




Remembering our Faithful Departed

From Fr. Brian Wilk, Parochial Administrator Dear Friends:

I want to take this opportunity to expand upon the whole issue of selecting a new name for our merged parishes in Pastorate 21. In retrospect, perhaps I was not as clear as I could have been in my recent letter.

When parishes merge into a single entity, Canon Law – not the Diocese of Madison – requires that a new name be selected for the merged parishes. That said, the names of the current parishes are not being abandoned. We will operate under a new name of "St. X". This will be our corporate and legal name, both canonically and civilly. However, we will maintain two worship sites at St. Thomas Aquinas Church and Our Lady Queen of Peace Church. While in the long run there may be some combining of programs, the worship sites will remain the same.

Note the use of the word "church." A church is not a parish. A church is a worship site within a given parish. So, the names that we have used for many years will still be used to identify our worship sites and locations that we are all familiar with. I hope this addresses the concerns that I have heard.

I am still looking for some volunteers to serve on the naming committee from St. Thomas. If you have an interest, please let me know.

As always, if you have questions/concerns about Into the Deep, do not hesitate to get in contact with me. I have appreciated the feedback received thus far. It is of help to your priests as we move forward.

Gospel Reflection—Matthew 22:34-40 by Dcn. Jerome

"You've gotta look at the big picture." This phrase has a couple of applications to today's Gospel. Looking at the bigger picture, physically, this Gospel is part of a series of similar confrontations we've been hearing about these past few weeks between Jesus and the Jewish authorities. In these confrontations, Pharisees and Sadducees try to trap Jesus by focusing on the small stuff in opposition to the big picture.

And today, we hear the Pharisees trying to get Jesus to rank the commandments, to tell them which laws are most important. Instead, Jesus repackages the commandments into two interlocking commandments which encapsulates all the other commandments. Instead of looking at individual details, he puts everything into perspective in the big picture.

The problem is, while we yearn to grasp the big picture, we tend to live in the small picture. Our day-to -day tasks, our jobs, our homework, our errands consume our time, energy and attention. Try as we might, the little picture dominates our lives. Big picture might be how we think, but little picture is how we usually live. Little picture is human.

But today's Gospel isn't just about having us look at the big picture, it's telling us to live the big picture. How do we do this? By living the little picture in the correct way. In the Gospel, the first commandment is to love God. That's big picture. One easy, human way to do this is to follow the second commandment – love one another. How do we do this? Check out today's first and second readings. Exodus tells us to be good to widows, orphans, the poor and strangers. Do charitable deeds. Be good to each other. St. Paul tells the Thessalonians that they are to be commended not just because they had turned to God but because they showed this in their daily lives by becoming good imitators of Christ and were models of good living.

So let's focus on the big picture by living the small picture.


Queridos amigos Quiero aprovechar esta oportunidad para ampliar sobre el tema de la selección de un nuevo nombre para nuestras parroquias fusionadas en el Pastorado 21. En retrospectiva, tal vez no fui tan claro como podría haber sido en mi reciente carta.

Cuando las parroquias se fusionan en una sola entidad, el Derecho Canónico - no la Diócesis de Madison- exige que se seleccione un nuevo nombre para las parroquias fusionadas. Dicho esto, los nombres de las parroquias actuales no se abandonan. Funcionaremos bajo el nuevo nombre de "Santo/a X". Este será nuestro nombre corporativo y legal, tanto canónica como civilmente. Sin embargo, mantendremos dos lugares de adoración en la Iglesia de Santo Tomás de Aquino y en la Iglesia de Nuestra Señora Reina de la Paz. Aunque a largo plazo puede haber alguna combinación de programas, los lugares de adoración seguirán siendo los mismos.

Nótese el uso de la palabra "iglesia". Una iglesia no es una parroquia. Una iglesia es un lugar de adoración dentro de una parroquia determinada. Por lo tanto, los nombres que hemos utilizado durante muchos años se seguirán utilizando para identificar nuestros lugares de adoración y ubicaciones con las que todos estamos familiarizados. Espero que esto responda a las preocupaciones que he escuchado.

Todavía estoy buscando voluntarios para servir en el comité de nombramiento que pertenezcan a Santo Tomas. Si está interesado, déjeme saber.

Como siempre, si tienen preguntas o dudas sobre Into the Deep, no duden en ponerse en contacto conmigo. Agradezco los comentarios recibidos hasta ahora. Bendiciones y gracias por todo lo que hacen con nuestro Pastorado.



Reflexión del Evangelio del deacano Jerome Mateo 22:15-21

"Hay que mirar el panorama general". Esta frase tiene un par de aplicaciones al Evangelio de hoy. Mirando el panorama general, fisicamente, vemos que este Evangelio forma parte de una serie de enfrentamientos similares de los que hemos estado oyendo hablar estas últimas semanas entre Jesús y las autoridades judías. En estos enfrentamientos, fariseos y saduceos intentan atrapar a Jesús centrándose en las cosas pequeñas en oposición al panorama general.

Y hoy, escuchamos a los fariseos intentando que Jesús clasifique los mandamientos, que les diga qué leyes son las más importantes. En lugar de eso, Jesús reagrupa los mandamientos en dos mandamientos entrelazados que engloban todos los demás mandamientos. En lugar de fijarse en los detalles individuales, lo pone todo en perspectiva en el panorama general.

El problema es que, mientras anhelamos captar el panorama general, tendemos a vivir en un panorama reducido. Nuestras tareas cotidianas, nuestros trabajos, nuestros deberes, nuestros recados, consumen nuestro tiempo, nuestra energía y nuestra atención. Por mucho que lo intentemos, el panorama reducido domina nuestras vidas. Puede que pensemos en un panorama general, pero vivimos en un panorama reducido. El panorama reducido es humano.

Pero el Evangelio de hoy no se limita a hacernos mirar el panorama general, sino que nos dice que vivamos el panorama general. ¿Y cómo lo hacemos? Viviendo el panorama reducido de la manera correcta. En el Evangelio, el primer mandamiento es amar a Dios. Ese es el panorama general. Una manera fácil y humana de hacerlo es seguir el segundo mandamiento: amarnos los unos a los otros. ¿Cómo lo hacemos? Mira la primera y la segunda lectura de hoy. El Éxodo nos dice que seamos buenos con las viudas, los huérfanos, los pobres y los extranjeros. Haz obras de caridad. Se buenos con los demás. San Pablo dice a los tesalonicenses que deben ser elogiados no sólo porque se han convertido a Dios, sino porque lo han demostrado en su vida cotidiana al convertirse en buenos imitadores de Cristo y ser modelos de una buena vida.

Así que centrémonos en el panorama general viviendo el panorama reducido.

Scam Alerts—Reminder!

As we approach the holiday season, please remember that Fr. Brian Wilk (or any clergy) will not call, text, or email you with gift card or money transfer solicitation requests. Please feel free to call the parish office if you want to double check on a request you may receive.

What Does an Email/Text Scam Look Like?

The bogus emails/texts often include the pastor's name or a staff member's name and a legitimate-looking email address. But a closer look should raise some red flags. For example, the email address isn't the one normally used by the pastor or the parish, and the service provider is different, too (ex. @gmail.com). The text message may come from an international phone number. The message may begin with a simple "Hi," but doesn't include a recipients' name. There also may be spelling errors, including the pastor's name.

How Does the Scam Work?

The imposter asks you to buy a popular gift card — frequently, iTunes, Google Play, or Amazon — and then asks for the gift card number and PIN on the back of the card. Those numbers let the scammer immediately get the money you loaded onto the card. And once that's done, the scammer and your money are gone, usually without a trace.

What Should I Do if I receive a message like this?

- Do not open the email
- Do not respond to the email.
- Do not click any links or open any message attachments.
- Block the contact if you are able.
- Just HIT DELETE.

If you or someone you know paid a scammer with a gift card, report it as soon as possible. Call the store/company and tell them the gift card was used in a scam. Then, tell the <u>Federal Trade Commission</u> about it. Your reports may help law enforcement agencies launch investigations that could stop imposters and other fraudsters in their tracks.

Tips on Recognizing a Scam

Here are a few tips on how to protect yourself from these types of scams:

- Never give out or confirm personal information over the phone, via email or on a website until you've checked out who is asking you for it.
- Do not trust a name, phone number, or email address just because it seems to be familiar. Con artists use official-sounding titles and may fake a caller ID or email address to gain your trust.
- If the email phone call, or text message seems fishy, it probably is. Contact the parish office to verify their request.
- Never click on any attachment from a suspicious sounding email or emails from people you are not familiar with.
- Our parish official projects, fundraisers, and appeals are accompanied by mailed letters, bulletin articles, posters, announcements, etc. Random e-mails and texts asking for money in ANY form is usually a scam.
