



PASTOR NOTE

This is a wonderful weekend of grace for our parish. On Saturday, April 30th, our second graders received their First Communion. It is truly a wonderful moment to offer the Holy Eucharist to these children for the first time. I am always amazed at their excitement and deep faith. They are an example for us to embrace more deeply the mysteries of Holy Communion. I have listed their names on the front of the bulletin, please take a moment to congratulate them, but even more, pray for them.

Also, on the cover the bulletin, I have listed the five youth who will receive the sacrament of Confirmation on May 1st, at the cathedral in Peoria. When we were in class, I used a simple example to teach them about Confirmation. I gave each student a balloon. I explained that the flat balloon was like the time when each of us were born. We had very little capacity to love God and little power to follow His path of love. Then they blew up their balloon, but just a little bit. This matched the time we were baptized. Our soul was expanded in its capacity to love God and empowered us to live a holy life. Our soul was filled with divine grace and life. Then, the youth blew up their balloons as full as possible. This represented the sacrament of Confirmation. In this sacrament their soul is filled with the Holy Spirit. God will expand their souls and empower them more fully to love God fully and live a holy life. The sacrament of Confirmation seals them with the fullness of God's grace and love. The gifts of the Holy Spirit will empower them to fulfil God's plan and mission in their lives. As they held their filled-up balloons, I asked them to quickly let out all the air. Of course, they loved making all kinds of noise as the air sputtered out of the balloon. I explained to them that this is similar to when we choose to sin. Our soul loses its divine grace, life, and love. We cast God out of our souls. We reinflated our balloons, which symbolized going to Confession. Absolution immediately fills us with God's grace and restores us to the full capacity we enjoyed before the deadly choice of sin. The balloon offers a simple explanation of the sacraments, grace, and God's gift empowering us to love Him and our neighbor. I kindly ask that you offer prayers for our youth as they receive Confirmation. May they always cooperate with their greater capacity to love God and neighbor.

Finally, this is a weekend of grace because I am very happy to announce that the Diocese has completed all of the priest assignment changes. I am not included in these changes. I am very happy to remain as your pastor here at St. Louis parish. I look forward to another year of leading our parish. May God continue to bless us abundantly.

NOURISHED IN SPIRIT BY MSGR. KRUSE

In our day and age, there seems to be a general misunderstanding and denial of Christ's real bodily resurrection. For instance how do you answer these questions: Is Jesus alive right now? Is he living in his real human body right now? If you placed your hand on his chest, would you feel a heart beat? Could you feel him breathing? Each of these questions' answer is 'yes.' However, we often say things like Jesus is alive in each of us, in our heart, in our memory, in our faith, in our neighbors. This is true. But, few of us understand that Jesus is really, truly, bodily alive in the glory of heaven – with real hands, feet, heart, hair, eyes, etc. Most of us spiritualize Jesus' resurrection and deny or misunderstand that it's a real bodily resurrection. Christ did not resurrect in our faith, our heart, our memory or in spirit. When Christ rose from the dead, he rose in a real, true, 'like ours' body. He wasn't a ghost, a spirit, a figment of imagination, or an ideal of faith. We must re-capture the truth that Jesus rose in his human body! And, we are also destined to enjoy a bodily resurrection.

This point is of the greatest importance. It teaches us God's love for the human body. He created the body good and beautiful. At the resurrection, he did not cast aside our body, but raised up and glorified it. Our society has a hostile and disrespectful attitude towards the body. We devalue human life. We treat our bodies as objects of lustful pleasure. We treat our body as if it is detached from our human person. If we recapture a deep understanding of bodily resurrection, we will have a different attitude towards our own body and that of others.

If we truly lived the resurrection – if we truly lived that fact that our bodies are destined to be resurrected and glorified – how would things be different? Our body is destined to actually behold the glory of God – your actual eyes will see God, your actual ears will hear the voice of God, and your actual hands will touch God. So will your neighbors. How could we be disrespectful to our body, which is so loved by God that he wants it to behold his glory and share in his glory. How can we denigrate our neighbor who also is destined for the glory of God? How would our day to day life be different if Christ's resurrection was more in the forefront of our mind and action. Imagine the joy, the hope, the love, the peace, the happiness, the respect. Imagine how our prayer would be enriched if we more fully comprehended that we were speaking to the resurrected, living Christ? Everything changed on the day of Christ's resurrection. Christ raised humanity to divine glory. How would you be different if you embraced and lived this change, this life of glory?

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE: Last weekend the Knights of Columbus collected 176 nonperishable food items and \$1,767 in monetary donations for the Bureau County Food Pantry. A majority of the items were "high need." The Pantry staff was very pleased with all the breakfast cereal, peanut butter, mac & cheese and canned fruit. 

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
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
