

Parish News and Words from Our Pastor

Second Sunday of Ordinary Time

Please see Dcn. Jerome's article for a reflection on the Sunday readings. This Sunday we are returning to Ordinary Time before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023. Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. The USCCB describes it in this way:

Christmas Time and Easter Time highlight the central mysteries of the Paschal Mystery, namely, the incarnation, death on the cross, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ, and the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion. This is living the life of Christ.

Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ. The goal, toward which all of history is directed, is represented by the final Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. As we continue our faith journey here at STA, we are committed to our Diocesan "Go Make Disciples" initiative and are preparing to see what the "Into the Deep" Diocesan Strategic Future Planning details for us. Hopefully, if the timeline is followed, we will know (by March 2023) the final plan for our new "Pastorate" and the priests who will be serving here. Through "Into the Deep" we will come together and work together in new ways, so that "Go Make Disciples" might bear greater fruit and enable us to more effectively:

Follow Jesus • Reclaim Sunday • Evangelize Youth • Equip Youth • Equip Leaders • Serve Neighbors

There is nothing ordinary about Ordinary Time, especially for us in 2023! When we use our time to grow in love for God and others, no matter what time we live in, time is always extraordinary!

Former President of the USCCB Called for Building the "Beloved Community," Inspired by Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Example

Archbishop Gomez's full statement follows:

"As our nation prepares to commemorate the life and witness of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., we are grateful for his courageous stand in solidarity with all who suffer injustice and his witness of love and nonviolence in the struggle for social change. But we are once again painfully aware that we are still far off from his dream for America, the 'beloved community' for which he gave his life."

"We have come a long way in our country, but we have not come nearly far enough. Too many hearts and minds are clouded by racist presumptions of privilege and too many injustices in our society are still rooted in racism and discrimination. Too many young African American men are still being killed in our streets or spending their best years behind bars. Many minority neighborhoods in this country are still what they were in Rev. King's time, what he called 'lonely islands of poverty.' Let us recommit ourselves to ensuring opportunity reaches every community.

"In recent years, we have seen disturbing outbreaks of racism and prejudice against other groups. There has been a rise of anti-Semitic attacks and also ugly displays of white nationalism, nativism, and violence targeting Hispanics and other immigrants. Such bigotry is not worthy of a great nation. As Catholics and as Americans, we must reject every form of racism and anti-Semitism.

"Racism is a sin that denies the truth about God and his creation, and it is a scandal that disfigures the beauty of America's founding vision. In our 2018 pastoral letter on racism, my brother bishops and I stated: 'What is needed, and what we are calling for, is a genuine conversion of heart, a conversion that will compel change and the reform of our institutions and society.'

"Let us honor the memory of Rev. King by returning to what he called 'the best in the American dream and the most sacred values in our Judeo-Christian heritage.' Let us commit ourselves once more to building his 'beloved community,' an America where all men and women are treated as children of God, made in his image and endowed with dignity, equality, and rights that can never be denied, no matter the color of their skin, the language they speak, or the place they were born."

Noticias Parroquiales y Mensaje de Nuestro Párroco

Segundo Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

Por favor no se pierda el artículo de Dcn. Jerome que ofrece una reflexión sobre las lecturas dominicales. Este domingo volvemos al Tiempo Ordinario antes de que comience la Cuaresma el Miércoles de Ceniza, 22 de febrero de 2023. El Tiempo Ordinario se refiere a todas aquellas partes del año litúrgico de la Iglesia Católica que no están incluidas en las temporadas principales de Adviento, Navidad, Cuaresma, y Semana Santa. La USCCB lo describe de esta manera:

El Tiempo de Navidad y el Tiempo de Pascua destacan los misterios centrales del Misterio Pascual, a saber, la encarnación, la muerte en la cruz, la resurrección y la ascensión de Jesucristo, y la venida del Espíritu Santo en Pentecostés. Los domingos y las semanas del Tiempo Ordinario, en cambio, nos llevan a través de la vida de Cristo. Este es el tiempo de la conversión. Esto es vivir la vida de Cristo.

El Tiempo Ordinario es un tiempo de crecimiento y de maduración, un tiempo en el que el misterio de Cristo está llamado a penetrar cada vez más en la historia hasta que todas las cosas sean finalmente captadas en Cristo. La meta, hacia la cual se dirige toda la historia, está representada por el último domingo del Tiempo Ordinario, la Solemnidad de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, Rey del Universo. (Sitio web de la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos -USCCB- de los Estados Unidos)

A medida que continuamos nuestro viaje de fe aquí en STA, estamos comprometidos con nuestra iniciativa diocesana "Go Make Disciples" y nos estamos preparando para ver los detalles de la Planificación Estratégica Futura Diocesana "Into the Deep" para nosotros. Con suerte, si se sigue el cronograma, para marzo de 2023 sabremos el plan final para nuestro nuevo "Pastorado" y los sacerdotes que estarán sirviendo aquí. A través de "Into the Deep" nos uniremos y trabajaremos juntos de nuevas maneras, para que "Go Make Disciples" pueda dar mayores frutos y permitirnos de manera más efectiva:

Seguir a Jesús • Recuperar el domingo • Evangelizar a la juventud • Equipar a la juventud Equipar líderes • Servir a los vecinos

¡No hay nada ordinario en el Tiempo Ordinario, especialmente para nosotros en 2023! Cuando usamos nuestro tiempo para crecer en el amor a Dios y a los demás, no importa en qué época vivamos, ¡el tiempo siempre es extraordinario!

El ex Presidente de la USCCB hace un llamado a construir la "Comunidad Amada", inspirado por el ejemplo del reverendo Martin Luther King, Jr.

A continuación, la declaración completa del arzobispo Gómez:

"Mientras nuestra nación se prepara para conmemorar la vida y el testimonio del reverendo Martin Luther King, Jr., estamos agradecidos por su valiente posición en solidaridad con todos los que sufren injusticia y su testimonio de amor y no violencia en la lucha por el cambio social. Pero una vez más somos dolorosamente conscientes de que todavía estamos lejos de su sueño para Estados Unidos, la 'comunidad amada' por la que dio su vida".

"Hemos recorrido un largo camino en nuestro país, pero no hemos llegado lo suficientemente lejos. Demasiados corazones y mentes están nublados por presunciones racistas de privilegio y demasiadas injusticias en nuestra sociedad todavía están arraigadas en el racismo y la discriminación. Demasiados jóvenes afroamericanos siguen siendo asesinados en nuestras calles o pasan sus mejores años tras las rejas. Muchos vecindarios de minorías en este país siguen siendo lo que eran en la época del reverendo King, lo que él llamó "islas solitarias de pobreza". Volvamos a comprometernos a garantizar que las oportunidades lleguen a todas las comunidades.

"En los últimos años, hemos visto inquietantes brotes de racismo y prejuicios contra otros grupos. Ha habido un aumento de los ataques antisemitas y así como también feas muestras de nacionalismo blanco, nativismo y violencia contra los hispanos y otros inmigrantes. Tal fanatismo no es digno de una gran nación. Como católicos y estadounidenses, debemos rechazar toda forma de racismo y antisemitismo.

"El racismo es un pecado que niega la verdad sobre Dios y su creación, y es un escándalo que desfigura la belleza de la visión fundacional de Estados Unidos. En nuestra carta pastoral sobre el racismo de 2018, mis hermanos obispos y yo declaramos: 'Lo que se necesita, y lo que estamos pidiendo, es una conversión genuina del corazón, una conversión que impulsará el cambio y la reforma de nuestras instituciones y sociedad'.

"Honremos la memoria del reverendo King volviendo a lo que él llamó 'lo mejor del sueño americano y los valores más sagrados de nuestra herencia judeocristiana'. Comprometámonos una vez más a construir su "amada comunidad", una América donde todos los hombres y mujeres sean tratados como hijos de Dios, hechos a su imagen y dotados de dignidad, igualdad y derechos que nunca pueden ser negados, sin importar el color de su piel, el idioma que hablen o el lugar donde vivan nació."

About Gracie's Icons

In Gracie's view, most of the ancient icons of saints tend to portray everyone as expressionless and hard to tell apart. But, she reminds us, the saints were hopeless, spunky, terrified, lonely, individualistic, rebellious, progressive, loving, ambitious, counter-cultural, or boisterous outcasts and sinners, who with God's grace reached beyond themselves and made the world and themselves so much better. In her icons, she portrays saints with their correct ethnicities to show the Church's more widespread, though sometimes hidden, diversity. She gives each saint a personality and a human expression, with a modern twist. To further this notion of extraordinary coming from ordinary, she has painted each on a discarded or thrifted piece of wood. Gospel Reflection

John 1:29-34

Back to Ordinary Time! Of course, it's not "ordinary" in the way we think today; it is ordinary in the Latin sense of "ordinalis," that is, numbered or ordered in the sense that there is a rhythm to the progression of time (First Sunday, Second Sunday, etc.). As the USCCB states, it is a time of time of growth and maturation for us as followers of Christ. So, what better theme to begin than baptism!

With the Baptism of the Lord earlier this week, and John's remarks in today's Gospel, baptism is thrust into a central position. It is a wonderful time to reflect on our own baptisms. We tend to think of baptism as a single event in time, but the baptismal rite is just a beginning of baptismal life. Baptism is an everyday reality in our lives. We remind ourselves of this each time we enter Church and bless ourselves with holy water and the sign of the cross. In this act we are reminding ourselves of our own baptism using the water and trinitarian formula. But we should also be reminding ourselves what it means to be baptized, both in terms of our gifts and our responsibilities. In baptism, the Holy Spirit comes upon us not just for one day, but every day. And with that Spirit, we are to "testify to the Lord" as John says today. As this new year unfolds into the "ordinary" rhythm of life, lest us testify to the Lord in all our ordinary moments of daily life through our words and actions.
