a couple of years since we had any K5 students, so I am grateful to have these students with us. This class is also fortunate to have a regular parent volunteer each week to help as a teachers aide.

There will be thirteen students receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation and First Eucharist this school year. This class is also fortunate to have a permanent parent volunteer each week. Currently they are working on preparing for the sacrament of Reconciliation. In December they will have their retreat followed by the celebration of Reconciliation. Please keep these students in your prayers as they prepare.

For our Fall Service Project students will be creating place mats and cards for the elderly residents at Clearview for their Thanksgiving Dinner meal. I'm sure the residents will love the homemade gifts from the children and the placemats will add a special touch their table setting.

On December 13 at 6:30 pm the children will be performing their Christmas Program. All are welcome to attend. To me, this was always such a sweet and special way that seemed to ignite the Christmas spirit in my heart. Hope you will join us!



## Youth Ministry (Grades 6th-11th)

The youth are off to a great start and have been busy! Each school year, each grade level has scheduled opportunities to participate in weekend Mass, attend prayer services, receive the sacrament of Reconciliation, enjoy guest speakers, do service work, and fundraise. I can honestly say, one grade or another has done at least one of these so far this year! WHEW! Oh yeah, let's not forget the busy work of what is taught in the classroom. This really keeps them busy and engaged.

On October 20th, we had the pleasure of having guest speaker Anna Budelman come and talk to our youth and their parents about social media safety. Anna Budelman is FRIENDS, Inc.'s Prevention Educator and has a Bachelor's degree in Social Work. She presents to a variety of different audiences; starting in 2nd grade and expands into adult audiences. All presentations are given in an age appropriate, trauma informed manner. She presents on topics such as: healthy/unhealthy relationships, abuse prevention, bullying, boundaries and communication, technology safety and many more. Her hopes are that anyone who hears her presentations walks away with the information needed to lead safe lives. Anna had very good and helpful information to share and teach us all.

On November 1st, All Saints Day, the Child Ministry students attended Mass and performed some of the ministries at this Mass. K5 and first grade created "Saints on a Stick" and carried them as they processed in with Fr. Justin at the beginning of Mass.



Second grade were greeters and also carried up the gifts. Third grade sang with the youth choir. Fourth and fifth grade had speaking parts for the readings and intercessions and also helped with collections and altar serving. I am so proud of them! It is such a joy to see the children participate in this way.

# NEWS & HAPPENINGS

Another year of leaf raking is in the books! On October 23rd, some of our youth along with the Knights of Columbus set out to rake eleven yards this year. The day went very well, the weather was very cooperative, however, I think we were a little early this year, many leaves remained on the trees. I think we will push this event out a little further on the calendar by a week or possibly two, for the future.



Our fall fundraiser will once again be coffee. The youth will start this sale on November 17th and it will run through December 1st. Distribution of coffee will begin on December 15th. Just in time for the holidays. Did I mention how coffee makes for a great gift idea for the coffee lover in your life? On that same note of fundraising, we finally have the green light to resume our crowd favorite of pizza making! This sale will take place in the spring. Fr. Justin is very excited to finally be able to make pizzas with the youth. Something he has really missed. Please watch for more information on this in the near future.



This year there are twelve students in the eleventh grade who are preparing for the reception of the sacrament of Confirmation. Their journey has just begun, but will include two retreats which will give them the opportunity to spend quality time with their sponsors. Please keep these youth in your prayers as they walk this faith journey. Most Reverend Bishop Haines will be celebrating Confirmation with these

students on May 25, 2022 at 7:00pm here, at Sacred Heart Parish.

They have all said yes to the calling of a catechist and/or support staff. At times it is not an easy undertaking, but one that they are committed to for the sake of spreading the Good News. 
