

## THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR



Today, on this feast of the Epiphany, we are reminded by the liturgy that Joseph and Mary and the child had to escape persecution after the visit of the Magi. Today throughout the world many people also are fleeing persecution, hunger and danger and have become refugees and migrants. A couple of years ago Pope emeritus Benedict XVI reminded us that, “...every migrant is a human person who, as such, possesses fundamental, inalienable rights that must be respected by everyone and in every circumstance.”



In the midst of the harsh debate and discussion about immigration issues in the USA and throughout the world, it is important that as Catholics we keep before us the teachings of the Church and the stance of Scripture in addressing this issue. The US Bishops Conference in their statement, **Welcoming Christ in the Migrant** can help us to look at this difficult issue from our Catholic perspective. They began that statement by saying,

*We live in an age when strangers in our midst have become a source of suspicion and fear. Jesus' command for us to welcome these strangers as we would welcome him is at odds with much of the prevailing sentiment expressed today. Debates over whether and how to address the migration phenomenon fill not only the halls of government but even community and parish halls. The historically generous American spirit has been replaced in some quarters with calls for isolation and restriction. In this fearful environment, how is a Christian to respond? Christ's call is unchanging: we are obliged to welcome the stranger, knowing that "whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Mt 25:40). A disposition of openness and welcoming to the stranger signifies the same to Christ himself. Pope Benedict XVI highlights the importance of this dynamic in his first encyclical, God Is Love (Deus Caritas Est). In it he stressed that "love of God and love of neighbor have become one: in the least of the brethren we find Jesus himself, and in Jesus we find God" (no. 15). [from US Bishops Statement on Immigration]*

As we recall the visit of the Magi and the subsequent need of Mary and Joseph to flee with the child Jesus

from their own homeland to Egypt to escape persecution may our prayers be for those in our day who have had to escape persecution also. May those who seek a place to freely express their faith in Christ and freedom to express their views find a welcome in each of us who try to follow the Gospel ideals of welcome and acceptance. Just as many German, Irish, Polish, Vietnamese, Filipino and other immigrants found a welcome in the Archdiocese in the past so also may immigrants today receive that same welcome from all of us who profess the name of Catholic in this 21st century.



Next weekend we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord and the completion of the Christmas season. We then return to Ordinary Time in the Church's calendar on January 11 until the Season of Lent arrives with Ash Wednesday on February 17.

As we begin this New Year of 2021, I wish to express a very heartfelt **THANK YOU** to all who helped with our Christmas Season Masses and celebrations. Though our celebrations were much simpler due to the COVID restrictions we were still able to celebrate the great mystery and gift of God becoming human for the salvation of the world. I also express a loud THANKS to our faithful parish staff, the Franciscan Friars who help at St. Peter's and all of you who faithfully support the ministry here.



I especially want to express deep gratitude to all who contributed to the Pastor's Christmas Appeal. In the midst of the financial difficulties of our nation, the danger of the COVID virus and fewer people in the Loop these days, the generous donation of so many of you helps us to continue to provide ministry here in the Loop to all who come. To all of our faithful benefactors, both those who help financially and those who help with the gift of your time and service, be assured of our prayers for all of you and your family.

As we begin the new year of 2021 I encourage you to consider participating in one or more of the programs that will be offered by St. Peter's Church. Fr. Derran will again offer the Little Rock Scripture Study Program as well as a number of other programs in the coming months. Be sure and check the bulletin and the church web site for more information. Though we cannot yet

meet face to face our Zoom and YouTube programs have been utilized by a number of people in the past months.



As we begin the New Year please remember to wear a mask, wash your hands often, avoid crowds and continue to follow health protocols of the city, state and Archdiocese. With vaccines beginning to be distributed let us pray that the danger of this virus may soon be lessened. As



## THIS WEEK'S SCRIPTURE STUDY

### *Mt. 2: 1-12*

Arctic air has finally found its way to the Midwest. Christmas trees are coming down but it's far too cold to go outside, so snowmen and Santa's still hold court on front lawns while people huddle indoors.



The pandemic has necessitated a change of venue for the Rose Bowl and most folks are more concerned about when and where they can be vaccinated for Covid-19, so as far as anyone can tell, Christmas is pretty much over. The question is, has it made any difference?

Matthew's Gospel describes a world of class distinctions and crooked politicians and prejudice – a world divided between those who 'have' and those who 'have-not'. In other words, Matthew describes a world very much like our own. But then something happens – something that makes a difference.

“And you, Bethlehem...from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel.” Shepherds were looked down upon. They spent their lives moving from place to place with their sheep – and they smelled like it. There were many shepherds around Bethlehem. “[B]ehold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem...” The magi were astronomers, the ‘college professors’ of their time. “They prostrated themselves and did him homage.” (Picture Harvard faculty bowing down before the janitor's son.) “Then they...offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.” Evidently these men were also wealthy. It must have cost quite a lot to make such a trip, not to mention the cost of their gifts. Something was happening – something that would make a difference.

But that was 2000 years ago (or a week-and-a-half, depending on how you're counting). Christmas is over and Valentine hearts have replaced Santa in the stores. But wait a minute – maybe that's OK. In fact, maybe that's exactly the point! Christmas isn't about political power or prestige – Christmas is about love. Christmas isn't about what we *get* – it's about what we *give*! Maybe we need to be more like the magi, more concerned about *bringing* gifts than *getting* them. Maybe that's what would make the difference! The magi went away changed, departing “...by another way.” Can we say the same? Are we changed? Has Christmas made any difference in our lives?

“Where is that thing?” mumbled Bob as he searched frantically on his dimly lit desk for the current electric bill. “I know I put it right on top of these papers this morning!” Growing in frustration and bordering on anger, he flies stuff around, moves books and opines why simple tasks need to be so hard. Enter his wife, who calmly says, “Maybe it would help if you put the light on, dear.” The desk light goes on and lo and behold, there is the electric bill right where Bob left it earlier. All it took was a little light!



We stubbornly refuse to turn on the lights! Either we are distracted, determined, disinterested, preoccupied, stubborn, apprehensive, or all of the above. Or perhaps, we fail to do the obvious. We would rather live our lives with the dimmest of lights or even in total darkness. Why are we afraid to do something so that we can actually see? It might help us to find quicker and better answers to problems, the meaning of life, relationships, happiness, and what is ultimate truth. Yet, we stumble along, moving things from one side to the other, getting angry, feeling cheated, being unsettled, resigning ourselves to the agony of defeat once again.

“And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was.” The light has come into the world in the person of Jesus Christ! We no longer have to fumble in the darkness. We have been gifted with the illumination we need to see our way through things and find what we really are looking for. All these years later, however, so many are still reluctant to accept him. Perhaps they are unconvinced, disinterested, preoccupied, stubborn, apprehensive, or all of the above. Everyone has their own reason for not wanting to turn on the switch.

But there are so many answers to so many of our problems in this humble Child of Nazareth. A simple birth teaches us about God's tender wedded relationship with humanity. It speaks to the expanse of God's salvation across the globe, and the incarnate Divine wonders and blessings that are a part of our life moment to moment. It calls us to understand the design of world order God intended as found in the Beatitudes, the sacredness of every human life and all of creation and the meaning of things we struggle with most, like suffering and death. We have a lot of Good News to share, not just with a privileged few but with all the world. All races and creeds can receive God's healing word. God continues to manifest himself even now! Use the light to find what you are really looking for!


