PASTOR NOTE

I have to begin with a confession. I really do not like talking about myself. I don't purposefully try to be secretive about myself. I just prefer talking more about our Lord, the faith and all of you. But, recently, a few people have said to me, "We really don't know you. We would like to get to know you more." So, I thought I would share a few things about myself.

I was born on Good Friday, March 27, 1970. Yes, today is my fifty-second birthday. I was raised in Des Plaines, near Chicago. I lived there until 1988. My parents are Fred and Gail, and you might see them here and there at some of our parish events. As I grew up, my dad was a plumber. I loved driving around Chicago and hearing him point out the buildings he helped construct. My mom went to college while I was a little boy. Then she was a public school teacher. I attended public schools as a kid. I am the youngest of four kids. The oldest, my sister Deb, is married and lives in Florida. My brother Fred is married and lives in Deer Creek near Morton. My brother Charlie is married and lives in Texas. Between all of them, I have nine adult nieces and nephews, some of whom are married with kids. Sadly, my tenth niece died as an infant. Like so many families, distance and family history prevent us from seeing each other very often. Like many families, I pray that my siblings will someday return to the Church.

When I was about eight, I first began thinking of the priesthood. Throughout high school I attended some retreats, especially Peoria's Emmaus Days retreat. These helped me hear God's call to the priesthood. I entered the seminary in Winona, Minnesota, right after high school in 1988. I completed my studies in Philadelphia. I was ordained on May 25, 1996. I have had many assignments including working ten years as Vicar General. Happily, I returned to parish ministry in 2020.

I love parish work and getting to know the families, especially the youth. When I am not doing parish work, I enjoy relaxing in nature. For me, this means sitting near a lake or in the woods. I like reading, traveling, playing poker, doing puzzles, and most games. I love a delicious meal, a good drink and a fine cigar. I enjoy spending time with friends, especially my parents. When I was ordained, they became the directors of the Diocesan retreat center. They are now retired in Chillicothe. As I reflect on 52 years, I must say that I have been greatly blessed, especially to now serve as your pastor.

NOURISHED IN SPIRIT BY MSGR. KRUSE

"Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?, which means, 'My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Mat. 27:46/ Mark15:34) This particular last word of Christ is some what unique. It is the only one that appears in two gospels. Traditionally, it is the only one that retains its original Aramaic. And, it is the only one in the form of a question. But, what makes it the most unique, is perhaps, its meaning. On the surface, its meaning is the most obscure and confusing. At its basic level of meaning. Jesus is quoting the first line of Psalm 22. (I encourage you to read this Psalm during Holy Week.) By quoting this Psalm, Jesus is identifying Himself with the Psalm's suffering man. He is the Messiah that they have been waiting for as mentioned in the Psalm and throughout the Old Testament. This connection is recognized by many of the bystanders and helps move many of them to conversion. However, Jesus is not simply connecting Himself to the ancient Psalm. His words of desperation connect Him to all sinners. Isolation, abandonment and loneliness are the most fundamental consequences of sin. When Adam and Eve sinned, they hid from God. Through our sinfulness, we become corrupted and wounded. Our mind becomes twisted and loses perspective. We feel abandoned and forsaken. How many times have we sat in the misery of our sin and cried out to God, "Where are you?" On the cross, Jesus took on all the effects of our sinfulness – even the emotional anguish of despair and isolation. On the cross, Jesus feels the real darkness and emptiness of sin. He feels the heart-wrenching pain of the lost sheep, the prodigal son, the adulterous woman, the despairing Judas, the weeping Peter, the "rock bottom" of the drunk, all of our sinful anguish and misery. He physically and emotionally felt all of it. He took all of it to heart. His anguished cry is not play acting, but real pain. In these words, Jesus expresses the emotional depths of His descent into sin. In a moment, when He dies, He will discover the existential, personal, physical, and complete depth of man's sinful fall. In our sin, we have fallen down away from God. Christ will go down further than any of us. We suffer our individual death. He will suffer all of humanity's sinful death. The one died for us all! And, in the name of everyone, Jesus cries out to the Father,

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


CCW will be selling 50/50 raffle tickets next weekend after all Masses. The ticket table will be located outside of Harkrader Hall.

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


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
