Parish News and Words from Our Pastor

Into the Deep Update

As you'll recall, last October, I shared with you 8 key takeaways from our *Current Reality Report*, which spelled out with great clarity and insight our current reality across the Diocese of Madison. Once again, the 8 key takeaways were:

- 1. The total population across the diocese is growing.
- 2. We are losing Catholic people, especially our younger people, and we are aging.
- 3. Fewer and fewer people are attending Mass.
- 4. Significantly fewer people are receiving sacraments.
- 5. Faith Formation enrollment is in a free fall, while Catholic school enrollment is holding relatively steady.
- 6. We have significantly fewer priests than in the past, but – praise God – we project to be relatively stable into the future.
- 7. People who give, donate about 2% of their income, with fewer older people giving more these days.
- 8. At present, we are facing financial challenges impacting both our mission and our employees.

Given these 8 key takeaways, it is obvious that the status quo isn't sustainable, and we are facing some significant challenges, which requires a significant and bold solution. Into the Deep, in conjunction with Go Make Disciples, is our attempt at this bold solution. This bold solution won't be easy. Transitions and change can be difficult for all of us. We become comfortable with what we know. We easily become attached to the people and the places that we love, or to the "ways we've always done things." We find comfort, peace, and consolation in that which is familiar, whether it be our priests, our favorite Mass times, or a myriad of other things that make up the life of a parish. Nevertheless, we know that change is often necessary in life, and it is certainly necessary for us here in the Diocese of Madison at this particular moment in history.

As St. John Henry Newman once said, "to live is to change and to become perfect is to have changed often." Given the rapidly changing religious landscape of our culture in recent years – with fewer and fewer people bringing their children to be baptized (or even having children), getting married in the Church, attending Mass, volunteering and supporting the Church, etc. – we must respond with conviction and courage. Now is the time for us to realign our resources boldly, proactively, and strategically. This is especially true if we are going to stop the failing practice of simply managing decline, more faithfully fulfill the Lord Jesus' mandate to "go make disciples," and build a healthier and holier reality to leave for future generations - for our children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. At the center of our bold solution through the Into the Deep strategic initiative is Bishop Hying's approved plan to group our current 102 parishes in the Diocese of Madison into 30 "pastorates" (which in time will become 30 new parishes, with their various configurations of churches and schools). We believe that by moving to this new model for parish life and priestly ministry, and by coming together and collaborating in new ways we will be better positioned to more effectively and fruitfully: 1) follow Jesus; 2) reclaim Sunday; 3) evangelize others;4) engage youth; 5) equip leaders; and 6) serve neighbors both now and well into the future.



Having said all of this, I want to let you know that following multiple levels of consultation throughout the diocese, and after prayerfully and prudently considering well over 1,300 comments that were received during the public feedback phase back in December and January, Bishop Hying has assigned our parish to be in Pastorate #21 in the final approved model, which

will take effect on July 1, 2023. The other parish in Pastorate #21 in the final approved model is Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish in Madison. Pastorate #21 will also be responsible for forming and educating the next generation of Christian disciples in Our Lady Queen of Peace school. Regarding priest assignments, Bishop Hying has assigned the following priests to serve the parishes of this new pastorate beginning on Saturday, July 1, 2023: Leading Pastorate #21 as Parochial Administrator will be: Fr. Brian Wilk. Assisting him with pastoral work and serving as Parochial Vicars will be Msgr. Jim Gunn and Fr. Jay Poster. Furthermore, Fr. Miro Szynal will be a priest living in residence and serving as Hospital Chaplain at UW Hospital and Veterans Hospital. And, Fr. Gabi Lopez-Betanzos will be the priest assisting with Hispanic ministry. I have been assigned as Parochial Administrator of Pastorate #12 in Beloit and Clinton, WI.

There are 2 additional items that I would like to share:

1. First, following the public feedback that was received in January and after various consultations, Bishop Hying plans to petition the Vatican to name St. Bernard in Madison as our diocesan cathedral.

2. Second, all of the information that I've shared with you today plus all of the final pastorates and new priest assignments for the entire diocese will be posted on the Into the Deep website: *www.Intothedeepmadison.org*.

In closing, we find ourselves living in a society which no longer places God at the center of life and instead seeks to live by standards opposed to the Gospel. This moment calls for saints – ordinary men, women, and children just like us – who faithfully love the Lord, who strive to joyfully live the mission of the Church, and who want families and friends to know Jesus Christ. We must be willing to go against the current tide of religious indifference and complacency and act boldly for Christ.

With Go Make Disciples as our renewed mission and Into the Deep as our strategic plan to assist, we hope to more effectively live and proclaim the Gospel to all people. I humbly ask for your prayers, support, patience, and commitment as we move forward. These ensuing months and years will demand much of us. It will not be easy, but when has authentically living the Gospel and following Jesus ever been easy? In embracing our call to go make disciples and in following the Risen Lord into the deep, we will be laying a sure and certain foundation of faith for the future so that our children and grandchildren might come to know, love, and serve Jesus, and get to heaven. Today then, as we ponder the wonder and the promise of the Transfiguration, we place our hopes, dreams, and hearts anew into the hands of the Lord, and we boldly look to the future believing that the best is yet to come – above all, the light, love, and joy of heavenly glory.

Noticias Parroquiales y Mensaje de Nuestro Párroco

Actualización de Into the Deep

Como recordará, en octubre pasado compartí con ustedes 8 "puntos clave" de nuestro "Informe de la realidad actual", que explica con gran claridad y conocimiento nuestra realidad actual en la Diócesis de Madison. Una vez más, los 8 puntos claves fueron:

- 1. La población total de la Diócesis está creciendo.
- 2. Estamos perdiendo gente católica, especialmente nuestra gente más joven; y estamos envejeciendo.
- 3. Cada vez menos personas asisten a Misa.
- 4. Significativamente menos personas están recibiendo los sacramentos.
- 5. La matrícula de la Catequesis está disminuyendo, mientras que la matrícula en Escuelas Católicas se mantiene relativamente estable.
- 6. Tenemos significativamente menos sacerdotes que en el pasado, pero, alabado sea Dios, proyectamos ser relativamente estables en el futuro.
- 7. Las personas que donan dan alrededor del 2% de sus ingresos; con menos personas mayores dando más en estos días.
- 8. En la actualidad, enfrentamos retos financieros que afectan tanto nuestra misión como a nuestros empleados.

Teniendo en cuenta estos 8 puntos claves, es obvio que lo que conocemos como normal no es sostenible y nos enfrentamos a algunos retos importantes, que requieren una solución significativa y audaz. Into the Deep, junto con Vayan y Hagan Discípulos, es nuestro intento de esta solución audaz. Esta solución audaz no será fácil. Las transiciones y los cambios pueden ser difíciles para todos nosotros. Nos sentimos cómodos con lo que sabemos. Fácilmente nos apegamos a las personas y los lugares que amamos, o a las "maneras en que siempre hemos hecho las cosas". Encontramos alivio, paz y consuelo en lo que es familiar, ya sean nuestros sacerdotes, nuestros tiempos de Misa favoritos o un sin número de otras cosas que conforman la vida de una parroquia. Sin embargo, sabemos que el cambio a menudo es necesario en la vida, y ciertamente es necesario para nosotros aquí en la Diócesis de Madison en este momento particular de la historia. Como dijo una vez San John Henry Newman, "vivir es cambiar y volverse perfecto es haber cambiado a menudo". Dado el panorama religioso de nuestra cultura que cambia rápidamente en los últimos años, con cada vez menos personas que traen a sus hijos para bautizarlos (o incluso tener hijos), casarse en la Iglesia, asistir a Misa, ofrecerse como voluntarios y apoyar a la Iglesia, etc. debemos responder con convicción y valentía. Ahora es el momento de realinear nuestros recursos de manera audaz, proactiva y estratégica. Esto es especialmente cierto si vamos a parar esta práctica fallida de simplemente manejar el descenso, cumpliendo más fielmente el mandato del Señor Jesús de "vaya y hagan discípulos" y construir una realidad más sana y santa para dejar a las generaciones futuras: para nuestros hijos, nietos y bisnietos. En el centro de nuestra solución audaz a través de la iniciativa estratégica Into the Deep se encuentra el plan aprobado por el Obispo Hying para agrupar nuestras 102 parroquias actuales en la Diócesis de Madison en 30 "pastorados" (que con el tiempo se convertirán en 30 (treinta) nuevas parroquias, con sus diversas configuraciones de iglesias y escuelas). Creemos que, al pasar a este nuevo modelo de vida parroquial y ministerio sacerdotal, y al unirnos y colaborar de nuevas maneras, estaremos en mejor posición para más eficaz y fructíferamente: 1) seguir a Jesús; 2) recuperar el domingo;

3) evangelizar a los demás; 4) involucrar a los jóvenes; 5) equipar a los líderes; y 6) servir a nuestros vecinos tanto ahora como en el futuro.

Habiendo dicho todo esto, quiero hacerle saber que después de varios niveles de consulta en toda la diócesis, y después de considerar con oración y prudencia más de 1,300 comentarios que se recibieron durante la fase de comentarios públicos en diciembre y enero, el Obispo Hying ha asignado a nuestra parroquia para estar en el Pastorado # 21 en el modelo final aprobado, que entrará en efecto el 1ro de julio de 2023. Las otra parroquia en el Pastorado # 21 en el modelo final aprobado es: Nuestra Señora Reaina de Paz. El Pastorado # 21 también será responsable de formar y educar a la próxima generación de discípulos cristianos en la escuela católica: Nuestra Señora Reina de Paz. Con respecto a los puestos de los sacerdotes, el Obispo Hying ha asignado a los siguientes sacerdotes para servir en las parroquias de este nuevo pastorado a partir del sábado, 1ro de julio de 2023: 4 El líder del Pastorado # 21 como Administrador Parroquial será: Padre Brian Wilk. Para ayudarlo con el trabajo pastoral y servir como Vicarios Parroquiales serán: Padre Jay Poster y Padre Msgr. Jim Gunn. Además, Padre Miro Szynal erá un sacerdote viviendo en residencia y sirviendo como Capellan en el Hospital de UW. Y, Padre Gabi Lopez-Betanzos será el sacerdote ayudando con Ministerio Hispano.

Antes de concluir, hay 2 notas adicionales que me gustaría compartir:

1. Primero, siguiendo los comentarios del público que se recibieron en enero y después de varias consultas, el Obispo Hying planea solicitar al Vaticano que nombre a St. Bernard en Madison como nuestra catedral diocesana.

2. En segundo lugar, toda la información que he compartido con ustedes hoy más todos los pastorados finales y los nuevos puestos de los sacerdotes para toda la diócesis se publicarán en la página de internet de Into the Deep: *www.Intothedeepmadison.org*.

Para terminar, nos encontramos viviendo en una sociedad que ya no pone a Dios en el centro de la vida pero que busca vivir según las normas opuestas al Evangelio. Este momento llama a santos, hombres, mujeres y niños comunes como nosotros, que aman fielmente al Señor, a que se esfuercen por vivir con alegría la misión de la Iglesia y quieran que nuestras familias y amigos conozcan a Jesucristo. Debemos estar dispuestos a ir en contra de la corriente actual de la indiferencia y complacencia religiosa y actuar con valentía por Cristo. Con Vayan y Hagan Discípulos como nuestra misión renovada e Into the Deep como nuestro plan estratégico que apoya la misión, esperamos vivir y proclamar el Evangelio a todas las personas de manera más efectiva. Humildemente les pido sus oraciones, apoyo, paciencia y compromiso a medida que avanzamos. Estos próximos meses y años exigirán mucho de nosotros. No será fácil, pero ¿cuándo ha sido fácil vivir auténticamente el Evangelio y seguir a Jesús? Al aceptar nuestro llamado a ir y hacer discípulos y al seguir al Señor Resucitado mar adentro, estaremos colocando una base segura y cierta de fe para el futuro, para que nuestros hijos y nietos puedan llegar a conocer, amar y servir a Jesús, y llegar al cielo. Hoy, entonces, mientras reflexionamos sobre la maravilla y la promesa de la Transfiguración, ponemos nuestras esperanzas, sueños y corazones nuevamente en las manos del Señor, y miramos con valentía hacia el futuro creyendo que lo mejor está por venir, sobre todo la luz, el amor y el gozo de la gloria celestial.

Stations of the Cross: A Lenten Walk with Jesus

The Stations of the Cross is a visual representation of Jesus' suffering from the time when Pontius Pilate condemned him to death until the moment when he was put in the grave. The stations of the cross are above all a prayer we pray when we remember Jesus' suffering. The St. Thomas Aquinas stations of the cross are located on the inner side walls of the main church. Booklets help us follow along with the reflections and prayers.

From now until Easter, there will be many opportunities to pray together with the Stations of the Cross.

On **Tuesdays during Lent at 6:00PM** (following the 5:30PM Mass) there will be a simple, traditional experience of the Stations of the Cross.

On **Fridays during Lent from 6-7:30pm**, we will pray the Stations of the Cross at 6:00PM, complete with music, followed by a simple supper of soup and bread. Each week, as we eat, we'll hear someone speak briefly about their experience of faith, and how Jesus has been part of their journey. This is a great opportunity to invite friends and neighbors to join us as we experience the great love of Jesus.


Exposición de Milagros Eucarísticos Salón Social en Santo Tomás de Aquino

Gospel Reflection

Going Out of the Comfort Zone

Alright, I am going to be upfront about this – today I am cheating. I am going to talk about a line that is not even in today's Gospel! It is a line that comes immediately before the first line of today's

story of the Samaritan woman at the well. It is a short sentence, only six words long: "He [Jesus] had to pass through Samaria." That makes it sound like the only road Jesus could take from Galilee to Jerusalem went through Samaria, a place reverent Jews avoided. But that is not the case; Jews usually traveled a route on the other side of the Jordan river that bypassed Samaria completely. So it was not a geographical necessity that made Jesus pass through Samaria – it was a theological necessity. It was important for Jesus' disciples (that includes us!) to listen to the message of evangelization that Jesus was preaching by "going out of the comfort zone" to reach people with whom he would normally not even associate. Sometimes we, too, are called to go out of our way, go someplace uncomfortable, to spread the Good News. This Lent, let us pray for the strength to be evangelists in difficult situations for the spreading of the Gospel.


