NOURISHED IN SPIRIT BY MSGR. KRUSE

I love to travel. One of my favorite places to visit is the eternal city of Rome. I have enjoyed leading a number of pilgrimages to Rome. Besides visiting the holy places throughout the city, we also get a chance to shop. On one trip I wanted to buy a print depicting our Lord's resurrection. I looked everywhere and couldn't find one. I could find crucifixion scenes, saint pictures, post cards, statues, everything. But, there was no image of the resurrection. It was kind of sad that the our central tenet of faith was neglected – even in Rome. It left me wondering if this resurrection absence was simply because I was shopping outside of the Easter season or if it was something much deeper. Do we in regular practice overlook the importance of the resurrection?

What is your attitude and understanding of the resurrection? How often do you meditate upon the resurrection? Do you have an image of the resurrection in your house or prayer book? In this Easter Season we turn our attention towards the resurrection.

After our Lord Jesus truly died upon the cross, the scriptures record for us the events of Jesus' burial. The Blessed Mother, St. John, Joseph of Arimathea, Nicodemus, Mary Magdala and the other pious women, prepared Jesus' body for burial. They lovingly placed him in a new rock hewn tomb that was close to his place of crucifixion. The Jewish leaders demanded that Roman guards be stationed at the tomb. The tomb was sealed with an imperial mark. This imperial seal could only be broken by the governor's command. Violating this seal was a gravely punishable offense. These recorded events show us that it was truly Jesus' body that was buried, guarded by a cohort of soldiers and only by command of the governor could that tomb be re-opened. In the mind of the governor and the Jewish leaders, the book was closed on the holy man Jesus. In the mind of God, it had just been opened.



Chaplet of Divine Mercy *Recited using regular Rosary beads.*

"I realize more and more how much every soul needs God's mercy throughout life and particularly at the hour of death. This chaplet (of Divine Mercy) mitigates God's anger, as He Himself told me." -St. Faustina

At the beginning:

Our Father... Hail Mary... Apostle's Creed...

On each Our Father bead (before each decade):

Leader: Eternal Father, I offer you the body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ,

All: in atonement for our sins and the sins of the whole world.

On each Hail Mary bead (of each decade):

Leader: For the sake of his sorrowful passion, *All:* have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Concluding Doxology (after five decades):

All: Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world. (Recite three times)

Closing Prayer:

Leader: Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasure of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Lord and Mercy itself.
