Jesus said to them in reply, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!" - Lk 13:2-3

PASTOR NOTE

This Friday, March 25th is a big day for our parish. We will once again hold the annual parish fish fry! This year again will be a Drive-Thru only and dinners will be available for pickup between 5pm and 7pm. Dinners cost \$12. The Drive-Thru will be located on Anderson Street — please enter onto Anderson Street from Park Avenue and a volunteer will come to your car and take your order and deliver it. I hope that you can come out for a good fish dinner. The parish will provide a special treat in each fish dinner because March 25th is a great feast day.

This Friday, March 25th is the Solemnity of the Annunciation. On this Solemnity we recall that the Angel Gabriel came to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Gabriel announced the good news of salvation. God had chosen her to bring forth His Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ. Mary said: "Let it be done unto me, according to your will." At that moment the great miracle of the Incarnation took place within her womb: the eternal divine Son of God took human flesh. Christ's work of redemption began in the wonderful event of the Annunciation. God the Son descended from heaven to take on our fallen and sinful nature in order to raise us up through His Resurrection and Ascension into heaven.

The descent of Jesus from the glory of heaven down into the depths of our fallen human condition began on March 25th, the Feast of the Annunciation. His descent continued throughout His life. His descent reached its final depth in Christ's crucifixion and burial in the tomb. The saints have always tied together Christ's descent into the womb of Mary and His descent into the tomb of His burial. Mary was ever-Virgin and so only Jesus rested in her womb. The Gospels tell us that Christ's tomb was new and never used. So, only Jesus rested in this new tomb. The newness of both the womb and tomb teach us how God is doing something totally new. He is giving us the new life of salvation. This new life comes only through His descent, beginning in Mary's womb and culminating in the tomb. And, from the depths of the tomb, Jesus rose to new life, the glory of His resurrection. This reached greater glory in His ascent into Heaven.

Ancient tradition of the Church has held March 25th in great honor. March 25th has always been held as the day of Christ's conception in Mary. The Church has also held that March 25th is the actual date of Christ's crucifixion and burial. St. Augustine, writing in about the year 325, summarized Church tradition: "Jesus is believed to have been conceived on the 25th of March, upon which day also He suffered." Tradition holds that Jesus was conceived on March 25th and died on March 25th. This is further supported because of the feast of St. Dismis, who was the good thief crucified next to Christ. From the beginning, the Church has celebrated the feast of St. Dismis on March 25th, the day he died. St. Dismis died on the same day as Jesus.

At the cross, Mary becomes the mother of the Church. So, Jesus says to John, "Behold your mother!" Not only is He assigning John to care for Mary as if she were his natural mother, but now she is to be acknowledged and revered as his supernatural mother - the mother of grace. At the cross, Mary's universal identity as Woman and Mother are revealed for all the world to embrace. Only through her, Christ came into the world to offer His sacrifice of forgiveness. From the beginning, God's plan included Mary: Christ's gift of new life comes to us only through her motherhood. In His dving words, filled with tenderness, clarity, simplicity and love, Jesus placed the world under Mary's care. And, He gives His mother to each of us. She is our advocate who always pleads our cause. How many have been saved because of her faithful intercession? Mary, our Mother, pray for us, your children!

"I thirst." (John19:28) Over fifteen hours lapsed between the conclusion of the Last Supper and our Lord's death. That is a long time to go without food or water, let alone for one suffering such brutality. During the agony in the garden and the scourging, Jesus lost significant amounts of blood and fluids. His dehydration quickened His death. So, of course, Jesus called out, "I thirst." Immediately, someone compassionately took a sprig of hyssop and soaked it in wine. Jesus took the drink. They used a hyssop branch. Possibly, that was the only thing available. But, it was totally providential. Remember, the last plague against the Egyptians. Moses told them to procure a lamb, slaughter it, using a hyssop branch, soak it in the blood of the lamb and place it over the door lintels. The angel of death would pass over those houses marked with the blood of the lamb. While Jesus was being crucified, the Passover lambs were being slaughtered so that the Jews could celebrate the Passover feast. From the beginning, the Church has understood that Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away our sins. If we are washed in His blood, we will be saved. Jesus desires that all men be saved. So, His cry of thirst from the cross was a cry of evangelization. Jesus thirsts for souls to come to Him and receive God's mercy and love. He thirsts for our conversion. He thirsts for our response of love. He thirsts for our union with Him. He thirsts for us to serve Him. But remember His parable, "I was thirsty and you gave me drink...whatsoever you do for the least of my brothers, you do for me." We quench His thirst through our loving response to the love we have received from Him. We quench His thirst by thirsting for Him. And, what a wonderful drink we receive!


