COLLECTION FOR THE CHURCH IN LATIN AMERICA

"I should no longer say that I have neighbors to help, but that I must myself be a neighbor to others" -Pope Francis, Fratelli Tutti, no. 81

On June 26, 2020, Fr. Ricardo Antonio Cortez Martínez, rector of the St. Óscar Arnulfo seminary in Usulutan, El Salvador, sent a request to the Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America for financial aid for 42 seminarians in the philosophy stage of their formation. Less than two months later, on August 7, Fr. Ricardo was found assassinated. Despite a falling homicide rate in El Salvador, three priests were slain from 2019 through August 2020.



To answer the call to priestly or consecrated life is a courageous act of faith, especially in a time and place where priests face violence, as Fr. Ricardo did. The Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America recognizes the courage and openness of seminarians, such as those at the

St. Oscar Arnulfo Romero seminary, by supporting their formation as they prepare for lives of dedicated service.

This weekend throughout the USA the Church asks us to contribute to the Collection for the Church in Latin America. Our donation in the second collection makes it possible for young men in El Salvador and throughout Latin America and the Caribbean to answer the call to serve the People of God as priest, consecrated religious, catechist and other church workers. THIS WEEK'S SCRIPTURE STUDY

1 Cor. 12:31—13:13

Martha is a nurse. She works in the Covid ward of a large city hospital, which means that she must spend long hours putting on and removing protective clothing as she



moves from room to room, tending to the needs of her patients. In each room there is a record of the individual's history, medications, doctors' notes, etc. but, while Martha knows the importance of checking this information, that's not the first thing she does. Before Martha even goes into a patient's room she addresses the patient by name and, if they are able to speak, asks permission to enter. Martha knows how important it is to respect the patient's dignity and space, especially under crowded and often frightening conditions. Then she listens to what the patient has to tell her. Martha understands that knowing a patient is more important than simply knowing *about* a patient.

There are, of course, many other very good nurses in the hospital where Martha works. All speak the language of medicine; all have studied the mysteries of the human body and acquired the necessary knowledge to perform their tasks. Years of schooling have given them the faith and confidence to do their jobs well. But for many there is still one thing missing – one thing that Martha has. Martha focuses on her patients as people. Martha is not jealous of the other nurses. She works well with LPNs and CNAs, recognizing the stresses under which they are all working. She is not pompous, nor does she have an inflated sense of her own importance. If a patient speaks harshly to Martha she understands that it is most often the illness that is speaking and she does not take it personally. She has faith in her talent as a nurse and hope that her work can be helpful in bringing about a positive outcome.

Martha loves the work that she does, tending to her patients, recognizing their fears and listening to their stories. But most important of all, Martha loves her patients. "So faith, hope and love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love".



January 30, 2022 Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

St. Oscar Romero (1917-1980) was a "Salvadoran Roman Catholic archbishop who was a vocal critic of the violent activities of government armed forces, right-wing groups, and leftist guerrillas involved in El Salvador's civil conflict (Encyclopedia Britannica)." As a voice of the voiceless, he was an outspoken champion of the poor who were the ones most affected by the civil unrest and violence. His advocacy provoked several attempts on his life. Nonetheless, St. Oscar Romero was convinced that before all else his faith in the resurrected Christ and the values of the Gospel trumped any earthly concern or worry. He walked with complete confidence and trust. On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was assassinated while celebrating Mass. Such is often the fate of those who challenge the socio-political agendas of the day.

We may look at the example of witness of St. Oscar Romero as something extraordinary. In one sense it is. Through the power of God, an ordinary human being did extraordinary things. But, in and of himself, St. Oscar Romero was simply a humble, loving servant of God. Oscar knew not only the power of love but the risk that comes when loving unconditionally. The beauty of God's message was able to shine in and through him because he was able to step out of the way and be a vessel. One can assume that for St. Oscar Romero, one's earthly life has no merit when faith, integrity, conviction, zeal and love are jettisoned. Fear and apprehension had no grip on this man who not only saw but spoke the truth.

Do we speak the truth? It makes us feel good to speak of God as love. But have we ever considered the ramifications of this radical message? There are assaults on human life occurring daily. More and more the value and worth of a human being is being reduced and minimalized. We are becoming widgets in the production of life. In our whole simple humble ways, we too are called to be prophets. Knowing who you are and what is within your means to do, how can you make God's love real, stand up for what is right, and give witness to the sacredness of all that is around you?


