

Inspiration for the week

Be watchful! Be alert! The core message of Advent cannot be more direct or simple. As those who are postured in a spirit of readiness and anticipation, we must always be attentive and vigilant. We have to be ready not only for the anticipated arrival of our Lord, but watchful and attentive to the unexpected visit as well. While we know that the Christ is coming, we also do not know the exact time. Cultivating this expectant attitude is the purpose of this season. It is easy to grow slack, inattentive, and too self-assured. We can easily deaden ourselves to the wonder and surprise of God's presence. We get so absorbed in so many other distractions that it can seem like Christ's second coming, and even Christ's coming in time are of lesser importance. When it finally dawns on us that we have wandered far away from where we need to be, and lost our attentiveness and focus, we will wonder how this all happened. We may even try to put the onus on God and blame God for a lack of involvement or presence. We are the ones, who through our own choice, put the distance in our relationship and lost touch. Now it's time to come back and perk ourselves up a bit!

LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Advent is upon us. The nights are growing longer and the days are growing shorter. Darkness seems to be conquering the light. We as a Christian people mark this change of light and darkness with the season of Advent. A season of hope and joy in which we celebrate that we are awaiting the return of the Lord. We confidently approach the growing darkness with a flickering light. In our day and time with our technology we can easily turn night into day with bright lights and spotlights but instead with Advent we go old school and use candles. One more candle lit each week so that as the night grows to its longest we have four candles lit to break darkness and remind us of the hope found in the birth of Jesus.



During every Mass, immediately after the Our Father, the priest says a short prayer known as the embolism: “Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace to our days, that, by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin, and safe from all distress, as we wait the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.”

This prayer is particularly meaningful during Advent, the season where we consciously “await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ” with joyful expectation. This kind of waiting is often difficult, as joy and expectation do not generally characterize our everyday experience. Few of us are filled with hope as we sit in a traffic jam, or stand in line at Wal-Mart, or experience delays when traveling by plane or train. We shop online and are willing to pay for guaranteed two-day (or overnight) delivery. We assume that Wi-Fi access will be fast and omnipresent – and we grow impatient when we wait for the websites, audio, or video to load. Amid these everyday experiences, the Advent liturgies play a crucial role in teaching and remind us how we ought to wait in joyful expectation.

I invite you to create your own Advent Wreath and place it on the table where the family gathers to eat. At meal time say an advent prayer and light the candles, 1 for the first week, 2 for the second, and so on. Let the wreath be a symbol for your family that you are preparing for more than just Santa and gifts but for the coming of Christ Jesus into our lives.

The Wreath of evergreen boughs are a sign of the everlasting love of God. A love that is always alive and life-giving. The circular wreath reminds us that there is no beginning and no end to the love of God. God’s love is now, has always been and will be forever. The four candles of the wreath mark the four weeks of Advent. As the night grows longer we light another candle each week as a reminder that no matter how dark it becomes the Light of Christ will always shatter the darkness. At Christmas when all the candles are lit and we celebrate The Light of Christ being born into the world the days begin to grow again and the darkness begins to fade away.

Christmas Tree



Who are you visiting!

Consider asking questions of those you will be visiting with over the holiday season! These are a few questions you may want to ask:

Are you eating inside at restaurants?

Are you going into establishments with a mask?

Are you attending events without masks?

Have you been exposed to a person who has tested positive with COVID-19?

Have you tested positive for COVID-19?

What are safe behaviors

What makes you feel safe visiting? Communicate your COVID-19 protocol requirements.

Am I comfortable being in a confined space with others? With a mask?

Am I comfortable hugging others or in close contact?

Am I comfortable eating food close to others?

Where are we traveling to?

Road trip is safer than traveling by air.

Pack a cooler with food and snacks to minimize stops.

Pick smaller gas stations with less peoples

ALWAYS wear your mask when you leave your vehicle and sanitize your hands!

When should we be thinking of the safety?

Group gatherings other than our normal small circle of family/friends

In-door gatherings and close proximity

Why is this all so necessary as it is the Holidays?

To be safe with all loved ones and minimize the spread of COVID-19

Practice the recommendation's: **3 W's!** Wear mask, Watch distance and Wash your hands!

Pre-visit Quarantine

New Use of Antiphons at Sunday Mass

In the new liturgical year in the music department we're going to start singing the proper antiphons of the day at Mass. Let's dive into what those are and what they'll look like at our Sunday Masses

Two types of prayers we find in the liturgy are called the "ordinary" and the "proper". The Ordinaries are prayers that we pray together each week, like the Holy Holy or the Lamb of God. The Propers are parts of the Mass that change from week to week (the collect prayer that Father reads, or the prayer over the Gifts). There are two Proper antiphons that are part of Sunday Mass: one entrance antiphon and one communion antiphon. If you've noticed at Sunday Mass Father will say a little prayer right after communion, that's an antiphon. Or if you've been to daily Mass with Fr. Gary, the short prayer he reads before coming down the aisle is the entrance antiphon of the day.

The antiphons are mostly pulled from the psalms and are often set to music. During Advent, there's a call to music ministers to lean on the psalm texts more. So we're going to be singing both the entrance and communion antiphons of the day, rather than singing or playing a general hymn in either of those places.

What will this look like? Antiphons are pretty short. For the opening procession, instead of an instrumental the cantor will sing through the antiphon 2-3 times, hopefully setting the tone for the Mass and giving you a heads up on the themes you will hear of that day.

At Communion time, the cantor will sing the communion antiphon, and then the instrumentalist will play a little, and then the cantor will sing the antiphon again, and repeat. So it will be more like a meditative refrain. Or even like Taize prayer for those who are familiar with that style.

We will print the antiphon texts in your bulletin each week, hopefully allowing you to really understand the text and pray it in your heart along with the singer or singers.


