


FOR THE FAMILY

Reflecting on the Word: Jesus breathing on the disciples seems like such a strange thing to do, but this also happened in creation! In Genesis 2:7. God formed man out of dust and then blew the breath of life into his nostrils so that he became a living being. At the Chrism Mass, which is celebrated by the bishop before Easter, he breathes over the three different vessels of oil that will be used for the sacraments. This gesture recalls Jesus' action in today's Gospel. A symbol of the Holy Spirit coming down to consecrate the oil. The Holy Spirit that is breathed into Adam, breathed over the sacred oils, and breathed onto the apostles give life. The Holy Spirit is God's very life and it is within you also. At your baptism you received the gift of the Holy Spirit so that you can live your life for God as the apostles did after receiving the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

On the Way Home from Mass: What do you think the disciples felt before Jesus came and stood in their midst? After he breathed on them, how do you think they felt?

Living the Word: The Holy Spirit is waiting to be invited into everything you do. As a family, make it a habit to invite him into your every activity by saying, "Come, Holy Spirit. You are welcome here." Invite him before driving, before school activities, or before a difficult conversation. He is waiting to be let in.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - FR. JOHN MUIR

I hope you'll acknowledge with me a simple fact: it's not normal to have tongues of fire "part and come to rest" on people. It is actually pretty strange. Yet that is precisely what we celebrate in this feast of Pentecost. How can this mean something to us in our daily lives?

Jews had a tradition that heaven is a temple made of bricks of fire. So, through the apostles, the heavenly temple is coming to earth. But this fire looks like tongues, not bricks. That means that heavenly speech will be crucial to building a dwelling place for God on earth among men and women. So, it's no surprise when the apostles begin to speak in a miraculous way that is understood by all language groups. They are speaking of what God has done in and through Jesus: bringing heaven to earth and uniting all peoples to God and to each other.

How often our speech divides: gossip, slander, insults, and so on. How strange and rare it is when people speak in ways that truly unite instead of divide. Imagine how powerful it would be if you and I began to speak at home, at work, and in our community in a way that made people hear heavenly speech. Imagine if you spoke of the mighty deeds of God in a way that everyone could understand. That's precisely what the Holy Spirit descends upon us to do. Ask Him to come as a tongue of fire to you once again, and He will. Then speak!

Vespers and Benediction – Thanks to the Parish Choir



Sunday evening we will celebrate the patronal feast day of our parish community by singing psalms and canticles and reciting prayers as part of the liturgy of Vespers. Vespers is one of several liturgies which are known as the divine office. These liturgies are primarily celebrated in monastic orders at fixed times each day, but Matins (morning prayer) and Vespers (evening prayer) are occasionally celebrated in parish communities for special occasions. Here at The Church of the Holy Spirit the Feast of Pentecost is our special occasion to observe with psalms and prayers of thanksgiving as well as a blessing of the congregation with The Blessed Sacrament. Sunday evening we will gather at 5:00 p.m. to celebrate Vespers and Benediction and give thanks for the presence of the Holy Spirit. The liturgy will last for approximately thirty minutes and will be followed by light refreshments. Please come and celebrate our special feast day!

The Vespers and Benediction liturgies are part of the culmination of activities for our parish choir as we wrap up the choral calendar before summer break. The Holy Spirit Singers will sing for the 10:00 mass the next two Sundays (The Feasts of the Holy Trinity and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ) and then enjoy a break before rehearsals begin at the end of summer. I want to take this opportunity to thank Sarah DeMoor, Ellen Emerson, Brytner Evangelista, Joseph Gordon, Wesley Hudson, Benjamin Ragsdell, Allan Ramirez, Lorri Roberts, and Elaine Seeley for their time and talent this season. There have been several highlights, including the Dark Night of the Soul Concert back in November, and the singing of the Mozart setting of *Regina Coeli* for Easter. This has been our first full season back since the onset of the pandemic, and it has been good to get some traction and regain our musical footing. I also want to honor the memory of Bob Adelberg, who faithfully sang in the choir for many years before he passed on to the heavenly choir in October 2022. His robust bass voice is missed.

REFLECTION

Question: Couldn't Jesus have done more good if he stayed on earth, rather than ascended into heaven?

Answer: This is an interesting question! During his earthly life, Jesus gave sight to the blind, healed paralytics, drove out demons, and fed thousands with only a few loaves of bread. Imagine what he could have done if he'd never ascended into heaven! Imagine what our world could be! It's an interesting thought to consider, especially as the world faces challenges that only seem to deepen and expand. Yet at the Last Supper, Jesus says, "It is better for you if I go." Why? His response must have seemed strange to the Apostles at the time. In his place, Jesus says, he will send the Paraclete, the Comforter, the Advocate. He promises to send the Holy Spirit.

Jesus' departure allows the Apostles to become the leaders he has formed them to be. Jesus is no longer situated in only one geographical location, and his Church will never be a political kingdom. Soon after the Ascension, we celebrate Pentecost — the descent of the Holy Spirit and the radical empowerment of the followers of Jesus. We share in that empowerment and in that mission. Jesus is present in the sacraments, and he is present in us. Through our faith, hope, and love, we are called to be the good he does here on earth!
