





Today, all three readings share the theme of not being accepted; of being bullied, dismissed, and / or devalued. I am sure that many of us have experienced these feelings ourselves. It could be a co-worker, supervisor, spouse, sibling, etc. who has made us feel this way. Most experts in the area of psychology will tell you that people “put down” others, because they have a need to show strength in order to feel a sense of power over others. I believe that the important thing to remember is that if we know to whom we belong, that is to say, acknowledge that we are a child of God, these put downs, need not keep us down. It may be hurtful in the moment, but we need to remember that who we are is how God designed us. We are perfectly flawed if we have *faith* that we are enough in the eyes of our Creator. If we can be in the company of the likes of Ezekiel, Paul, and Jesus, may we bless the weakness that permits us to be in such company.

Adult Question: What unavoidable weakness in yourself do you struggle to accept?

Child Question: What have you wished would be different or better about you?

***“If I just touch the hem of Jesus’ garment my freedom and dignity will be restored. I will be healed,”*** said the woman in last Sunday’s Gospel.

Below is a follow-up reflection by Pope Francis on last Sunday’s Scriptures.

“Pope Francis challenged people last Sunday to “let Jesus look at and heal” their hearts. In his Angelus address June 27, the pope said that intimacy with Jesus was the path to inner healing. Pope Francis said: “Sister, brother -- you are here -- let Jesus look at and heal your heart. I too must do this: let Jesus look at my heart and heal it.” “And if you have already felt the Lord’s tender gaze upon you, imitate Him; do as He does. Look around: you will see that many people who live beside you feel wounded and alone; they need to feel loved: take the step.”

Francis continued: “Jesus asks you for a gaze that does not stop at the outward appearance, but that goes to the heart; a non-judgmental gaze -- let’s stop judging others -- Jesus is asking us to gaze not judging, but welcoming. Let us open our hearts to welcome others; because only love heals life.”

From a window overlooking St. Peter’s Square, where pilgrims stood wearing face coverings to prevent the spread of COVID-19, the Holy Father reflected on the Gospel reading, Mark 5:21-43, in which Jesus heals a woman afflicted with hemorrhages for 12 years. The pope suggested that the woman’s suffering was not merely physical, but also emotional. “More than her health, her affections were compromised. Why? She had blood loss and therefore, according to the mindset of the time, she was deemed impure. She was a marginalized woman,” the Pope said.

“She could not have stable relationships, a husband, a family, and normal social relationships because she was ‘impure,’ a disease that made her ‘impure.’ She lived alone, with a wounded heart.”

The pope argued that life’s greatest disease was not cancer, tuberculosis, or the Coronavirus. “No,” he said, “The most serious illness in life is a lack of love, and not being able to love. This poor woman was sick, yes, of blood loss, but, as a consequence, of lack of love, because she could not be with others socially. The healing that matters most is that of the affections.”

Francis said that everyone could see themselves in the nameless woman. “The text says that she had tried many treatments, ‘had spent all that she had, and was no better but rather grew worse,” he said. “We too, how often do we throw ourselves into mistaken remedies to sate our lack of love? We think that success and money make us happy, but love cannot be bought, it is free. We hide in the virtual, but love is tangible.” “We do not accept ourselves as we are and we hide behind external facades, but love is not an appearance. We look for solutions from magicians, from gurus, to then find ourselves without money and without peace, like the woman in the gospel.”

Francis explained that the woman finally found healing by touching Jesus’ garment, entering into direct, physical contact with him. “Especially in this time, we understand how important contact and relationships are. The same counts with Jesus: at times we are content to observe some precepts and to repeat prayers -- many times like parrots -- but the Lord waits for us to encounter Jesus, to open our hearts to Christ, for us, like the woman, to touch his garment in order to heal. Because, by becoming intimate with Jesus, we are healed in our affections,” he said.

The pope stressed that the Gospel story showed that Jesus welcomed direct contact because it recorded that he looked around the crowd to see who had touched him.

“This is Jesus’ gaze: there are many people, but the Lord goes in search of a face and a heart full of faith. Christ does not look at the whole, as we do, but at the individual. Christ does not stop at the wounds and mistakes of the past, but goes beyond sins and prejudices,” he commented. Pope Francis said that Christ also looks beyond our sins to heal us, while we often judge others based on appearances and speak ill of them.

In the gospel story, Pope Francis said, Jesus healed the woman, tenderly calling her “daughter,” praising her faith and restoring her self-confidence.”

St. Mother Teresa once said:

“the greatest suffering is to feel alone, unwanted, unloved.

“The greatest suffering is also having no one:

Forgetting what an intimate, truly human relationship is;

The greatest suffering is to not know what it means to be loved; not having a family or friends.”

Those are the thoughts and words of a woman who befriended and touched so many poor and dying people on the streets and that ministry continues to this day.

**We long to “RECONNECT”** through the conversation and hugs of friendship; and the sharing of our lives.

**We need to “RECONNECT”** as a St. Luke Parish Family – as the Body of Christ.

## *Notes Regarding the Current Budget and Financial State of the Parish*

The 2021-2022, St. Luke Parish Budget, printed below, was drafted by our Bookkeeper, Bob Bernhardt; Pastor, Fr. Augustine; and Administrative Assistant, Jane Dunne, with input from the Staff and Committees. The Finance Council reviewed, discussed and approved it. The Budget was then presented to the Pastoral Council for review and then submitted to the Archdiocesan Office of Finance.

The financial state of St. Luke Parish is stable even in these COVID-19 times. For the fiscal year 2020-2021 we had a shortfall of about \$20,562 which is close to the usual amount received from offertory collections. Bills were paid from 'operating cash on hand.' Especially in these uncertain times we are very fortunate to have a Staff committed to careful spending and the ongoing generous financial stewardship of so many parish members, guests and friends. Again, on behalf of one another: THANK YOU for your Stewardship of Time, Talent and Financial Treasure.

Our goal for 2021-2022, is to increase our weekly offering which will provide funding for much needed ministries within our St. Luke Community. It is our hope to organize numerous 'like-to-like ministries' here at St. Luke. **This is the time to consider please, an increased commitment to Stewardship of Time, Talent and especially Financial Treasure.**

As more and more of us return to 'in-person' Celebration of Eucharist and parish activities, formation and outreach we are strengthened as the Body of Christ.





