



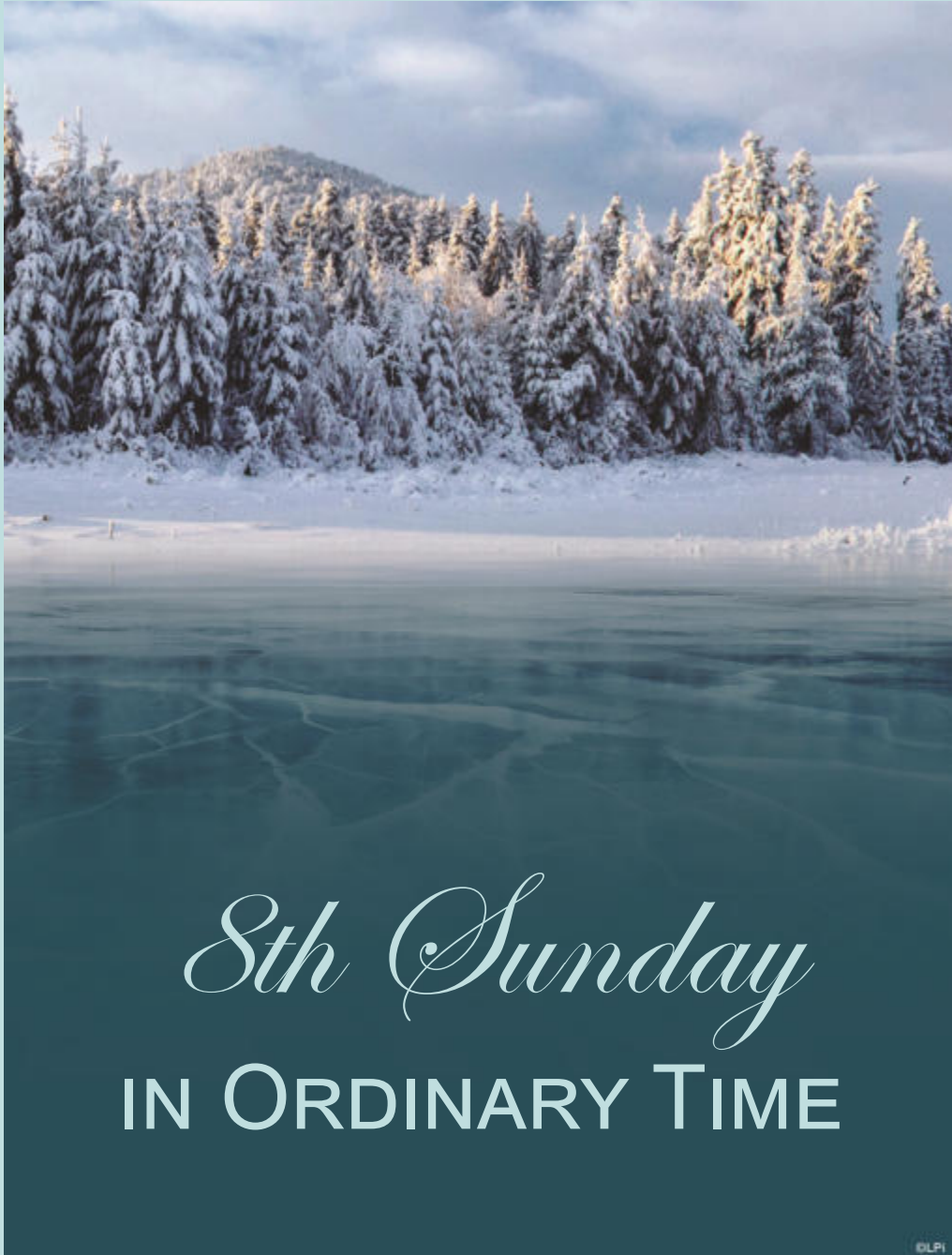

*Fast and Abstinence During Lent*

Customarily, fasting required that a person take only one meal a day, but current Church discipline permits one to take a main meal and two lesser meals which together do not equal the main meal.

All persons who have reached their 14th birthday are bound by the law of abstinence. All adults are bound by the law of fast from their 18th to their 60th year.

- Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast as well as days of abstinence from meat and meat products
- The other Fridays of Lent remain days of abstinence from meat and meat products.

## Dear People of Saint Luke – ‘soon to be’ Lenten Pilgrims,

WOW! This year, even with the extra weeks since the Christmas season ended, Lent came fast. Or so it seemed with recent happenings. Three years ago we geared up for our ‘Refresh;’ 2017 found me in Nigeria on a Mission Trip with Fr. Kenneth Amadi and the Good People of St. Pius X Parish in Gbagalape. It’s probably not a good sign, but I can’t recall what last year was like.

The count down to Lent continues: Three days left to go and Lent begins (Ash Wednesday, March 6th). “Lent is first and foremost about Baptism!” Yes, yes, yes, comes the reply but what does that have to do with our prayer, fasting and almsgiving? Lent, outside of the context of Baptism makes no sense whatever. Our Lenten practices are meant to open us to God’s Spirit within us as a people; put us in touch with our humanness and the needs of others; and share who we are and what we have to alleviate the pain of others and change systems which oppress.

There are two reasons why Lent began: (1) as a time of preparation for those who were preparing to celebrate the Easter Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist (First Communion); (2) as a time for all the faithful – those already fully initiated in Baptism, Confirmation and First Communion (Eucharist) to prepare to renew their Baptismal Promises. There are two reasons why Lent exists today. They are the same as above.

As we approach Lent this year we journey with infant Eleanor Jean, daughter of Elizabeth and Jacob Mortag, and sister of Rosie and Lonnie; who will be Baptized come Easter. We also journey to Easter with our First Communion Candidates: Alexis Antos; Hannah Fischer; Ehren Frederick; Amelia Gnorski; Lauren Scherr. We look forward to celebrating the Easter Sacraments with them when again our song will be: “Alleluia!” On November 4th, 2018, we, as a Household of Faith, celebrated the Rites of Welcome with our First Communion Candidates and our Youth Candidates for Confirmation who were Confirmed in Faith; Sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit a week ago, February 23, 2019, at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. Congratulations to: Conor Drake ‘Elmo’ Bednar; Olivia Kathryn ‘Sebastian’ Hollenbeck; Hunter Daniel ‘Albert’ Karch; and Alyssa Jules ‘Therese’ Karger! We hold in prayer also Nicole Vanselow who will be Confirmed on June 9th.

Even without adult Catechumens and Candidates journeying to the Easter Sacraments - Lent is still a time of renewal for all. We make this journey of faith together and all benefit from and contribute to the RCIA process. The RCIA (*Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults*) is not new to the history of the Church. Our current RCIA is based on the practice of the early Church (2<sup>nd</sup> to the 5<sup>th</sup> century). Much of it is taken from the document called, “*The Apostolic Tradition of Hippolytus*” written about 215 A.D. in Rome. It describes the practice of initiation in the Church at that time. It is important to note and remember that RCIA is a ‘process’ and not a ‘program.’ Programs usually start and stop while processes are ongoing. Initiating adults into the Church is not a matter of passing on information. It is a matter of ‘seeing differently’ and as a result of ‘seeing differently’ behavior changes and new ways of being and living are learned. While information is an important part of the process, the more important goal is becoming a new person in the Christ. This applies to all of us!

Whether it be adults or youth candidates the presence of and the support of the Assembly of Believers in the growth process is essential. It is the faith of the community which is celebrated and then passed on – infused into those embracing the Catholic Way. We, the worshipping assembly – we, the community of St. Luke – we, the already initiated, are essential to the process of growing in faith and immersing each other – especially people who ask to journey with us. In a special way we make our Lenten journey to Easter with those preparing for the Easter Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and First Communion (Eucharist). We need these candidates and they need us as we journey together in Christ.

**At ALL MASSES FOR NEXT SUNDAY, March 10, 2019, we, as a community of the Baptized will celebrate the Rite of Continuing Conversion.** While the presence of the Candidates is essential as we journey together in faith, it is the sponsors (and parents/Godparents) who will be asked to testify to the growth and development of those seeking the Easter Sacraments. As a worshipping assembly – the Catholic Community of St. Luke - WE ALL - will be asked if we support those approaching the Easter Sacraments as we journey together to Easter.

In preparation for the Rite of Calling our Candidates (and ALL OF US) to Continuing Conversion at all Masses for next Sunday, please read and pray over the following questions asked during the Rite:

Parents and Sponsors: **Have these candidates faithfully listened to the apostle’s instruction**

**proclaimed by the Church?** Parents and Sponsors: **They have!**

**Have these candidates come to a deeper appreciation of their Baptism, in which they were joined to Christ and the Church?** Parents and Sponsors: **They have!**

**Have our candidates reflected sufficiently on the tradition of the Church, which is their rich heritage and joined with us their sisters and brothers in weekly**

**Sunday Eucharist?** Parents and Sponsors: **They have!**

**Have our candidates grown in a life of love and service of others.**

Parents and Sponsors: **They have!**

Sisters and brothers in this assembly of believers – members of St. Luke and guests: **Are you ready to support the testimony expressed about these Candidates and include them in your prayer and loving concern giving them healthy example of ongoing conversion as we move toward Easter?** All in Assembly: **We Are!**

**Together we join in this prayerful journey of Lent as we ‘live into our Baptism!’**

# A Good Appetite

**F**asting is not an isolated discipline, but one of a trinity of holy practices: Prayer. Fasting. Almsgiving. Each of these gives support and meaning to the others. Prayer befriends the soul. It re-fixes our sacred purpose and turns us toward the tasks at hand. Fasting befriends the body — which is to say that the body is good, very good, and worthy of whatever form our fasting must take. Almsgiving befriends our neighbor with whom we share what we might otherwise have hoarded.



To fast, accompanied by prayer and almsgiving, is to be healed. Fasting is good for the body, the “body politic,” and the “mystical body.” Fasting helps to make the body whole.

Fasting is necessary now if we are ever to enjoy feasting. A good appetite allows us to enjoy the earthly gifts that we have been given. So fasting is not so much a deprecation of the flesh, but a sharpening of earthly joys. The Talmud says: “One will have to give an account on the judgment day of every good thing which one might have enjoyed — and did not.” Fasting helps us savor God’s goodness.

# Finding Our Place

**W**hy do we fill up the seats in church from the back to the front? Maybe it’s piety: We sit in the back because, aware of our many failings, we don’t feel worthy to draw near. Maybe it’s culture: We sit in the back because our mothers taught us never to claim the best seats or make ourselves the center of attention. Maybe it’s selfish: We want to be able to skip out early. Whatever the reason, it causes a practical problem: The front seats are always empty, creating a gulf between the Lord’s table and the Lord’s people. Latecomers stand in the back rather than march up to the front where everyone can see that they’re late.

Let’s show some hospitality here! Let’s fill the church up from the front to the back, leaving the back rows for those who come later or late. Let’s fill each row from the center: If you’re the first one in a row, don’t hug the end (unless you’re a minister and will need to get in and out). Move into the middle so that others may come and sit beside you.

Filling in the front seats first isn’t proud or arrogant. It’s part of the ministry of hospitality that all of us who are baptized are called to exercise. It’s a simple act of kindness that helps the church to gather better around its Lord, so that we may give God thanks and praise.
