

Reading 1 Dt 18:15-20

Moses spoke to all the people, saying: "A prophet like me will the LORD, your God, raise up for you from among your own kin; to him you shall listen. This is exactly what you requested of the LORD, you God, at Horeb on the day of the assembly, when you said, 'Let us not again hear the voice of the LORD, our God, nor see this great fire any more, lest we die.' And the LORD said to me, 'This was well said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their kin, and will put my words into his mouth; he shall tell them all that I command him. Whoever will not listen to my words which he speaks in my name, I myself will make him answer for it. But if a prophet presumes to speak in my name an oracle that I have not commanded him to speak, or speaks in the name of other gods, he shall die.' "

A new teaching with authority. He commands even the unclean spirits and they obey him." His fame spread everywhere throughout the whole region of Galilee.

The psalmist counsels, "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." What message is God inviting you to be open to this day?

St. Paul urges the Corinthians to be free of anxieties and distractions. What spiritual practices help you to be firmly centered in God's peace?

In the gospel we hear that the people of Capernaum "were astonished" at Jesus's teaching. What words of Jesus in the gospels do you find astonishing or even shocking?



Most of us are not trail blazers. Throughout history though, there have been many folks who tirelessly and persistently pursued the promptings of their hearts without giving any care to what others thought or trends dictated. Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection

In the Gospel this weekend we encounter Jesus' first miracle according to Mark. The miracle is the casting out of a demon. A demon who proclaims Jesus to be the Holy One of God. This exorcism occurs while Jesus is teaching in the synagogue. The people are amazed because they say that Jesus teaches with authority. In the midst of his teaching in the synagogue the man with the unclean spirit calls out to Jesus knowing who he is.

It is interesting that the man with the unclean spirit is in the synagogue. Often when Jesus encounters such people they are outside or in out of the places. The bad news is that evil can be anywhere, the good news is that Jesus is greater and has authority over all.

We live in a time when there are many different messages. Many proclaim to be the truth even though there is no proof and they contradict each other completely. We must carefully discern the message that God wants us to hear. Not necessarily what we want to hear or is easiest but the message which comes from God. We must pray that we have the wisdom to see and hear his word and then to share that with others.

In the current climate in our country we must be willing to listen for the truth. To see beyond the anger, division and racism and find ways to speak to one another in truth and listen to one another with faith and hope.

Discipleship

This week we will celebrate the Presentation of the Lord, which in the Church is a time of blessing candles. We bless candles in celebration of the light of Christ revealed in the Presentation and received in our Baptism. The light of Christ that surrounds us and protects us and the light of Christ that we are commissioned to carry to the world. As we reflect on our discipleship a good question for us to reflect on concerns light.

Is the world a brighter place with the light of Christ because of my life and the light that I share?

FAITH FORMATION & RCIA... Lent is around the corner. It is a time when we prepare our hearts to remember the redemptive suffering and death of Jesus. We also prepare to celebrate his resurrection. Let us take time to reflect on our Lenten practices and decide on a *Family Lenten Plan*.

During Lent we reflect on Jesus' time in the desert. Let's consider what it is like in the desert. In the desert...


Snowball Fight at Your House


