Dear People of St. Luke – Easter People ALL!

WOW! What a tremendous celebration of Holy Week, especially the Sacred Easter Triduum. WOW! WOW!! WOW!!! We gathered in our welcoming Narthex and our uplifting,

refreshed Worship Space (2016-remember that?). We shouted Hosannas, waved branches, listened to our Lord's Passion as drums touched and united our hearts, washed feet with the help of some of our SVdP Mini-Vinnies and acolytes, Danny and Megan Warchol, Jordan and Even Staudt, and Will Curry, calling one another to be Eucharist in our service as the Body of Christ. We 'surveyed and venerated our Savior's wondrous Cross'—(Thanks Music Ministry, especially for your Good Friday Prelude and Reflection following the Passion, "And Can It Be (Amazing Love);" prayed for all people everywhere; were fed and united in Communion. On the night watch of the Resurrection we built a fire; rejoiced at the glow and warmth of one another's faces, on a perfect evening; journeyed in darkness with and as the light of Christ; sang Christ's Easter praises: "Rejoice heavenly powers! ... Jesus Christ, our King is risen!" and joined our voices in song as our Christ story was told: "Christ be our light! Shine in our hearts, Your Church gathered today!" We retold and made new the story of our journey from darkness to light. Greeted by the running waters of Baptism's Living Font we stirred up God's Spirit as we blessed Easter-Baptismal Water; renewed our Baptismal Covenant; prayed, sang, ate and drank at the Lord's Easter Eucharistic Table; sent to 'wash feet' in service.

Our gatherings were faith-filled—in praise of God; rituals moved our hearts; the music lifted us higher than ever before (THANKS Music Ministry: singers, bell ringers, instrumentalists, our Rodgers Organ and Shawn Rochon's musicianship and leadership -WOW!). It was again great to sing, "Heleluyan." "Hark, I Hear the Harps Eternal" was this year's musical apex for me. THANKS also to Suzanne Glowacki and our 'Liturgical Environmentalists' for enhancing our environs with God's beauty. THANKS also to 'behind the scenes' Staff Members: Jane Dunne for anchoring the parish office: scheduling, bulletin editing; printing, and all; Mark Vanchena our Custodian for set-up and cleaning; and Terry Rice our Bookkeeper for paying the bills, reporting, etc. THANKS also to Suzanne Foster, Director of Faith Formation /Pastoral Associate, Kate Heinzman, Coordinator of Child Formation for providing ongoing Christian Formation for us; Linda Gaura, Mary Ellen Eder, and our RCIA Team (three people have already expressed interest in completing Initiation next Easter); classroom and CLOW catechists (this was our first year offering CLOW— Children's Liturgy of the Word during the Easter Triduum. CONGRATULATIONS NEWLY INITIATED! THANKS TO ALL WHO GATHERED AND MINISTERED IN ANY WAY! There is no doubt that we believe 'love is stronger than death' and that Christ is indeed alive in us and through all creation! Personally, I find it hard to put it all into words, but then again, that is what good ritual/music/liturgy/worship does for us ... expresses the inexpressible depth of Faith; our unity in Christ and opens us to new possibilities for life!

Easter, like Baptism, is never a destination in itself, but only a springboard to greater newness of life! As we sang on our Lenten journey: "We have set our hearts for the way—the journey is our destiny—let no one walk alone—the journey makes us one." The journey continues during this Great Easter Day (50 parts) as we give thanks to God for raising Jesus from death as the Christ and we celebrate who we are the Body of Christ—living and Risen! "We are the Resurrection going on always!" We are Easter People!

Next Sunday (May 5) we welcome 5 of our younger members to Christ's Table of Love: Alexis Antos; Hannah Fischer; Ehren Frederick; Amelia Gnorski; and Lauren Scherr. We again congratulate and lift in prayer our Newly Confirmed (on Feb. 23): Conor Bednar; Olivia Hollenbeck; Hunter Karch; and Alyssa Karger! We hold in prayer also Nicole Vanselow who will be Confirmed on June 9th. We also lift in prayer infants: Jackson Henry, son of Paula and William Curry; Eleanor Jean, daughter of Elizabeth and Jacob Mortag; Joseph David, son of Kelly and Dan Sturgill who will be Baptized on May 11th; and James Henry, son of Ali and Jimmy Leschke on June 2nd. What great days for our youth, and all of us as we make this journey together.

There is no separating "living into our Baptism" and 'our being Eucharist' in the power of the Spirit as Easter People. We can never hear enough about Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist and being Church through the power of the Spirit. For us Christians who choose to interpret our ups and downs in life after the example of Jesus Christ's living, dying and rising our journey 'begins and begins again' in BAPTISM. 'Living into our Baptism' is what our Risen journey - dance - story is all about. Baptism is the Sacrament that makes all the difference in the world. Not so much because it saves us from 'Limbo,' but because through shared faith, we are given a healthy, happy, holy pathway for life. I share these quotes for our ongoing formation—mystagogia (communal unpacking of our liturgical celebrations and our integration into a life of community and service.)

Benedictine Fr. Aidan Kavanaugh writes: "Baptism is inadequately perceptible apart from Eucharist; Eucharist is not wholly knowable without reference to Conversion in faith; conversion is abortive if it does not issue in Sacramental illumination by incorporation into the church; the church is only an inept corporation without steady access to Sunday, Lent, and Easter Vigil; evangelization is mere noise and catechesis only a syllabus apart from conversion and initiation into a robust ecclesial environment of faith shared. In Baptism Eucharist begins, and in Eucharist Baptism is sustained. From this premier Sacramental union flows all the church's life."

Fr. Robert W. Hovda offers this insight into church: "First, there is church. First, there is church. First, there is the church." This is not a typographical error. It has to be repeated (more times than above) because of a more fundamental error in our past and in our present. Christians simply cannot think straight or act right about any type of ministry within the church,

unless we first get some very wrong notions out of our heads, hearts, bones and marrow. “Somewhere we fell into an unbiblical and unchristian trap. We got the idea that ministers come first...and only then the church. We got the crazy idea that God makes bishops (including the Pope) first, and then bishops and priests somehow create the church, the community of believers. We never put it that crudely. But that is about the way many of us think...and act.

“Now we have to clear the air and begin to understand and feel again what was understood and felt for so long: that God covenants a people, a church, a community of initiated (Baptized, Confirmed and Eucharistized) people. That is the grand and beautiful reality of grace and mission and sign- a people created in covenant worship to witness and to serve. That is what we have to get into our heads, bones and feelings again. Until we do, nothing we say about ministry will make Christian sense.”

WHEREAS, Safe Environment Week is for every parish and school, as well as the entire faith community to focus, at the same time, on the importance of keeping our children and youth safe;

WHEREAS, child abuse and neglect are societal problems whose prevention depend on involvement among people throughout the faith community;

WHEREAS, our children are our most valuable resources and will shape the future of not only the Archdiocese of Milwaukee but also the entire Church;

WHEREAS, the theme for this years’ Safe Environment Week will be “On this path we are not alone”;

WHEREAS, acknowledging that as a Church we have much work to do to rebuild the trust that has been broken;

WHEREAS, we acknowledge that as bishops, clergy and church leaders we must work together as a community to increase awareness about child abuse and neglect and work to promote the social and emotional well-being of children, youth and families in a safe, healthy and nurturing environment;

THEREFORE, I, Archbishop Jerome E. ListECKI proclaim the week of April 29th – May 5th, 2019 as Safe Environment Week in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. I ask that all participate and acknowledge each other with the love and mercy of God the Father.

Easter Signs and Symbols

Wax

Easter time is the 50-day-long season from Easter Sunday until Pentecost, June 9 this year. Throughout this time the Paschal Candle shines in church. This candle is an image of the risen Body of Christ. It was kindled and consecrated with great ceremony at the Easter Vigil.

When people are baptized into the church, they are given candles lit from the Paschal Candle. They are told to keep their lamps burning brightly throughout their lives. At funerals the Paschal Candle shines on the dead, like a pillar of fire to guide them to the promised land.

A burning candle is a sign of self-sacrifice. It consumes itself in a blaze of glory. Traditionally, the church's candles are made from beeswax. A beehive is a symbol of the church, where everyone is called to work together for the common good.

Many households light a fine, fat candle every mealtime, and indeed, every time they gather to pray. It is a holy habit.

When you light a candle in prayer you might say, "Jesus Christ is the light of the world, a light no darkness can extinguish." Or say the words proclaimed at the Easter Vigil, "Light of Christ! Thanks be to God!"



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Water

A glorious and lovely custom, the origins of the Easter bath date back a little more than thousand years, from the time that large numbers of Eastern Europeans first accepted Christianity and were baptized into the faith.

The custom takes many forms. It can be as sensuous as taking a warm, perfumed bath by candle light. And it can be as silly as tossing water balloons on the unsuspecting.

Water is precious to Christians. It reminds us of the rivers of paradise, the great flood and the Red Sea. In Baptism we enter those waters to be created anew. In Baptism we are led safely to freedom. Baptismal waters are like a tomb. In them we die, are buried and are raised with Christ. The waters are like a womb. In them we are reborn.

Throughout Eastertime, the 50 days from Easter until Pentecost, on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord each January and on the actual anniversary of your own celebration of the first Sacrament, remember and renew your Baptism. Ask parents and godparents what they can recollect about it. What mementoes can you find—your robe, candle or certificate?

Set a bowl brimming with water on the kitchen table. Morning and night, take some water on your fingertips and make the sign of the cross as a pledge of Resurrection.
