



From the Desk of Fr. Justin...

At the time of this writing, it's the final days of December. As I keep a master list of books I've read throughout the year, I present to you my 2021 in review... in books read.

This year, I managed to read 33 books of varying difficulty and length... not counting comic books. Those are on a separate list. Prayers don't count either, as that's a formal part of my ministry. Since Lent of last year, I maintained a goal of 30 minutes of productive reading per day, which I'm grateful for and will continue to do throughout 2022. After all, my parents held me to a similar standard when I was a kid.

That out of the way, here are the statistics and the winners of the...

Most enjoyable children's book:

Anne of Green Gables, by LM Montgomery

Most enjoyable classic novel:

Les Liaisons Dangereuses, by Pierre Choderlos de Laclos

Most challenging religious book:

Divine Mercy in my Soul, by Sister Maria Faustina

Most overall educational book:

When Harry Became Sally, by Ryan T Anderson

Most likely classic novel to recommend to anyone:

Heart of Darkness, by Joseph Conrad

To wrap up with those last two awards, Heart of Darkness was the easiest classic I read this year. Compared to Don Quixote or Les Liaisons

Dangereuses (the other thick novels of this year), it is an accessible novel for most adult readers and is more advanced and thought-provoking than Mary Poppins or Alice in Wonderland. If you want to better your understanding of racism and/or national aggression, Heart of Darkness will significantly aid you in more ways than one.

Aside from that one, my #1 book-to-recommend-toy'all is When Harry Became Sally. It's a forthright look at the many issues and myths surrounding transsexuality, as a remarkably un-scientific cultural phenomenon. Because Ryan Anderson argues against transsexuality, the book is currently banned on most websites, including Amazon. However, it is still for sale on Barnes & Noble. I strongly recommend it for literally anyone old enough to handle the subject matter. The book is not "transphobic" and uses absolutely no hate speech, but boldly and clearly addresses the issues and logical fallacies that are not allowed to be asked in a public setting or on social media. If you have a few hours and \$20 to spare, I urge you to get a copy. It will arm you with logic and reason for the future, which you might very well use to prevent someone from going down a dark and difficult path in life.

Otherwise, onward to 2022: another year of literary adventure! I better start with the book that Archbishop Listecki gave me for Christmas... that's a good general policy. This year's gift is *Things Worth Dying For* by Charles J. Chaput. It seems like a good thing to read during my spiritual retreat.



Inclement weather may force our parish to cancel services and/or programs at times.



St. Sebastian | January 20

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 – 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGING DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

January 16, 2022, 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

God delights in you. How do you feel when you hear that? Delight usually comes with an exuberant flow of joy that seemingly arises from one's toes with the expression of great glee. Reflecting upon the deep measure of joy God has in us can be a source of joy for ourselves. Delight is infectious. A very young brother and sister were playing on the beach when the all too familiar ice cream truck made its daily rounds. The boy shook with excitement and delight as he took his sister's hand and exclaimed, "The ice cream man is here, isn't it great!" As they ran off toward the truck, one could hear the girl reply, "Yeah, I can't wait!" The experience of a child's delight in something so simple as ice cream, lifts our spirits from our burdens and transports us to the lighter, more innocent side of life.

Life is not meant to be a burden. Believe it or not, God actually wants us to be happy! In fact, the wedding feast at Cana shows us that God even puts His blessing on our happiness. It is okay to celebrate the wonder of ourselves and others. Life is good. It is always interesting to note that Jesus saves the good wine until last. You would think it would be the other way around. The superb quality of Jesus' wine points to the superior quality of life we find in Christ. It is not a life of burdens but a life of wonder and delight!
