PASTOR NOTE

We all know that sacred music is an integral part of the Mass. It can speak to our hearts in a deeply personal way, as well as provide a sense of security as we sing old familiar hymns and Mass parts. As you know, we have not been able to have a full array of music at most of our Masses. For many months, I have been working to provide a long-term solution.

I am very pleased to announce that I have recently hired Matthew Ernat as the Director of Music for our parish. A few years ago, Matthew earned a bachelor's degree in music with a concentration in voice. He is accomplished in playing the organ and other instruments. As Music Director he will plan our weekly music, play at Sunday Masses, and other celebrations. Eventually, he will coordinate new cantors and a choir. I am confident that he will do well for our Mass music now an in the future.

By coincidence Matthew also has many years of experience in landscaping. And, for some time he has helped with his home parish's youth group. As part of Matthew's responsibilities, he will maintain the many beautiful gardens and trees on our property. He will also assist me with our parish youth program. For some time, I have been trying to figure out how the three areas of music, landscaping and youth ministry could be enhanced and strengthened. By a wonderful grace, I have been able to hire someone for one full time position that will help in these three areas of our parish.

I know that we have many wonderful volunteers who help with music, landscaping and youth group. These volunteers will continue their good work. It is my vision that Matthew's new position will enhance and coordinate the good work already being done by our volunteers. He is not replacing the volunteers. Matthew will take up the bulk of the work and coordination of music, landscaping and youth ministry. I am confident that these areas will be strengthened.

Currently, Matthew and his wife Grace live near Chicago. They have been working to re-locate to our area. Regretfully, this has proven harder than expected. Matthew has agreed to come to Princeton for our weekend Masses, while they continue to house hunt. On Memorial Day weekend, Matthew will begin playing at our Masses. Once they relocate, Matthew will take up his full-time position and all the responsibilities with music, landscaping and youth group.

I encourage you to welcome Matthew to our parish and to his new position. Sometime in the future I will ask Matthew to share some more things about himself.

Invitation to Become an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion

It is truly good to see so many people returning to Mass. I hope that you all have noticed an increase in the Mass attendance. You may have noticed that we have returned to having four stations for the distribution of Holy Communion at each Mass. I hope that you have also noticed that this has facilitated faster distribution. Currently, we have only about a dozen Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC), previously called Eucharistic Ministers. These are the volunteers that help the Deacon and me distribute Holy Communion. I am grateful for their dedication. I know that lately they have been going the extra mile. We need more volunteers to help lessen the load.

I invite you to consider volunteering as an EMHC. This is a tremendous service to the parish and can help you grow closer to our Eucharistic Lord. Considering that this volunteering is directly related to the Eucharist, there are some requirements to volunteer. The Diocese summarizes these requirements as: being at least aged 18 and a "Catholic of excellent character and obvious spiritual devotion and who live their faith in harmony with the Gospel and the laws of the Church." EMHC's must attend a training session; serve at least two Masses a month; bring Communion to the homebound at least one time a month; and, receive a mandate from the Bishop.

There will be a training session of Sunday, June 5th at 1pm in the church. During this session I will explain the requirements in more detail as well as explain the manner of distributing Holy Communion. This session may be about 90 minutes. Anyone interested in becoming an EMHC is invited to attend. I ask that all current volunteers also attend this training session. Please contact me if you have any questions. Thank you. Msgr. Kruse

NOURISHED IN SPIRIT BY MSGR. KRUSE

Memory is very important in our personal life. Our time of prayer must include moments of remembering. Our personal prayer should take time reflecting on the events of the past: the Old Testament, Jesus, the life of the Church and the ways of the saints. Our memory is the fuel of prayer. Reflecting on these past events give us courage and motivation for holiness. They cast light on our life's situation. They teach us how to grow in holiness. These memories will not carry the power of anamnesis. However, by remembering God's works in the past we are more equipped to be united with him today. Our memory is a doorway to holiness.

In our prayer, we should also remember God's work in our own personal life. Remember those moments of grace, especially the sacraments. Call to mind how you have been forgiven and converted. Think about the times when God saved you from difficulty or hardship. Remember how you have changed and grown. These memories may be a cause of joy or a cause of pain. The joyful will assist us to stay focused on God. While the painful memories may be a means to experience real healing and forgiveness, God wants to totally heal us, including our memories. Remembering the past allows God to transform you today.

Our memory is also crucial to our life of morality. Throughout the Old Testament God constantly disciplined his people. They sinned by forgetting him and his deeds. In almost every case, we fall into sin because we forget God. We forget his works, his love, his power and his law. By forgetting, we choose to divorce ourselves from God's teaching and rule of life. Constantly remembering God, his deeds, and his teachings can be a wonderful means to staying holy and avoiding sin. And, it's a means towards forgiveness. We remember God's mercy and approach him in confession. God demands we make use of the sacrament of confession because as we confess our sins, we remember, and our lapsed memory is healed. Healing of sin requires a process of remembering. But, in confession, you do not just remember your sins. We also remember the saving works of Jesus. And, this remembrance is a moment of anamnesis - the Holy Spirit touches our memory and the healing power of the cross is really, truly, and sacramentally present. We truly hear Jesus say, "Father, forgive them. They do not know what they are doing." Anamnesis brings healing.

In closing, I encourage you to take more seriously the importance of memory in the spiritual life. Devote more time in prayer to allowing God to remind you of things in the past – both in the works of salvation and in your own life. These memories can be moments of real grace and growth in holiness. And, sometimes, they are even a divinely filled memory, an anamnesis.
