#### Second Sunday of Advent

We see the great Advent Saint, St. John the Baptist, appear in this Sunday's Gospel. His strong voice tries to rouse us to the demands of discipleship! He says, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" As Catholics, one way we repent is by celebrating the sacrament of



reconciliation. In celebrating this sacrament and making a good confession, our intention is to be forgiven of our sins and live a new life freed from sin. Frequent confession is one of the Holy Habits that we are reflecting on in our Advent Preaching Series. Here are the times for Reconciliation during Advent:

#### Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception Thursday December 8

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is the Patronal Feast of the United States of America and is always a Holy Day of Obligation. Please plan to attend Mass on Thursday at 6:30 a.m., 12:10 p.m., or 6:30 p.m. (bilingual). The sacrament of reconciliation will be offered before the 6:30 p.m. Mass.

The Immaculate Conception is the conception of the Virgin Mary in the womb of her mother, St. Ann, free from original sin by the virtue of the merits of her Son, Jesus, who offers His mother this special advantage. The Catholic

Church teaches that God acted upon Mary in the first moment of her conception, keeping her "immaculate," without the stain of sin, including original sin. We need to be sure not to confuse Mary's <u>Immaculate</u> <u>Conception</u> with the <u>Virginal Conception</u> of Jesus in Mary's womb. It is also erroneous to think that Mary was conceived by the Holy Spirit in the way Jesus was. We know that Mary was conceived in the normal way and had two biological parents: St. Joachim and St. Ann. From the first instant of Mary's existence she was in the state of sanctifying grace and was free from the corrupt nature original sin brings. This is why the Angel Gabriel greeted Mary and said, "Hail, *full of* grace, the Lord is with you."

La Solemnidad de la Inmaculada Concepción es la Fiesta Patronal de los Estados Unidos de América y es siempre un Día Santo de Precepto. Por favor, planee asistir a Misa el jueves a las 6:30 a.m., 12:10 p.m., o 6:30 p.m. (bilingüe). El Sacramento de Reconciliación se ofrecerá antes de la Misa de las 6:30 p.m.

La Inmaculada Concepción es la concepción de la Virgen María en el vientre de su madre, Santa Ana, libre del pecado original por la virtud de los méritos de su Hijo, Jesús, que ofrece a su madre esta ventaja especial. La Iglesia Católica enseña que Dios actuó sobre María en el primer momento de

su concepción, manteniéndola "inmaculada", sin la mancha del pecado, incluyendo el pecado original. Debemos asegurarnos de no confundir la <u>Inmaculada Concepción</u> de María con la <u>Concepción Virginal</u> de Jesús en el vientre de María. También es erróneo pensar que María fue concebida por el Espíritu Santo como lo fue Jesús. Sabemos que María fue concebida de forma normal y tuvo dos padres biológicos: San Joaquín y Santa Ana. Desde el primer instante de la existencia de María, ella estaba en estado de gracia santificante y libre de la naturaleza corrupta que trae el pecado original. Por eso el ángel Gabriel saludó a María y le dijo: "¡Alégrate!, *llena de gracia*, el Señor está contigo".

# **Gospel Reflection**

#### **Matthew 3:1-12** I'm coming to grips with the fact that I am getting older, and as part of that I realize my vision is not as good as when I was younger. Perhaps someday soon I will even have to get bifocals. But

that's not necessarily a bad thing; bifocals can make our vision clearer, and they would be perfect for today's readings!

When we use our spiritual bifocals to look at today's readings, we see two different images. Looking through the lower lens, we do indeed see the excitement and the joy of the coming birth of the Messiah. Isaiah and John the Baptist both point toward the arrival of the Savior, a Savior who will soon be born and come among us on Christmas. But we can't look ONLY through the lower half of our glasses. This time of year, it is easy for us to focus just on the coming of Christmas; but that is only part of this season's meaning.

We need to also look through the top part of our glasses, to see things that are farther away. Using the top part of the glasses, we can read that both Isaiah and John are looking beyond Christmas to the final coming of Christ when he comes again at the end of Time. And both John and Isaiah tell us: we had better be prepared for both comings.

And a clearer vision allows me to better examine my life, to see those things I need to do to prepare for Christ's coming. The Advent season provides me with the resources to do so: beautiful scriptures for my prayer life, opportunities for the sacrament of reconciliation and multiple avenues for charitable activities.

So while doing your Christmas shopping, make time for a spiritual purchase – a special pair of Advent bifocals – you can get two views for the price of one!

# Our Lady of Guadalupe Mass & Celebration December 12 at 6:30 PM

The Image of Our Lady of Guadalupe presents the Catholic Faith in a way that was immediately understood and accepted by the native Mexican Indians. It is impossible to describe fully the rich symbolism contained on the Tilma of Juan Diego because every detail of color and of form carries a theological message.

Our Lady's **hair**, parted in the middle and hanging loosely, indicates she is a virgin maiden.

Scientific analysis has shown • reflections of people in the Virgin's eyes, just as any human eye would reflect. There are 13 total figures (including Juan Diego and Bishop Zumárraga) that form two scenes in both eyes.

One can **see a cross** in the center of the medallion that she carries on the upper part of her dress. This manifests her consecration to her Son Jesus, whose cross reminds us of both His total sacrifice for love and the moment when he gives us Mary as our Mother.

The symbol of the Cross was seen on the sails of the Spaniards' ships.

The Virgin's identity as a woman of heaven and earth is affirmed by her garments' colors and decorations: her reddish tunic is the color symbolic of earth, while the star-speckled green-blue mantle symbolizes the heavens. The mantle's color indicates her royalty, since only the Aztec emperors could wear cloaks of that color. The Virgin, Queen of heaven and earth, points us toward the truth that God is love, and mankind is the recipient of His love.

#### The 8-petaled flowers

symbolize the day of new creation. The 'blossom' is in the form of a hill, and the stem is presented as a river. The "hill-water" represented the concept of civilization. The 'hill' represents the highest point of encounter between God and man. Viewed upside down, the flower/stem takes the form of a heart – source of life, which belongs to and has its origin in God. Our Lady's appearance is mestiza, both Aztec and Spanish, showing the two cultures coming together at this point in history.

Our Lady stands on the moon. The crescent moon symbolized the Aztec god Quetzalcoatl, the feathered serpent moon god. She has clearly crushed and defeated him. **The Virgin's shoe**, which appears over the moon, has no color, but is simply the raw tilma. This is inexplicable. An angel with eagle's wings supports the Mother of God. The eagle was the "bird of the sun." Here the angel is the messenger of the Virgin. The angel wears both a tunic of the same color and a brooch like hers. The angel holds her mantle in one hand and the robe with the other, signifying the Son she bears is from both heaven and earth. The stars on her mantle signify she comes from heaven - the Queen of Heaven. The constellations are in the exact position as appeared before dawn on the morning of December 12, 1531.

Her hands are joined in prayer and, therefore, she is not God but clearly there is one greater than she, and she points her finger to the cross on her brooch.

The image of Our Lady of Guadalupe depicts a **dark ribbon above her womb**, indicating that she is a woman anticipating the birth of God's only Son. The Spanish expression is encinta, "adorned with ribbon."

In the center of her tunic, overlying her womb, is a four petal jasmine flower which is the sign of the Divine and the center of the cosmic order to the Aztec. The Virgin's Baby, Jesus, is Divine and the true center of the universe.

The **4-petaled flowers** with leaves on her tunic symbolize to the Aztecs that the fifth-age, the Age of Peace, has begun.

The Virgin of Guadalupe is shown **among the clouds**, representing her divine origin.

Our Lady **stands in front** of the sun. The sun symbolized the greatest Aztec god - Huitzilopochtli. She announces the God who is greater than their sun god.

#### Art & Environment Wish List

Throughout the Seasons of the Church Year we have a dedicated team of people who help us enliven our celebration of the Mass, through their decorating and care for the sanctuary and the altar. This group of folks works with a very small budget each year, which primarily takes care of the flowers for the Seasons of Christmas and Easter. As we have striven to be good stewards of the resources we have been blest with, we are now at the point where some of our cloth and other furnishings need to be refreshed or replaced. We can only do this through your generosity! This list includes a few examples of what we are looking for and their associated costs.

#### Set of New Altar Cloths/Fabric for Decorating

Ranges from \$1,200 - \$2,500 PER SEASON, depending upon the style and size of the altar cloths which are used. Seasons of Christmas and Easter, where we use full cloths that drape to the floor cost considerably more. We are looking forward to new altar cloths for the Seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time. We would ideally like to purchase a couple of new sets each year, so that we can spread out the cost and be responsible stewards of your gifts.

#### New Censor/Thurible/Incense Stand

\$1,200. Our current stand has been around for many years and is very worn. It also does not match any of our altar appointments or candle sticks. This new stand would integrate well into our décor as needed.

#### New Advent Wreath/Stand

\$2,500 - \$3,000. We have been making do using our Altar candle sticks and carefully attaching a wreath to them. Making the investment in an actual Advent wreath stand for the church will allow us to spend less time in setup, be more creative in our decorating of the wreath, and allow us more time to focus on other parts of the church in our Advent décor.



#### **Sanctuary Lamp Stand**

\$3,000. A floor-standing sanctuary lamp stand would allow us some options for placement of the sanctuary lamp. Last year, we used a temporary setup for this during Lent, which was a bit precarious. Having a floor stand allows us a safe way to keep the sanctuary lamp visible throughout the Seasons of the Year.

#### **Torch Stands**

\$1,400. We currently have several processional candles/ pew torches, which we rarely use because they are difficult to store and to setup for use. Having storage stands for them, would allow us to utilize them much more easily, and use them for special liturgical celebrations and Masses throughout the year.

#### Blessed Carlo Acutis' Eucharistic Miracles of the World December 8 – 10, 9am-7pm December 11, 8am – 3pm.

Carlo Acutis was a boy from Milan, Italy, who had a great love for the Lord, the Eucharist, computers and the internet, hiking and other activities that young people do. Because of his love for Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, he gathered information of all of the recorded Eucharistic miracles from around the globe, and cataloged these into a website. He finished his work in 2005. A year later, Carlo died at the age of 15 from leukemia. He was beatified in 2020. Since that time, a traveling exhibit of panels has been developed, using the information he cataloged. A Relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis will accompany the exhibit – be sure to come visit this exciting display!


# **MDCC Enrichment Wing Final Updates**

#### Windows, Door, and Natural Light-Oh My!

These finishing touches truly make a huge difference in the community and childcare rooms, making them warm and welcoming, as well as wonderfully functional. Both rooms are currently being used by faith formation on a regular basis, and the community room comfortably holds medium-sized parishioner groups or outside guests with its own access from outside, a kitchenette, and a bathroom.


