



Did you know?

Tomorrow, January 17, our nation honors the life and memory of Martin Luther King, Jr. who was assassinated fifty-four years ago, on April 4, 1968. He was a man who truly lived his Christian ideals. He had a dream, a dream that would inspire Americans of all races and nationalities. His dream was that a time would come when Americans would not judge each other by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

I remember the night Martin Luther King, Jr. was killed. I was a senior at Indiana University here in Bloomington, and Roger and I had met the summer before. We had volunteered for Robert Kennedy's presidential campaign, and we were waiting in downtown Indianapolis for Bobby, as we called him, to arrive at his campaign headquarters to greet all of the volunteers. We waited and waited; eventually someone came up to the podium to tell us that Martin Luther King had been shot and Kennedy would not be taking the time to stop at his campaign headquarters. Instead, he went to the site of his first scheduled speech at the corner of 17th and Broadway.

The Indianapolis Star would later report what had happened that evening. "Indianapolis Mayor Richard Lugar, fearing a race riot, told Kennedy's staff that his police could not guarantee his safety. Lugar urged Kennedy to cancel his speech, but Kennedy insisted that he and his people go on alone, without police...At about 9 p.m. Kennedy arrived, He knew more than his audience did – he knew King was dead. He stood on a flatbed truck and faced the crowd and laid it out."

The story went on, "The crowd gasped in shock. With practically no time to prepare – he had come straight from the airport – and speaking off the cuff, Kennedy told the news with such compassion and empathy that when he finished...the crowd pressed near him and tried to touch him, and when he drove away, they went away mournful, not vengeful."

Tell me more...

Mayor Lugar was right to have feared violence. In the aftermath of Martin Luther King's assassination, racial riots swept the country, with riots in more than 100 cities, 39 deaths, and 2000 injured. However, Indianapolis was not one of those cities, and those who were there that night believe that Kennedy's speech prevented the violence.

After breaking the news of King's death, Kennedy went on to talk about King and his legacy. "Martin Luther King dedicated his life to love and to justice between fellow human beings. He died in the cause of that effort. In this difficult day, in this difficult time for the United States, it's perhaps well to ask what kind of a nation we are and what direction we want to move in. For those of you who are black -- considering the evidence that there were white people who were responsible [for the shooting] -- you can be filled with bitterness, and with hatred, and a desire for revenge.

"We can move in that direction as a country, in greater polarization -- black people amongst blacks, and white amongst whites, filled with hatred toward one another. Or we can make an effort, as Martin Luther King did... to replace that violence, that stain of bloodshed that has spread across our land with an effort to understand, with compassion and love.

"For those of you who are black and are tempted to be filled with hatred and mistrust of all white people because of the injustice of such an act, I would only say that I can also feel in my own heart the same kind of feeling. I had a member of my family killed, and he was killed by a white man. But we have to make an effort in the United States. We have to make an effort to understand, or go beyond these rather difficult times....

"What we need in the United States is not division; what we need in the United States is not hatred; what we need in the United States is not violence and lawlessness, but love, and wisdom, and compassion toward one another, and a feeling of justice toward those who still suffer within our country, whether they be white or whether they be black...

"We can do well in this country. We will have difficult times. We've had difficult times in the past, and we will have difficult times in the future. It is not the end of violence; it is not the end of lawlessness; and it's not the end of disorder.

"But the vast majority of white people and the vast majority of black people in this country want to live together, want to improve the quality of our lives, and want justice for all human beings that abide in our land.

"And let's dedicate ourselves to what the Greeks wrote so many years ago: to tame the savageness of man and make gentle the life of this world. Let us dedicate ourselves to that, and say a prayer for our country and for our people."

Just two months and two days later, on June 6, 1968, Robert Kennedy was also assassinated. May they both rest in eternal peace.

Meditation "Christ Himself taught humility of heart, and the heart must not remain idle, nor fail to product the necessary acts. And what acts of humility do you make before God? How often do you make them? When have you made them? How long is it since you made them? It would be absurd to hope for the reward which is promised to the humble without being humble, or at least making acts of humility; humility of heart without the heart's humbling itself—what folly! Are you foolish enough to believe that this can be done? ... it is necessary to humble ourselves when we approach God with prayer to obtain some grace, because God does not regard nor heed nor impart His grace except to the humble ... When, therefore, you come to ask God for some grace of the body or of the soul, do you always remember to practice this humility? When we pray, and especially when we say the 'Our Father', we are speaking to God; and how many times when you are saying your prayers, do you speak to God with less respect than if you were speaking to one of your fellow creatures? How often when you are in church, which is the house of God, do you listen to a sermon, which is the Word of God, and assist at the functions of the service without any reverence? Humility of heart, says St. Thomas, is accompanied by exterior reverence; and to be lacking in this is to lack humility and is therefore a sin of pride, 'which excludes reverence.'" — Rev. Cajetan da Bergamo, p.138-140 Humility Of Heart
