PASTOR NOTE

Parish Retreat: As we continue our journey of Lent. I am pleased to invite you to our Parish Lenten Retreat. We will meet next Sunday, March 20th from 1pm to 6pm.

I will present two reflections:

The Last Supper: The Four Cups. We will learn the history of the Jewish Passover celebration. We will then examine closely how Jesus changed the Passover meal into the celebration of the Mass.

The Trial of Jesus Christ. We will examine the Gospels and piece together the events of Christ's trial. We will learn the Jewish and Roman political situation in first century Jerusalem. Finally, we will reflect on the criminal charges leading to Christ's execution and have a deeper appreciation of His innocence.

Susanna Prushinski will lead some sessions of personal reflection time. The Retreat will have Eucharistic Adoration, confessions and offer Evening Prayer. Come for the whole time or whatever fits your schedule. I hope that the Retreat will help all of us grow closer to Christ.

Pray for the people of Ukraine. We all have been watching the tragedies unfolding in Ukraine. So many people have been killed, injured, displaced, and lives changed forever. Answers to this tragedy do not come easily. Opinions are manifold and can sometimes cause division. But, we can all be united in offering prayers for the end to the violence and for all the people deeply affected by this war. There are a variety of ways that our parish can offer prayers for the people of Ukraine. You can offer prayers by making a visit to our Mother's Chapel, attend one of the daily Masses, or attend one of the sessions of Eucharistic Adoration. I know that all of these take some time in what is already a busy life. So, I share with you another suggestion of praying for the people of Ukraine. This process draws from the long-standing tradition of the importance of offering short prayers in a repetitive way. These short bursts of prayer can be quite effective and result in having a constant prayerful disposition. Find something in life that is somewhat repetitive like a clock chiming, a TV commercial, washing your hands, waiting at a stop light, or opening a door. When you do these little repetitive things, call to mind the tragic situation in Ukraine. Say a short prayer like, "Lord, help them." "Grant them peace." "End the war." "Help them." These little prayers will be quite pleasing to God. It will also be a way to keep before you the people of Ukraine. It requires only a little effort but will have great effect.

NOURISHED IN SPIRIT BY MSGR. KRUSE

"Truly, I say to you, today, you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:43) Almost immediately after pronouncing universal forgiveness to all of those who draw close to His saving sacrifice, Jesus personalizes and individualizes this forgiveness as He speaks to the repentant thief. Traditionally known as St. Dismas, this thief rebuked his accomplice who reviled against Jesus. He acknowledged his sinfulness and Jesus' innocence. This thief begged Jesus, "Remember me, when you come into your kingdom." Even on the cross, Jesus is the good shepherd seeking out the lost sheep. On the cross, He separates the sheep and the goats. From the agony of His cross He dispenses forgiveness and mercy to the repentant, while doling out condemnation towards those who reject His gift of mercy. To the repentant thief, Jesus proclaims a divine promise: "Today, you will be with me in paradise." See how much He loved St. Dismas. See how much He personally and individually loves each sinner. See how even an entire life of sinfulness can be forgiven with even the smallest cry of repentance. A life- long sinner can die a saint! Christ's mercy is always ready and available. As long as one breathes, forgiveness is possible. God never gives up. He knows the infinite ways to draw even the most hardened sinner to repentance. On the cross, Jesus canonized Dismas. And, He promised eternal happiness in paradise. We rejoice with St. Dismas.

"Woman, behold your son! Behold your mother!" (John 25:26) No one likes seeing a loved one suffer. Imagine the agony in Mary's heart as she watched these events unfold. She was a widow for many years. Her quiet joy-filled life with Jesus in Nazereth gave way to solitude as He was away proclaiming the Kingdom. Now her heart was pierced as she watched her son be condemned, crucified and died. Her heart and life were one with Him. She too was suffering. During her agony as she stood next to St. John, the faithful and beloved disciple, she realized that her son looked towards her. Imagine as their eyes met. A flood of memories overcame them. We pray that those memories softened our Lord's agony. But, they made it sharper all the more: how could such innocence and love be suffering so much? Her memories were interrupted as she heard her son say with such tenderness, "Woman, behold your son," as Jesus looked towards St. John. As He hangs, dying, Jesus makes provisions for His wounded mother. In a sense He says, "Mom, John will care for you now. Do not be afraid, you are not alone. I give you my closest friend." But, Jesus' words mean so much more. He reminds Mary of her most august dignity as the new Woman, the new Eve of His newly created Kingdom filled with the children of God. Mary is the Woman spoken of long ago as God condemned the serpent, "I will put enmity between you and the woman" (Gen. 3:15).




